MEMORIES

When it came to Confirmation, the nuns always wanted to please the Bishop so they made sure that the selected names were of saints or a slight variation -- Mary, Patrick, Francine (as a variation of Francis), or Jack (as a variation of John) were all acceptable. On the day of Confirmation, we approached the Bishop one by one, the Confirmation name was whispered, the Bishop anointed us, and a sign of peace was exchanged. Everyone in the congregation strained to hear the whispered names selected by the Confirmandi. As one particular candidate stepped forward, the name was whispered -- a name that was very unusual, had only the slightest connection to a saint's name and probably did not get the prior approval of the nuns. The Bishop was so caught off guard that he exclaimed the name loud enough for the entire congregation to hear. It took him a second or two to regain his composure and resume Confirmation.

WHY ARE THERE LITURGICAL CYCLES?

QUESTION:

Why Does the Church Have Different Liturgical Cycles?

ANSWER:

While most Catholics know that the Church Year is divided into various seasons (e.g. Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time, etc.), many are unaware that the one Church Year is not like the one that follows. While the main seasons and feasts are the same from year to year, the 3-year cycle for Sundays and the 2-year cycle for weekdays means that, as a general rule, the readings in the Lectionary that we hear at Mass will change from year to year, helping us to have a richer encounter with Sacred Scripture. Each new cycle begins with the beginning of the liturgical year, the First Sunday of Advent.

The reasoning behind this innovation is outlined in Sacrosanctum Concilium, the "Dogmatic Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy" of the Second Vatican Council: "The treasures of the bible are to be opened up more lavishly, so that richer fare may be provided for the faithful at the table of God's word. In this way a more representative portion of the holy scriptures will be read to the people in the course of a prescribed number of years" (no. 51). This was fully achieved in 1969 when the new cycles of readings were approved by Pope Saint Paul VI. READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: ACT 1:1-11

Today's Passage takes us back to the beginning verses of the Acts of the Apostles and sets forth the themes that Luke is going to develop throughout this, the longest book of the New Testament. His major theme is the role of the Holy Spirit, who enables the apostles to be effective witnesses to Jesus. The Holy Spirit is mentioned 57 times in the Acts of the Apostles.

SECOND READING: EPHESIANS 1:17-23

Ephesus was an ancient city located on the western coast of what is today Turkey. Paul visited there several times. Today's passage, which is near the beginning of the letter to the Ephesians, is a prayer asking God's blessings upon that community. Many thoughts in this prayer are connected to today's feast of the Ascension.



A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE



Traditionally, the four writers of the Gospels are symbolized by four creatures that make their way into Church art and architecture: Matthew, an angel; Mark, a lion; Luke, an ox; and John, an eagle. These images can be found in churches across the world, a nod to those who recorded the stories of Jesus for us, thousands of years ago.

Today's Gospel was written by John. There are a few reasons why John is symbolized by an eagle, but my favorite explanation is that his writings soar like an eagle into the sky with their beautiful, poetic language. The prayer we hear today is no different — Jesus invokes God in a long discourse that might seem mystifying at times, the same way that a poem can be perplexing to understand when we are unfamiliar with the pacing or format.

Consider holding onto the shortest sentence in this prayer: "I pray for them."

Jesus prays for us. For me. For you. Let that sink deep into your being.

Jesus is on your side. He is aware of what you are holding at this moment. He is aware of your pain, your faith, your mission. And He's rooting for you. This prayer was recorded thousands of years ago, far before you were born. Since before you were born, you were held in prayer. With that certainty, we live. — Father John Muir

Seeking Christ in One Another

The funeral luncheon, the Irish wake, the vigil at an ailing loved one's bedside: in times of crisis, people gather. In moments of sadness, fear, and confusion, we gravitate toward one another. For some reason, the feelings are so much more bearable when we are not alone.

I'm sure that the disciples and their companions, gathered in the upper room after the Lord's Ascension, did all of the things we typically do at these functions. I'm sure they hugged and talked and shared food, processing together the remarkable events they had witnessed.

But we don't hear about any of that. We hear only that they prayed — fervently, and together.

Saint John Paul II famously said that "it is Jesus that you seek when you dream of happiness; He is waiting for you when nothing else you find satisfies you." And I think that, whenever we gather, in good times or in bad, we think we are seeking companionship — but we are actually seeking God.

As I think back on the last few crisis-gatherings my family has had, I try to remember when we have stopped everything to pray together. I can think of a few times, but to be honest, they are too few. We are usually occupied with more practical tasks: planning the funeral, talking to the doctor, making the decisions, ordering the food. Just trying to survive through it.

