First Reading: Isaiah 45: 1, 4-6

When today's passage from the book of Isaiah was written, the Jewish people had been held in exile by Babylon for more than 40 years. Cyrus, the king of neighboring Persia, was preparing to invade Babylon. The prophet sees Cyrus, a pagan king, as an instrument of God. Through this military factory, God will free his people and allow them to return home.

Second Reading: Thessalonians 1:1-5

Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians is the earliest of all New Testament writings, coming only about 20 years after the Resurrection of Jesus. Today's reading gives us the letter's opening words. In just five verses, we hear reference to God the Father, the Lord Jesus and the Holy Spirit, and also to faith, hope and love. It indicates how quickly these essentials of our faith became part of our Christian tradition.

Last Tuesday, Deacon Pat & Joan Berigan & some parishioners and I attended the funeral service for Charles Hakaim at St. Elias Melkite Greek Catholic Church in Brooklyn, near St. Thomas More. Charles was 98 years old and I was sad to hear of his passing as I had not seen him in several months due to the pandemic. Charles was a man of great faith and this was evidenced by the joy that he had and the joy that he spread so infectiously to others. In fact I told his daughter Ruth that the only time I saw him without a huge smile on his face was when I said prayers before his body at the funeral home. He made me and others laugh often and was such a wonderful man. At his funeral I mentioned how I could hear him singing the Alleluia loud & clear all the way at the pulpit as I stood there with the gospel book. He will certainly be missed but I am confident that he is still singing his Alleluias loud & clear with the choirs of angels. May he rest in peace and in joy.

Today, I will be joining with others in celebrating the 100th Birthday of Armand Venditti, a long time parishioner who had been very active at St. Leo's along with his wife whose funeral Mass I celebrated a few years ago & which really introduced me to Armand. He won't actually reach his centenarian birthday until November so I told him he better not spend any of his birthday money until he actually makes it to that day! But I've been waiting a long time (though not nearly as long as he has) to celebrate this wondrous occasion. Armand may tell you otherwise, but he looks so healthy and strong and no one would ever guess his age because he is still so full of life and faith. I thank him for all that he has done for the parish of St. Leo's, along with his wife, over many, many years and with many of the priests who once served here, including Fr. Schlegel, Fr. Dragga & Fr. Weist, all of whom can tell you stories of Armand (some funny ones but all good ones!). Since he has already received the biblical blessing of being able to "see his children's children", may he still receive many more blessings in the years to come as he blesses us with his presence.

As November approaches, we will be praying for all the faithful departed. This Wednesday is the anniversary of my maternal grandfather's death, who died on his birthday. If that isn't odd enough, his wife, my maternal grandmother, also died on her birthday which was September 28th. My mother was always afraid when her birthday came around! But there again, we can celebrate their birth into this world & I pray their birth into the next world on the same day.

PARISH REGISTRATION

Question:

Why is it so important that we register in a parish? Isn't it good enough that we go to Mass?

Answer:

Registration is the official way we join a parish community. Many people think that because they attend a particular parish they automatically belong. At times, young adults who have moved away for years think they are still signed up under their parents. But membership requires signing up, formally enrolling yourself in a parish. Registration is a commitment to a community, a way to be included in the religious, social, and ministerial activities of your parish. Your registration affects the parish in many ways. Census numbers can determine how many priests are assigned to a church, what benefits and obligations the community has to the diocese, and how Masses, Confessions, and devotions are planned and scheduled.

Registration shows you belong. It is also necessary for certain benefits, like scheduling sacraments, obtaining sponsor certificates, and getting donation statements for taxes. Most importantly, it lets the parish count on you, to call on you to assist in its mission. Registering in your parish is a statement of faith and confidence in the life and work of your parish. ©LPi

A MESSAGE ON THE UPCOMING ELECTION FROM BISHIOP MALESIC

Once again, we find ourselves in a very polarized election cycle with candidates that do not reflect the complete breadth of Catholic moral teaching. Yet, it is our solemn duty as citizens of our republic to cast a vote for the candidate who best supports the greatest ideals and moral teachings of our Catholic faith, the faith that we hold and practice as the means of our personal salvation and as a benefit for the common good of the pluralistic society in which we live.

In casting our ballot, whether for those already proposed by a particular party or for those we choose to write in, we must have properly formed consciences. A properly formed conscience comes through prayer, Scripture and studying the teaching of the Church that is promoted and protected by the apostles and their successors, the bishops. This well-formed conscience seeks to understand the truth and allows itself to be guided by the Holy Spirit. A well-formed conscience is devoted to doing God's will more than it is to supporting any particular political party.

As such, I wanted to write this letter to help you in forming your conscience in preparation for the vote that you will soon cast.

Our bishops have said, and I agree with them, that "the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family and because of the number of lives destroyed." (See the new introductory letter found in Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship: A Call to Political Responsibility from the Catholic Bishops of the United States, which can be found online at www.usccb.org.)

The consistent teaching of the Church regarding the intrinsic evil of abortion seeks to secure all other rights as well. We are not a "single issue" Church; there are other extremely important rights that we must defend, to be sure; but these additional rights flow from and are rooted in the fundamental right to life itself. St. Pope John Paul II stated, "Above all, the common outcry, which is justly made on behalf of human rights – for example, the right to health, to home, to work, to family, to culture – is false and illusory if the right to life, the most basic and fundamental right and the condition for all other personal rights, is not defended with maximum determination." (Christifideles laici, No. 38)

Our bishops noted in Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, "A Catholic voter cannot vote for a candidate who favors a policy promoting an intrinsically evil act, such as abortion, euthanasia, assisted suicide, subjecting workers or the poor to subhuman living conditions, redefining marriage in ways that violate its essential meaning, or racist behavior, if the voter's intent is to support that position. . . At the same time, a voter should not use a candidate's opposition to an intrinsic evil to justify indifference or inattentiveness to other important moral issues involving human life and dignity." (#34)

When we cast our vote, we must not remain indifferent to those positions and policies that would negatively impact religious freedoms, erode the traditional family, or make it difficult for the poor to access adequate education, housing and healthcare. We must carefully consider how to fix our broken immigration system, address the worldwide refugee crisis, preserve our natural resources, protect the environment and strive for humane solutions to global conflict and terrorism.

But, to be clear, although there are many causes our Church stands for and is vocal about, the right to life itself must be given our paramount consideration so that people can have the chance to secure all the other benefits that life can afford.

I humbly ask that you take my thoughts into consideration as you prepare to cast your ballot in the near future. Please ask the Holy Spirit to guide your decision, having before all else the desire to secure the common good for our nation and to do God's will in all things. I will pray for you and ask that you pray for me as we make our choice of civil leadership, hopefully with well-formed consciences. And, let us all pray for those who are running for election this cycle. May the Lord inspire them to be the best that they can be for all of us, for our nation and for our world.

"Ms. R", as her students refer to her as, is the new Physical Education teacher at St. Leo's.


