

FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 18:15-20 | The events in today's reading take place as the Israelites are camped on the shore of the Jordan River ready to enter the Promised Land. Moses is near death and is giving final instructions. He promises that after his death, God will still be with them through another prophet. Both Jewish and Christian readers have seen this as referring to the future Messiah.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 7:32-35 | In this section of the first letter to the Corinthians, Paul is responding to their question about whether it is better to remain single or become married. Paul's belief was that when you became Christian, you shouldn't take on a new state in life since he expected Jesus would return in glory very soon.

REFLECTIONS | SACRED HEART COUNSELING

In Northeast Ohio, this time of year can be really difficult. No, I am not referencing the Browns. I am talking about the cold and general lack of sunlight. When I moved here from South Dakota, I thought winters would be the same, if not milder and easier. I learned quickly that, while the temperature might have been colder, we at least had the sun in South Dakota. Here in Cleveland, it seems like we can go weeks without seeing the sun sometimes. From what I have observed as a counselor, January and February are generally two of the most difficult months of the year, and self-care becomes even more important. When it comes to self-care, I think it is best to think of it in terms of recreation. The root word of recreation is re-creare, which means So, with self-care, what are we trying to to re-create. recreate? Hopefully, we are trying to recreate our energy, motivation, and love of God and neighbor. When we think of it in these terms, it helps us to evaluate what the best forms of selfcare are for us. For me, I know there is a very different feeling after watching Netflix for two hours versus watching Netflix for eight hours. If I stop at two, I feel much more rested and ready to tackle the next thing. If I stop after eight, I feel lethargic and lazy. So the question is this- what recreates in you what you want to be recreated? When it comes to self-care, we often think first of things like relaxing, treating ourselves, or entertainment. However, difficult things can be very recreational such as cleaning, exercising, or charitable actions for others. It all depends on the person! This week, consider reflecting on self -care and ways that you can potentially improve your recreation during this difficult time of year. —Luke Brown



COMMUNION & MORTAL SIN

Question: I have a friend who receives communion, but who I know for a fact is in a state of mortal sin. Should I tell our priest? Is it my responsibility to say something?

Answer: While we may always want to do what is best for our friends and family members, we have a responsibility to respect their privacy and their conscience. In its reflections on the Eighth Commandment ("You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor"), the Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "Respect for the reputation of persons forbids every attitude and word likely to cause them unjust injury. [One] becomes guilt: -of rash judgment who, even tacitly, assumes as true, without sufficient foundation, the moral fault of a neighbor; -of detraction who, without objectively valid reason, discloses another's faults and failings to persons who do not know them; of calumny who, by remarks contrary to the truth, harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgments concerning them" (no. 2477).

We will never truly know what is in a person's mind, heart, and soul; only God knows those things. We should, of course, take our concerns to God and entrust the person about whom we are concerned to God's grace and mercy. If we have concerns about the spiritual wellbeing of someone with whom we are close, we should go to the person themselves and talk about our fears and concerns. Unless it is a case of abuse or endangerment (which we have a moral and even legal responsibility to report to the appropriate authorities), we ultimately do not have the freedom to share another's persons faults or sins, however good we think our intentions might be.


