READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: EZEKIAL 34:11-12, 15-17

Ezekiel preached to Jewish exiles at Babylon in the sixth century before Christ. They were a disappointed people and they blamed poor leadership for getting them into this mess. In this passage, Ezekiel uses a popular biblical image of God, that of a shepherd who cares for the sheep.

SECOND READING: CORINTHIANS 15:20-26, 28

In his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul addresses problems his converts in the community were experiencing. Some members had questioned the bodily resurrection of Jesus and their own resurrection as well. This passage is Paul's response.

REFLECTIONS | SACRED HEART COUNSELING

The holidays are upon us and I hope everyone had a great Thanksgiving! A common complaint I hear around this time of year is that people are struggling with family members. Old grudges are present, new additions may not be accepted, some family members may choose to not be present, and tensions can be at an all-time high. When these struggles are present, they can take away from the entire holiday spirit of generosity, hospitality, and focus on Christ. They can also leave us with deep wounds and feelings of rejection and failure. The impact is often felt on our mental health and spiritual lives as well. The difficult part for me as a counselor is that there is never a simple answer to these issues. The only thing we can do is continue to do our best to love others despite the differences that arise between us. Sometimes that means continuing to welcome those family members that are challenging or do things that we do not agree with. At times it means setting healthy boundaries and laying some ground rules for the upcoming event such as refraining from discussing political topics, using the event as an opportunity to confront someone, or gossiping about other family members. Try your best to not let family struggles keep you from focusing on the significance and meaning of the holiday. Also, remember that you are not the only family that has these issues. As with most of these things, people do not often talk about them and we can feel like we are the only family that struggles. As we approach the holidays, consider praying and discerning how to best handle potential familial struggles, and remember that counseling is a great place to discuss these issues and brainstorm potential solutions. Please know of my prayers for you and all of your families during the upcoming Advent season!

Q&A with Bishop Robert Barron:

Understanding 'the reality and importance of God'

What is an event from your childhood that helped you understand who God is? *When I was 5 or 6 years old, I saw my father, whom I considered the most powerful force in the world, kneeling in devout prayer, invoking someone that he considered more powerful than himself. That moment permanently shaped my sense of the reality and importance of God.*

What is your favorite movie/book/play/musical/art/sport/etc. right now? *"Mrs. Davis" is an impossibly quirky and theologically very questionable show, but I absolutely love the idea of a committed nun, who regularly communes with Jesus, taking on the soulless A.I. algorithm to which the whole world has surrendered. Everyone refers to Mrs. Davis as "she," but Sister Simone knows that the correct term is "it."*

What's something that people might not know about you? *When I was a doctoral student in Paris, I used to give tours every Wednesday at noon at Notre Dame Cathedral.*

If you had not become a priest, what other job/vocation/career could you see yourself in? *When I was a kid, I wanted to be a professional baseball player. When I was in high school, I thought I would be a lawyer/politician.*

What's a lesson you've learned from the life of your favorite saint that is most applicable to your life today? *My favorite saint is Thomas Aquinas. He's a touchstone figure for me, both intellectually and spiritually. The most important lesson I've learned from him is to make a prayerful relationship with Jesus the foundation for everything I do or say.*
