



READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: ACTS 2:14, 22-23

None of the scripture readings during the seven-week Easter season are from the old testament. But the Acts of the Apostle, which is read every Sunday during Easter, frequently quotes Old testament passages which the early Christians saw as fulfilled in Jesus. Today's reading gives part of Peter's sermon at the first Pentecost. Peter quotes from Psalm 16 which, like most of the psalms, was popularly thought to have been written by David.

SECOND READING: 1 PETER 1:17-21

The Christians for whom the first letter of Peter was written were recent converts from paganism. They found themselves a small minority in pagan surroundings. Their neighbors and local authorities made life miserable for them. Today's passage offers encouragement by reminding them that Jesus died and rose for them.

I always feel a little sad when someone begins to speak to me with the words, “Father, I know you’re so busy, but ...” It happens a lot. And I get it. He or she is trying to be respectful of my time. Have you ever felt like you weren’t doing the work you should be doing? We have all had jobs that leave us feeling unfulfilled. Bored. Dreading the next day. We may even experience a sensation of unfamiliarity, of being unable to recognize ourselves.

Most of us have also been lucky enough to have a job that we love — a vocation, a calling that makes us look in the mirror and think, This. This is who I’m supposed to be. I recognize this person.

For me, that work is the work of marriage and motherhood. The hours are terrible, the pay is even worse, and my coworkers are frequently disappointed in me — but it doesn’t matter. The road to Emmaus is one of my favorite Gospel stories because it shows a Jesus that is masterful at reaching people. HEART OF A SHEPHERD

TESTAMENT TO FAITH & FORTITUDE: SEMINARY RENOVATION RIBBON-CUTTING AND BLESSING

Years of planning, fundraising, deconstruction and construction – all part of the Heart of a Shepherd Campaign – culminated on Dec. 2, 2022, when Bishop Edward Malesic blessed the newly renovated Saint Mary and Borromeo Seminaries.

There was a sense of joy in the crowd of about 200 benefactors, seminarians, seminary faculty and staff, pastors, representatives of religious orders and diocesan staff members.

“Investing this much into the seminary lets people know we intend to stay here,” Bishop Malesic said. “We form our seminarians to have courage, strength and faith. We want to ensure that they have the best environment to pursue their priestly formation. This is a place where they can form lifetime friends with each other and Jesus.”

Father Mark Latcovich, president and rector of the seminaries, and Rick Schultz of St. Mary Parish in Hudson, chair of the Heart of a Shepherd campaign, also spoke. After evening prayer in Sacred Heart Chapel and a reception in the Founders’ Room, visitors enjoyed tours of the newly renovated seminary.

The Heart of a Shepherd campaign was an extraordinary endeavor, one that had its share of twists and turns.

It began in 2018 as a \$30 million initiative to provide funding for much-needed seminary updates, the priest retirement fund and to help newly ordained priests burdened with student debt. But when the COVID-19 pandemic hit in early 2020, the campaign expanded to help parishes fund their pressing needs. In a show of enormous support, generous donors far exceeded the original goal, raising more than \$52 million with \$12.9 million of that to support the parishes.

“We thought there would be only 4,000 donors, but not in our diocese. There were 13,520 donors,” Schultz said. Bishop Malesic credited the late Bishop Anthony Pilla for developing a vision to renovate the facilities. The bishop and Schultz both expressed gratitude to all those who took leadership and support roles in the Heart of a Shepherd campaign.

Faith Formation students and their families had their hands full last Sunday making Communion Bread (7 Loaves) together.



Recipe for a Communion Bread (7 loaves)

2 cups hot water
2 Tbsp olive oil
2 Tbsp honey

1 Tbsp molasses
1 Tbsp salt
5-6 cups of wheat flour

Mix all of the ingredients minus the wheat flour in a mixer. (I use a Bosch mixer with dough hook). Slowly add flour until the dough wipes clean off of the sides of the bowl. Mix for 5-7 minutes.

Divide recipe into six to seven equal balls. One at a time, take the dough ball and pat into a 1/4 inch thick circle. Take a fork and pierce the dough with stripes and a cross. (Don't skip the piercing step or the bread will ruin.)
Bake at 400 degrees for 14-20 minutes. Cool on a rack. Wrap well and freeze until needed.

Bread will be slightly chewy. If you desire crispy communion bread, roll out very thin and bake longer. The benefit of chewy bread is that it doesn't crumble.
