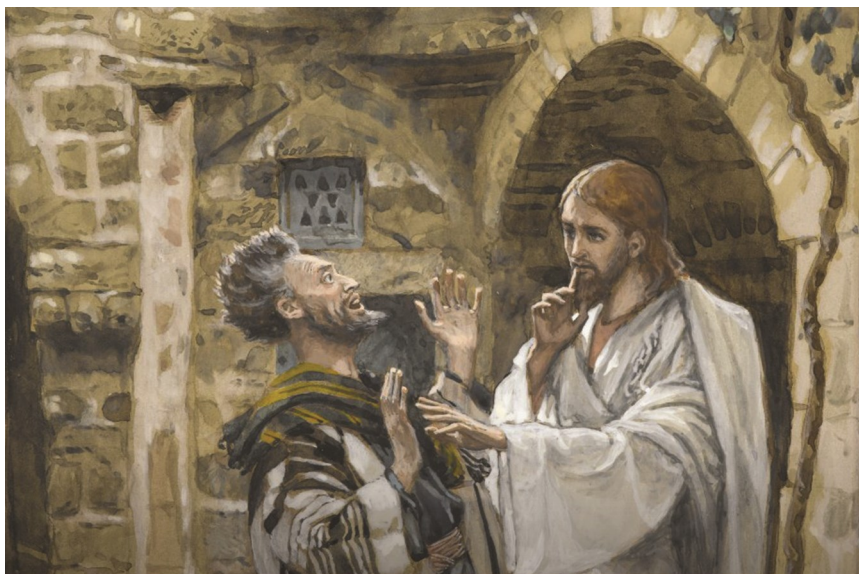

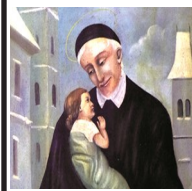

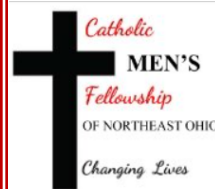

FIRST READING:

Job 7:1-4, 6-7 The Book of Job is a long parable which grapples with why bad things happen to good people. This question was especially crucial to people of that time because they didn't believe in life after death, and therefore one received reward or punishment in this life. Job has lost his children, his property and his health, and he lives at the city dump. In this passage, he gives an understandably pessimistic evaluation of life.

SECOND READING:

1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23 Paul's enemies frequently criticized him for the least little thing. At a time when most teachers received compensation for those they instructed, Paul was criticized because he refused financial support from the community. Because of this, they discredited him as not being a legitimate apostle. Today we hear his response.

REFLECTIONS | SACRED HEART COUNSELING

A common problem that I hear as a counselor is general frustration with the dating culture present in the world today. It is easy to get discouraged when we experience rejection, real or perceived, in romantic relationships. For those of you who might be unaware, many single people across generations have become increasingly discouraged by dating apps, social isolation, and the general dating culture that exists presently. These discouragements have become increasingly pronounced in the last decade, even moreso in the past four years following COVID.

I think there are two things that are important to remember that are hopefully encouraging. One is that dating right now is an uphill battle given the discouragements I have already mentioned and that we need to refrain from perceiving all failed dates or relationships as rejection. Sometimes, things just do not work out and it is not always because of flaws, shortcomings, or attractiveness. Often, it is as simple as a personality difference. The second is that we are loved for who we are right now by God and those around us and all we can do is take responsibility for whatever shortcomings we do have and continue trying to improve ourselves. It is a difficult line to discern- what is our fault and what is a result of the current dating culture? Hope is hard to hold onto when feeling discouraged in the world of dating, and praying for the gift of hope will help us discern, grow, and keep our chin up in the midst of the discouragement.—Luke Brown

Question: *Is gossip a mortal sin?*

Answer: To really ask this question, we must consider the Eighth Commandment: “You shall not bear false witness.” In its reflections on this commandment, The Catechism of the Catholic Church invites us to not only think about what bearing “false witness” means, but to also consider how we understand the truth and how we communicate more broadly. This is why so much of this section of the Catechism has to do with the gift of language.

With this in mind, we will notice that the word “gossip” isn’t used by the Catechism. Instead, we find the words “detraction” and “calumny,” which are actually two forms that gossip can take, and both can be quite serious. First, detraction is the of revealing “another’s faults and failings to persons who did not know them,” without morally valid reasons. Calumny, by extension, is saying something about another person that is untrue, and it is sinful because it “harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgements” (see no. 2477). In all of our communication, we have to always recognize that we have a moral obligation to the truth and to always work to protect the reputation and honor of our neighbors (see no. 2479). Gossip can, in fact, prove to be a very serious sin. After all, the Catechism reminds us: “No one is bound to reveal the truth to someone who does not have the right to know it” (no. 2489). When we have gossiped, especially if we are aware we have damaged another person’s good name or reputation, we want to make every effort to undo the damage we have done, including seeking the grace and forgiveness offered in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

REFLECTIONS FOR EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

Sometimes we can feel like we are living the life of Job: everything is going wrong all at the same time. Everyone finds himself or herself in a valley once in awhile. How we got there is not nearly as important as how are we going to get out.