But this is the busywork of sorrow, and it is a waste of our time. We would do better to follow the example of the disciples and remember that, in these dire moments, God is waiting for us.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP
Jesus' Great Commission

I remember watching part of a college graduation address where the speaker said "With this degree you are commissioned to go into the world and make a difference." The imagery conjured up in my mind by the use of the word "commissioned" was pretty powerful. I thought about the commissioning of military officers and the responsibility they took on for the lives of their subordinates but also the lives of those they protected. To me the word meant something very serious and solemn.

It meant huge responsibility and expectation. In the Bible, Jesus gives what we call the Great Commission "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Mt 28:19-20a)

The word commission makes this more than a suggestion or a hope. There is an expectation, a responsibility, and a mandate. Of course, did you wake up this morning thinking about how you would fulfill the Great Commission today?

Sharing the faith is not just something we should do; it is something we must do. The key is that you don't need to speak all the time to share. It will be through your life of stewardship that others will be able to see Jesus. By giving of yourself, by always responding to the call, and by surrendering all to God, you will lead others to become disciples, to seek out the sacraments, and to observe his teachings. Yes, responding in full to the Great Commission, great things can happen.

Dear Parishioners,

On Wednesday, May 10th I celebrated the Funeral Mass for Margaret Habrat and so extended our sympathies to the family. Marge & her husband Jack were married just shy of 50 years when he died in 2016 (I celebrated his funeral Mass as well, and that of his sister Beverly). I remember how devoted Marge was to her husband, following him from one medical facility to another in order to be with him during his illness. Marge & Jack were founding members of our parish and sent their 4 children to our parish school. Both were also Eucharistic Ministers. Besides their two sons and two daughters, they had 13 grandchildren & 2 great-grandchildren. We pray that both Marge and Jack may be found worthy of eternal life.

On Saturday, May 13th, I celebrated a Funeral Mass for Ronald Horvath, the brother of Judy Krahn, a parishioner of St. Leo's. Ron enjoyed time with his family and with his friends. He also enjoyed nature, gardening and cooking. I would see him when I visited the home where he lived with his mother whom I would anoint from time to time. She has passed as well so we pray they may be together again in God's kingdom. Let us pray for Ron and for all those who have gone before us that they may enjoy the presence of God who promises that those who believe in him will have eternal life.

The 8th graders took a trip to Our Lady of Lourdes Shrine in Euclid. I have such fond memories of that sacred place from my childhood when we would drive there and spend time in prayer with my grandmother who lived in Euclid and who enjoyed making trips there. I remember walking up and down the hills as we prayed the stations of the cross, holding candles as we did so. I remember saying the rosary there and drinking water that flowed down from the rocky grotto where there was a statue of the Blessed Mother. Of course it is named after Our Lady of Lourdes as it replicated the place in Lourdes, France where Mary appeared to St. Bernadette and encouraged her to pray the rosary. I hope you get a chance to visit that place of prayer sometime and to ask for Mary's intercession for you and your loved ones. Again we honor her especially during this month of May and ask her to pray for us and with us. How can her own Son deny her requests on our behalf?

Today I am grateful for the opportunity to confirm 6 young people of our parish during the 11am Mass. In the past we have celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation on Saturdays during the 4pm Mass (and will do so again next year) but the Bishop had allowed us the opportunity this past year to have the Pastor confirm instead of himself since it was becoming difficult for him and the abbot and retired bishops to visit all the parishes of the diocese to celebrate confirmation. We have another bishop now (Bishop Michael Woost) to assist Bishop Malesic so this is just a one-time permission given for me to administer this sacrament this year. But I'm happy to do so and I thank the confirmandi and their parents for their cooperation with our new preparation for this sacrament. I am really grateful for their willingness to try something new and to cooperate with us in this new venture, encouraged by Bishop Malesic. They have been faithful to the Sunday Faith Formation sessions and have participated regularly at our 11am Mass as well (which is why we are celebrating Confirmation during that Mass this weekend). So congrats to the young men & women & many thanks to their parents!

Happy belated 48th wedding anniversary to Deacon Pat & Joan Berigan who celebrated their anniversary on May 10th. May God grant them more years with each other and with us.





WHAT IS HAPPENING?

A proposed amendment to Ohio's Constitution claims to recognize reproductive freedoms, but it furthers a culture of death and removes current safeguards for women. As Catholics, we find the proposed amendment dangerous, unjust, and contrary to our belief in the sacredness of all life.
