



MEMORIES

Roll back to December 23, 1988. The Art & Environment Committee was decorating the church for Christmas. “Wait, you mean we can’t put those candles in the niches? Because we have no shelves? But we have curtain rods for the banners.” That was the dilemma of the evening—no shelves! I called my Dad, who could fix anything, and asked him to come up to the church about 8:30 pm. I showed him what we needed. He took a few measurements and came back shortly. He’d made a shelf and attached a small board to slide the shelf into one of the open spaces between the bricks in the niches. It was perfect! Now, Dad, can you make 7 more tonight? Well, he went home, cut the wood and assembled a few more and returned to the church. The next morning he finished the rest of the shelves and we put them in the niches and put our candles and decorations on the shelves! And for the last 35 years, those shelves are still used and are still in the niches thanks to my Dad, Edward F. Wolff! Whenever I’m sitting in the church, I look at those niches and know my Dad surrounds me.

2024 MASS INTENTIONS BOOK

This system is in place to best accommodate the special intentions of all our parishioners. Sanctuary Candle Intentions will also be available for \$10 (to cover cost of candle replacement).

*"It's wonderful that so many wish to have Mass offered for themselves or on behalf of another (living or deceased) but we only have so many Masses per year and so must limit how many intentions you can have. And of course several people may want Mass to be offered on a particular day because it someone's anniversary of birth or death or for some other reason, but we must understand that there is only 1 intention per day (except possibly on Sunday when there may be 2). **Though it's important to us to remember a person prayerfully on a particular day for sentimental reasons, God is beyond time and so will hear our prayers whenever they are offered. We must all accept the limitations of time and we appreciate your understanding and cooperation.**" -Fr. Jim*

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: SIRACH 27:33-28:9 The book of Sirach was written by a wise teacher who lived 200 years before Christ. Sirach ran a school for young people in Jerusalem. In today's section, he teaches his students the importance of forgiveness.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 14:7-9 After dealing with the controversies which divided the early Christian community in Rome, Paul wrote about the need for tolerance and for sensitivity to the feelings of others. In today's passage, he points out that this affects our use of the gift of freedom.

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

In Matthew 18:21-35, we find a powerful lesson on forgiveness, a theme that resonates with mental health and emotional well-being. The passage tells the parable of the unforgiving servant who, after being forgiven a massive debt by his master, refuses to show the same mercy to a fellow servant who owes him a much smaller sum. The master, upon learning of this lack of compassion, condemns the unforgiving servant, emphasizing the importance of forgiving others as we have been forgiven. Reflecting on this passage, it reminds us of the weight that grudges and unforgiveness can place on our mental health. When we hold onto anger, resentment, or bitterness, it's like carrying a heavy burden that constantly weighs us down. These negative emotions can fester, leading to anxiety, depression, and strained relationships. Saint John Paul II once said, "To forgive is not to condone, it is to refuse to allow the past to dictate the future." It is not about excusing or forgetting the harm done to us, but rather about liberating ourselves from our own negative emotions. Forgiveness is an act of self-compassion; it allows us to free our minds from the torment of bitterness and to make room for healing and growth. In the context of mental health, forgiving others can be a powerful tool for reducing stress, anxiety, and depression. It does not mean that we ignore or minimize the pain we have experienced; instead, it means choosing to let go of the emotional baggage that comes with holding onto grudges. By doing so, we open ourselves to the possibility of inner peace and emotional well-being. In this passage, we learn that forgiveness is not just a moral obligation but also a path to emotional healing and mental freedom. By following the example of Christ, we can release the weight of unforgiveness and find solace in Saint John Paul II's wisdom, allowing our past to guide us toward a healthier, more hopeful future.

Life was not always easy with my father when I was growing up. Let's just say he made many decisions along the way that led to fear, anger, and sadness for my family and me. Unfortunately, I was the only one in the family that would years later truly forgive him for his actions. My mother and sister held onto the resentment and anger they felt all their lives. For my father and me, reconciliation led to several years of a deepening relationship before his passing in 2011.

Forgiveness is not easy and I do not consider myself better or stronger because I was able to forgive and my family members could not. However, I can say that the blessings I received due to forgiveness and a renewed relationship with my father were far better than the animosity experienced by others. I also learned that forgiveness benefited me far more than my father.

As good stewards of time, we must realize that each passing day will never come again. What we do with that time is completely up to us. We can be wise and use it to build bridges, heal wounds, and cultivate love where there is hate. We can also choose to waste time in fear, resentment, and anger. I thank God often for the gift of my dad. However, I thank God more for the gift of time spent with him and the ability to see him not with my human eyes, but with the eyes of Jesus.