Everyday stewards are called to be grateful for all things, large and small. It is easier to be grateful for obvious things like family, health, and life itself, than it is to look for the ordinary gifts in our life. When we cultivate a sense of wonder and thankfulness for the many little things in life we find ourselves more resilient in times of trial. We can look out our window and see all those gifts in creation. We can look around our home and see all the things people take too easily for granted. Imagine life without some of the simplest things like clothing, warmth, water, and furniture. There are people in this world that long for all of those things. But God has given them for your benefit and for you to share with others.

Before Lent begins in a couple weeks, take the time to create a list of at least 10 things that you normally take for granted. Keep that list handy and maybe add to it from time-to-time. When life seems hard and that cloud seems to hang over our heads, bring out the list and let gratefulness lift you up and out of your plight so that once again you can be about your Father's work. —Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

If you want to make me really, really angry, you are sure of doing so if you tell me about an old woman who was sick, but felt a little better, and then her son-in-law and all his buddies showed up, so she cooked them a bunch of food and cleaned up after them.

We all project our own feelings, fears, insecurities, and desires onto the word of God. I certainly do. And most of my feelings, fears, insecurities, and desires spring from my current role as a tired mom of little kids.

I think there is a fear inside many of us of God’s purpose for our lives. What if it’s not aligned perfectly with what we think we need, or what we imagine we want? Most of the time, I think I need a nap, and I imagine that I want absolutely no one asking me for any kind of help. FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Parishioners,

Last Saturday I celebrated the funeral Mass for Potenciana Carranza (nicknamed "Naty") who was 99 years old. She and her husband Ven had 6 children, 19 grandchildren and even great-great children. She was "Auntie" to many nieces, nephews & friends. When she prayed for these members of her family, she would mention each of them by name, just as God calls each of us by name, according to Scripture. She ran a family business in the Philippines before coming to the United States in 1978. She was faithful to attending Mass & had a devotion to St. Anthony of Padua. Let us intercede for her that she may join with St. Anthony in the praise of God.

This Saturday, February 3rd, is the feast of St. Blaise. As is our custom, we will have the blessing of throats after each of the Masses this weekend. Please come up the center aisle in 2 lines during the closing song if you would like to be blessed. Here is some information about St. Blaise which can be found at catholic.org:

Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebastea and a doctor. The first known record of the saint's life comes from the medical writings of Aëtius Amidenus, where he is recorded as helping with patients suffering from objects stuck in their throat. Many of the miraculous aspects of St. Blaise's life are written of 400 years after his martyrdom in the "Acts of St. Blaise."

Saint Blaise is believed to begin as a healer then, eventually, became a "physician of souls." He then retired to a cave, where he remained in prayer. People often turned to Saint Blaise for healing miracles.

In 316, the governor of Cappadocia and of Lesser Armenia, Agricola, arrested then-bishop Blaise for being a Christian. On their way to the jail, a woman set her only son, who was choking to death on a fish bone, at his feet.

Blaise cured the child, and though Agricola was amazed, he could not get Blaise to renounce his faith. Therefore, Agricola beat Blaise with a stick and tore at his flesh with iron combs before beheading him.

Congratulations to Lucas Russell who is being baptized this Sunday. We welcome him into the family of God's Church. May he and his family know the love of God through each other.

I'm currently reading a book I bought when I was at the Evangelization gathering this past summer in West Virginia. It's called "Friendship and the Fathers" (referring to the early Church Fathers) and speaks about how the Church grew in the first few centuries from the friendships that Christians made with others. But the book begins by pointing out why this is important for us to know today. It says that in 1985, Americans could name 3 people they considered to be close friends and confidants. But by 2005, one in four Americans could not name one close friend with whom they could discuss their thoughts or struggles. In 2018, the British government announced that it was going to treat loneliness as a public health crisis. We are more connected to more people than in any other time in human history, but we don't feel connected at all. We may have hundreds of friends on Facebook but still feel lonely. Social media has trivialized the very meaning of friendship. When Christianity was an illegal underground movement it spread from friend to friend because that was the only way it *could* spread. Friendship takes work. Especially friendship with God because it requires prayer and presence. Thank God for the friends in your life today & ask yourself how good of a friend you are to God.
