The book of Sirach was written by a wise teacher who lived 200 years before Christ. Sirach ran a school for young people in Jerusalem. In today's passage, he urges his students to make the right choices in life.

SECOND READING: 1 CORINTHIANS 2:6-10

Paul continues to address the Corinthian community who criticized him because, according to Greek standards, he lacked wisdom. To the Greeks, wisdom meant a certain pattern of logical reasoning that followed fixed forms. In this reading, Paul speaks of wisdom that is far greater than this.

ENCOURAGING A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE



It's often said that the Catholic Church lays heavy rules on her members, rules that can almost seem impossible. Mass every Sunday? No lying ever? Sexual purity all the time? I recently said to some non-Catholic friends that more than fifty adults were baptized at my parish at the Easter Vigil. One responded spontaneously with shock, "Why would anyone do that?" In other words, why would someone willingly place themselves in a system with such demanding and rigorous rules?

Of course, no one in the history of religions is more demanding and rigorous than Jesus himself. In the Sermon on the Mount, he says you have to be holier than pharisees or you're out. He says if you call someone a fool, you go to fiery Gehenna. He says you can't even look at a woman with lust or you're guilty of adultery (which was punishable by death). To top it all off, he says you can't even get divorced and re-married. Doesn't he know these are basically impossible demands? What world is he living in?

The new one, actually. He is the new world. Jesus' words aren't meant to condemn. They are meant to signal something new, a restored humanity. Jesus doesn't just give external laws; he gives us his Holy Spirit to internalize the law through love. He wants to fill us with his love. That's what the Church exists to do. *Love demands extraordinary things.* The "demands" of the Church only make sense because she is filled with Jesus' love. That wildly demanding love is why we are Catholic. — *Father John Muir*

Don't Live a Lie

One day, my son was explaining to his mother that he felt she had lied to him. It was nothing very important, but he wanted to take this opportunity to share how important telling the truth is to him. He explained that he simply tells it like it is in all aspects of his life. But an hour later, we caught him in a lie! Again, it was not about a matter of life and death, but it was a lie. When confronted with his own previous words on how important telling the truth was to him, he just smiled.

Yes, the guilty often have no words of defense. Jesus said it best in Matthew 5: "Let your 'yes' mean 'yes' and your 'no' mean 'no.'" He was warning his disciples about false oaths and then instructing them on the fullness of the Hebrew laws. We may try to do what we say and say what we mean, but it can be all too easy to fall short. We call ourselves disciples yet provide evidence to the contrary by our actions (or lack of them). Even if we feel that we have lied to no one, we may have lied to ourselves. We portray ourselves as generous, thankful, and loving people, yet fail to answer God's call in a situation because we perceive the cost to be too great.

Jesus did not simply mean for his message to be about two words. He also meant that when you say you are a disciple, make sure you are a disciple as well.

Feelings and Shiny Things

A friend of mine has a tradition on the first birthday of her children. Three items — a coin, a shot glass, and a rosary — are placed in front of the one-year-old, and whatever object he grasps supposedly bears insight into his future. A coin promises wealth, the rosary indicates holiness, and the shot glass...well, I'm sure you can guess.

Of course, the kid just grabs whatever looks coolest. They're not really choosing money or God or a party. Their choice is ruled by impulse.

These days, "I'm not feeling it," is a genuine excuse to avoid something. "I feel that," we say to indicate agreement. "I feel like..." is an acceptable way to offer our opinion. Feelings carry a lot of weight.

Before Christ, there was only the law, and the law dealt primarily with actions. Do this. Do not do this. All well and good. But with the fulfillment of the law, Christ wants us to look inwardly. He wants us to consider the influence of our feelings on our actions, and to understand how our chosen actions can, in turn, inspire certain feelings.

I'm a millennial, so, depending on your age, you may think that I feel either too much or too little. One thing I have learned, though, is that when I give my feelings free rein, my instincts immediately turn into actions. I become the toddler grasping at shiny objects with no thought for what they represent. Anger becomes unkindness. Jealousy becomes cruelty. Fear becomes selfishness.

Free will, I have come to understand, means freedom from the tyranny of feelings. If a feeling is strong enough, it can build a prison.

In fact, you are able to view any past live-streamed Mass or event for up to a year after it has been broadcast live (that is how long the company keeps the video available on their server). To view any past broadcast, just click the "Watch on Demand Video" link on the homepage of our parish website (leothegreat.org). Then just click in the search box and look up the name of the broadcast (such as the name of your deceased loved one in the case of a funeral Mass). We are also able to offer you the ability to have a copy of the video itself in MP4 format, which you can store & view on your phone, tablet or computer. However we need to provide the link for you to that from our rectory office so just reach out to me or to the Office Manager & I will be happy to help with that.

Today (if you're reading this on Sunday) is Super Bowl Sunday. I have to confess that I'm not a fan of watching these games anymore but I do participate in eating the food that generally accompanies such festivities so I ordered some subs that the Boy Scouts were providing for this occasion. Remember to pick them up in the school cafeteria between 9am and 1pm today. We were happy to have the Boy Scouts at the 11am Mass last Sunday and welcome Troop 24 to our parish! Please let us know if you have a son who would like to join this troop. I was a Cub Scout when I was younger & really enjoyed the friendships made and all that I learned. It's an admirable organization and I'm grateful to Mike Robinson & Marty Criscuolo for taking on this responsibility and for being adults that these young men can look up to.

One of my greatest joys in ministry is being able to share the truths of our Catholic faith with those who are seeking (or who actually are being sought!). Over my life, I continue to find such joy in the always-growing knowledge of God's love for me and for the world. 
