


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INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

FATHER JOHN A. OCILKA



Father John A. Ocilka 62, a former Parochial Vicar here at St. Leo the Great, died on July 17th.

Bishop Emeritus Martin J. Amos of Davenport, Iowa

was the main celebrant at his July 22nd funeral Mass at St. John Bosco Church. Father David Liberatore, pastor emeritus of St. John Bosco Parish, was the homilist.

Father Ocilka was born on Oct 30, 1957 to the late Al and Gladys (Barnfield) Ocilka. He was educated at Holy Family (Mt. Pleasant) School, Cleveland; Chanel High School, Bedford; South High School, Cleveland; Borromeo Seminary, Wickliffe: and Saint Mary Seminary, Wickliffe. Bishop Anthony M. Pilla ordained him to the priesthood for service to the Diocese of Cleveland on May 28, 1994.

Father Ocilka is remembered as a joyful priest whose smile was infectious. He dealt with chronic illness for the last few years and remained optimistic throughout. May he rest in peace.

Our statue of St. Francis of Assisi has arrived and hopefully will be in place by this weekend if we have determined the best place for this saint who was a lover of God's creation. Thanks again to all those who donated generously toward our landscaping efforts this summer!

As I mentioned last weekend, our Holy Father, Pope Francis, has named Bishop Edward Malesic as the 12th Bishop of Cleveland and he will be installed as such on September 14th. As I watched the announcement of his assignment and his first Mass at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist last week on TV, I was impressed with his characteristic gentleness and kindness. Besides coming to us from our neighboring state of Pennsylvania, he also attended a seminary in Ohio. The number of Catholics and priests in our diocese is five times as many as the Diocese he is coming from but we'll try not to let that overwhelm him. We look forward to having him officially as our new Shepherd in September when we will begin to pray for him by name in the Eucharistic Prayer at Mass.

For those who are watching Mass at St. Leo's from their home, I wanted to let you know that although the audio is very clear now, if you would like the assistance of closed captioning which shows text on a television or video screen which transcribes the audio being spoken, this is generally available to you as you watch Mass being celebrated. It should always be available if you watch the on demand videos but we're trying to make it available as the Mass is being live-streamed as well. It is not 100% accurate as it is computer generated, but it will do a respectable job transcribing the audio.

ST. IGNATIUS LOYOLA

This week we celebrate a spiritual master! Not only is St. Ignatius Loyola the founder of the Jesuits, but the legacy of his life of prayer -- now called Ignatian spiritualty -- inspired believers the world over. Injured as a young soldier, Ignatius spent his time in recovery reading the lives of the saints. They inspired his soul to holy heroism, changing his life forever. Ignatius gathered a group of friends who also desired to be "contemplatives in action," finding God in all circumstances. This became the Jesuits -a great missionary and teaching order. Ignatius himself was constantly attuned to his own inner promptings. This self-knowledge -- open to the movements of the Holy Spirit -- led him to be an incredibly astute spiritual director. For Ignatius, recognizing God as the first principle of one's life determined everything. How has God changed you?



LIGHTING CANDLES IN CHURCH

· Question:

Why do Catholics light candles in church?



Candles have been part of the Church's worship from the earliest times. In the days before electricity, candles and oil lamps were the ways that people lighted buildings. Even today, we often still depend on candles during power outages, relying on their flickering flames to bring light into the dark.

Like our ancestors, we also light candles on special occasions. Think about a festive family meal or a romantic dinner for two — there will often be candles on the table, special objects for a special event. We light candles on birthday cakes and carry them in processions. We also place candles at makeshift memorials that appear when there has been an accident or act of violence. In these moments, their light casts aside a different kind of darkness — the darkness of grief, fear, and death.

The custom of the early Christians lighting candles and lamps at the tombs of the martyrs gave way to the practice of having candles at Mass, honoring the sacredness of the celebration.

As Christians decorated their worship spaces with statues and icons, they would burn candles in front of sacred images and the relics of the saints, basically "shining a light" on what they held to be sacred. When pilgrims would visit these shrines, they would often bring candles to light before the image or relic. These candles came to be a symbol of the person, and their prayer and the burning of these candles came to be understood as an extension and continuation of the prayer that was offered. What began as a practical way to provide light has come to be a symbol of the hopes, desires, loves, losses, fears, and faith of everyday Christians offering their prayers to God and his saints.
