





First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

Today's passage takes us back to the beginning verses of the Acts of the Apostles and sets forth the themes that Luke is going to develop throughout this, the longest book of the New Testament. His major theme is the role of the Holy Spirit, who enables the apostles to be effective witnesses to Jesus. (The Holy Spirit is mentioned 57 times in the Acts of the Apostles.)

Second Reading: Psalms 47:2-3

On Yom Kippur, the high priest sacrificed a goat on the altar in the temple. Then he took some of the blood into the holiest place in the temple sanctuary where only he was allowed to go. There, he sprinkled the blood as a renewal of the covenant made at Mount Sinai, and prayed that God would forgive all their sins committed during the previous year. This ritual is the backdrop for today's reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

**GOSPEL MEDITATION -
ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE**

May 29, 2022 | 7th Sunday of Easter

Unity and diversity can exist together. Our western minds have a grave difficulty seeing unity without conformity. We tend to believe that unless everyone believes the same thing, assents to the same body of truths, styles, and opinions, unity is not possible. Jesus, in today's Gospel, expresses a tenderness and an intimacy that the disciples actually can witness. This same tenderness and love are also reflected in his desire for unity and oneness. Jesus passionately wants all to be one. It is very clear that the success of Jesus' mission and the advance of the Gospel rises or falls with whether this unity is achieved. And it is a unity that is achieved around a person and not particulars.

Our church is extremely divided. These divisions all center on various theologies, philosophies, structures, and styles. We allow these particular concerns and interpretations, valid as many can be, to drive wedges between us and put us at odds with each other. They enrage us and cause us to lash out at other members of the Body of Christ. Differences are bound to exist in any group. We are unique and diverse people. Staunchly clinging to particular agendas and ideologies while waving the "we're right, you're wrong" banner as we forge ahead in battle does little to advance the real mission of Christ. We are perceived as weak, fractioned, self-focused and serving, and lacking empathy and love. How can the work of salvation be accomplished like this? We sacrifice our credibility. For what?

"I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end." These words describe exactly who the glorified Christ really is. Jesus wants us to see this glory! Believe this! This is the unifying principle that draws the Body of Christ together as one, not our particular preferences of worship! We give too much power to our preferences, and all too easily forget that the real mission of Christ is much more than that! If we can work at truly loving each other as members of Christ's Body despite the differences that can so quickly divide us, then maybe we'll a bit more convincing to those who do not believe. The Risen Christ comes to us through the Eucharist. It doesn't matter where or how. Gather wherever you can and receive. We cannot substitute Jesus' passion with our own. We are one.

ST. LEO THE GREAT- CLEVELAND, OHIO



Dear Parishioners,

Whether at home or abroad, this pastor's column needs to be submitted to the bulletin editor on the Tuesday prior to the weekend. So I write this from the Holy Land, specifically from Bethlehem. It has only been 5 days that we have been here visiting the sacred sites, but these five days have been packed with so many incredible experiences which will soon become lifelong memories. I look forward to sharing what I have learned here with you over the coming years as I continue to proclaim the Word of God whom I have encountered in a new and graced way while here.

For now, I can offer you some quick highlights. We began by seeing the Basilica of the Annunciation in Nazareth, the home of the Virgin Mary, just a stone's throw away where Joseph had worked, and we celebrated Mass there. We went to the site in Cana where Jesus, his Mother and his disciples had been invited to a wedding and where he performed his first miracle according to St. John's Gospel, the transformation of water into wine. There I lead several couples (including my sister Janet and her husband, whose wedding I had celebrated 35 years ago last Monday!) in the renewal of their wedding vows. Also, amongst the couples renewing their vows there were Pete & Advia Turlop, who were married by my cousin Father Dan Schlegel several years ago, and Tom & Lu Anne Lahiff, also members of St. Leo's. I had the wedding for 2 of their sons and baptized a couple of their grandchildren. We also went to Mount Tabor, the site of the Transfiguration of Jesus which is celebrated every year on my birthday, August 6th. I'll have some special pictures to show you from that experience.

We also celebrated Mass outdoors at the Mount of Beatitudes where Jesus gave his well-known sermon. We saw the place where he performed the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish. We took a boat ride across the lake where Jesus walked, known as the Lake of Genesareth or the Sea of Tiberias. We went to the Church of Peter's Primacy (where he declared his love for the Risen Lord 3 times after his 3-fold denial of him after the Last Supper). We saw the ruins of the Synagogue in Capernaum where Peter lived and fished. We celebrated Mass at Mount Carmel as we saw there the cave of Elijah the prophet and honored Mary under the title of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

The climax of the journey at this point was going to the Church of the Nativity here in Bethlehem where Jesus was born. There is a 14 point star marking the place of his birth and an altar over the manger where he lay. We also celebrated Christmas Mass there! We sang in the church which marked the place where the angel spoke of Jesus's birth to the shepherds and saw the cave where they kept their sheep. We saw the place where Mary visited her cousin Elizabeth & where her son John the Baptist was born. Finally (up till now), we went to the site of Jesus's baptism by the Jordan River as we renewed our baptismal vows and celebrated Mass in the home of Martha & Mary, the sisters of Lazarus whom Jesus raised from the dead. We saw the Mount of Temptations and learned about the Dead Sea Scrolls before going into the Dead Sea, the lowest place on earth.

We can hardly keep track of the number of places we have visited so far but there is more to come as we make our way to Jerusalem this morning. And I don't want to miss breakfast as I need my strength for today's journey so I will end here as I pledge our prayers for you and experience the fruit of your prayers for us again today.

God's Game of Telephone

You've probably played the game of "pass it on" before, maybe years ago on the playground. It's a simple concept: one person whispers something in another person's ear, and it gets repeated person by person throughout the group, until finally the last one to hear the message has to say it out loud. Whatever ends up being said at the end of the game is usually a far cry from the original statement, and everyone has a good laugh.

As individuals, we don't receive news in the same way. Our personalities, our histories, our weaknesses, and our strengths determine how we interact with information we encounter in the world, both good and bad. One person will interpret a compliment positively; someone else will take offense. One person reacts to news of a job promotion with joy, another is disappointed that now they will have less time with their family. The same news can mean completely different things to different people.

But what God gives us is the truth in love, and the truth in love is the same in every place and in every time, for every person of every race. When Christ prayed to the Father that "the love with which you loved me may be in them," he was asking that the magnificent gift that had been imparted to him would also be imparted to us.

Our job is to play a game of pass it on with this gift of love. How do we keep it from becoming warped? Through remaining committed to the word of God, to the sacraments, and to one another.

In this game, we don't change the message. The message changes us. And we have to give it away to keep it.



St. Joan of Arc | May 30

St. Joan of Arc (1412 – 1431) has had her story told throughout history through many books, movies and plays. She was born in the village of Domrémy, near the province of Lorraine, to a French peasant family. At a young age, she began to experience visions and voices, which were later identified to be of St. Michael, St. Catherine of Alexandria, and St. Margaret of Antioch. At the age of 13, all three saints told her that she was to drive the English from French territory, and that she must bring the Dauphin to Reims for his coronation. Trusting in God, she did as she was told.

During the Hundred Years War, St. Joan of Arc led French troops against the English and recaptured the cities of Orléans and Troyes. Captured near Compiègne the following year, she was sold to the English and placed on trial for heresy and witchcraft, eventually being found guilty and burned at the stake in Rouen.

St. Joan of Arc was canonized by Pope Benedict XV on May 16, 1920, and is the patron saint of military members.