LEARNING CHRIST

Teach me, my Lord, to be sweet and gentle in all the events of life: in disappointments, in the thoughtlessness of others, in the insincerity of those I trusted, in the unfaithfulness of those on whom I relied. Let me put myself aside, to think of the happiness of others, to hide my little pains and heartaches, so that I may be the only one to suffer them. Teach me to profit by the suffering that comes across my path. Let me so use it that it may mellow me, not harden nor embitter me; that it may make me patient, not irritable, that it may make me broad in my forgiveness, not narrow, haughty and overbearing. May no one be less good for having come within my influence. No one less pure, less noble for having been a fellow-traveller in our journey toward eternal life. As I go my rounds from one distraction to another, let me whisper, from time to time, a word of love to You. May our life be lived in the supernatural, full of power for good, and strong in its purpose of sanctity. Amen.



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners,

I celebrated a Mass of Christian Burial on September 8th for Patrick Lynch. It was an appropriate day to celebrate his life of faith as it was the feast of the Nativity or Birthday of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Pat had a devotion to her and so prayed the rosary daily and carried it with him. Last weekend some people from Blessed Sacrament Parish (which closed a number of years ago) came to the 11am Mass and admired the stained glass windows in our church, which they once viewed in Blessed Sacrament Church. I pointed out to them that 4 of those windows are devoted to the earthly and heavenly life of Mary, and again I often point that out to people when their loved one's casket is placed in the center aisle, between those 4 windows. Pat was married for 27 years to Bonnie (also deceased) and had 2 children and 2 grandchildren. May they imitate his faith and so be able to join him some day in the life of heaven.

I enjoyed spending some time in our parish school during the first week it was opened for the new school year. My goal is to be more present there as much as possible. It is good to see the building filled with teachers and students and I pray that we may develop there a community of people who learn, love and grow in faith.

This past weekend was our first Faith Formation Session in the Parish Community Center. This is how the children of our parish receive their religious education if they attend a public school, and is also sacramental preparation for all 2nd graders who wish to receive their First Holy Communion and for the 8th graders who wish to be Confirmed in 2024. We are grateful to their parents for their willingness to grow in their own Catholic faith by attending these Sunday Sessions with their children. They will then attend the 11am Mass together. This new process of offering religious education and sacramental preparation worked very well last year and we are glad to continue it this year. Please feel free to ask me any questions you may have about our religious education (formerly called "PSR" for "Parish School of Religion"), and about our new approach to sacramental preparation.

I am finishing a week's vacation this weekend so I won't be with you for Mass today but as always I'm grateful to the priests who are willing to cover for me on the weekend when I am away.

Sadly, routine blood work taken for Michaela last summer indicated that she had high liver enzymes, something common in many dogs. We tried to treat it with a new diet which did not contain copper sulfate, an ingredient that is included in many dog foods and treats. Unfortunately this did not help and a couple weeks ago I noticed that her stomach was distended so I took her to her vet who said that she is in liver failure. She had gained 2 pounds and 1 liter of fluid which the vet removed. However, besides taking some prednisone (steroids) to reduce inflammation, there is nothing that can really be done for her. She will be turning 11 years old on the 26th of this month. Right now she is comfortable and pretty much her same self though I've noticed she is not as interested in going for walks, likely due to the retention of fluid in her abdomen. I am so grateful for the joy that she brought me over the years and for the protection of all enemies, foreign & domestic, that may be on our property or enter our rectory office. I will continue to enjoy her as long as she is still with us (weeks or months?). Some of you remember her surprise appearance during Mass a few weeks ago during a storm. She always brings a smile.

A series of miraculous encounters re-ignited his faith and now fuel his inspirational talks.


Since departing secular radio, Trapper has used his microphone to share his faith through uplifting presentations, the *Touched by Heaven* podcast, and *Men's Morning Light* on YouTube.

ST. LEO'S MUSIC MINISTRY—THE EARLY DAYS



St. Leo's has had a music program since almost its very beginning. Bernard (Bud) Burke, the parish's first organist, created his own job when he asked Fr. Sylvester Lux, the parish's first pastor, if he needed an organist. Bud was a former silent movie organist at the Palace Theater. He was succeeded by Herb Fox, and the all-male choir slowly picked up female singers. Myron Rosby, seen earlier among the builders of the frame church, is the gentleman with the violin.

In the 1970s, the choir was attired in robes. How many do you recognize? By the 1980s the music ministry eventually developed into large organization, which included cantors, a guitar group, and a bell choir. —John Sabol
