


INDEPENDENCE DAY MASS




Former pastor Fr. Fiala was such an advocate for unborn children that he wrote the following prayer:

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FRIST READING: JEREMIAH 20:10-13

The Prophet Jeremiah lived about 600 year before Christ. He prophesized that Israel, because of its unfaithfulness to God, would be defeated by the Babylon. When this began to happen, many of his friends and neighbors denounced him as a traitor and turned on him.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 5:12-15

Paul's letter to the Romans is his most detailed and important theological work. His purpose in this passage is not to teach about original sin, but to contrast Adam and Christ. From Adam we inherited a strong pull toward sin. From Christ (the "new Adam") we received a gift that is incomparably stronger: Divine grace.

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

When I was in middle school, there were times I didn't want my fellow students to see my parents drop me off or pick me up in the school parking lot. I was embarrassed of my parents. Why? I have no idea. Maybe it was our station wagon. Or I didn't want to look like a little kid. But in retrospect that was a silly thing to do. I was a kid. And I had two parents who loved me and had built a wonderful family. I was afraid of the other kids' judgment. How silly! I should have been afraid of forgetting or downplaying my family, which is where my identity had its deep roots.

This is a way to understand Jesus' words to his disciples this Sunday, when he says, "Don't be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna." Fear, in this sense, refers to where we find our deepest identity and our highest love. That's why Jesus says next that when we acknowledge him before others, he will acknowledge us before the Father. It doesn't mean we're brash or boastful. But rather we unhesitatingly and humbly embrace our identity as followers of Jesus and children of God the Father. EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP "Will You Say Yes?"

Would you have cultivated, grown, and shared your faith enough that anyone would even consider you worthy of asking the question? They might assume you don't know Jesus Christ at all. I don't like conflict and do not seek out conflict, but I would rather someone ask the first question posed than assume there is no reason to confront me in the first place.

PRACTICING CATHOLIC "The Necklace"

I have a necklace that originally belonged to my great-grandmother. I don't really know much about the man who gave it to her, most of those details have been lost to time. But I know that he wanted to marry her, and that she refused, and it had something to do with religion — ultimately, he did not share her faith. And while I've certainly seen many interfaith couples have loving and successful marriages, in this particular case, my great-grandmother discerned that this would not be one of those marriages.

Like I said, I don't have many details about this man, but I know that she felt she couldn't marry him because it might jeopardize the souls of her children, and therefore the souls of their children, and their children after them — me. She turned him down because of me.

My great-grandmother never sold that necklace, not even when the Great Depression further reduced her financial circumstances. She kept it, and she gave it to her daughter, who gave it to her daughter, who gave it to me. The necklace is always given with a warning: there is something worse than being poor, worse than being scared, worse even than being desperate. Worse than all of these things is separation from God.

When I wear this necklace, I think about my grandmother and this man she possibly loved a hundred years ago. I think of the many decisions we make every day — large and small, good and bad — that reverberate down through the generations in ways we cannot, at the time, imagine. I think of the God who knows every hair on my head.

Dear Parishioners,

Last Monday I celebrated the Mass of Christian Burial for Tannie Cosiano. Tannie, whose baptismal name is actually Gaytano (and I never knew that!) lived a very full and faith-filled life. I remember expressing my condolences to her just 2½ years ago when we celebrated the funeral Mass for her husband Ralph. They were married for 62 years but knew each for over 70. They have 6 children, 11 grandchildren & 2 great-grandchildren. Tannie was a teacher for 25 years, and taught 23 of those years at our neighboring parish, St. Charles. So much could be said about her life and her faith, like that of her husband. Please pray for them both that they may be reunited now in the presence of their Creator.

Hopefully you are noticing the new windows that are being installed in our school on the Broadview Road side of the building. They are replacing very old and worn windows that go back to the beginning of our school in the 1950's, and will be far more energy efficient besides attractive. These windows will modernize the look of our buildings all around.

The 2nd set of glass block windows are being installed on the south side of the gym as well and will include some venting (required for the grants we were able to get to help pay for them). This will complete the work in there and will again go a long way not only towards the look of this large room but toward the efficiency of the heat and air conditioning as well.

The landscapers were here for several hours this week, ripping out weeds, mulching and making everything look beautiful for us to enjoy during the summer months. I am very grateful to the parishioner who has generously provided us with several yards of mulch free of charge again this year. Our thanks to you for this annual gift! I believe you will find that the holes that were created in the parking lot over the winter months have all been filled in. Let us know if you see anything we may have missed.

We have contracted to have the sloping roof repaired and painted this summer...everything you see of that gold-ish color will be replaced with the original grey color. We are happy to have a former parishioner doing this work for us.

As we take care of many inside and outside projects on our property this summer, let us remember that God desires not only that we enjoy the rest and beauty of the summer months, but that we also continue to express our gratitude to him as we gather each week for Mass. I know it's easy to let vacation and just the laziness of the summer days keep us from being faithful to that, but remember that God calls us to do this not for his sake but for our own. God is not in any way in need of our praise, gratitude or worship. The beauty of God is that He needs absolutely nothing from us. But we are the ones who need God, who need to acknowledge daily that all good gifts come from His hands & that we deserve nothing of what is so generously given to us. What God asks of us is so little compared to all that God gives us. Why do we hesitate to give back so little of our time, our attention, our love? Please continue to remain faithful during these summer months so that the fullness of God's gifts may be enjoyed.


