First Reading: Jeremiah 1:4-5; 17-19

Today we hear about Jeremiah's call to be a prophet. It came when he was quite young. It also came at a time of turmoil when Babylon was in the process of conquering the entire Near East. That's why Jeremiah felt uneasy about the call. God, however, refuses to take "no" for an answer.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13

We will recognize today's passage from first Corinthians as one that is often read at weddings. Actually, the context is not marriage, but squabbles in the Christian community in Corinth over whose spiritual gifts were most important. Paul goes to the heart of the matter.

Dear Parishioners,

Though a couple of months late, today the new awnings we ordered last summer were finally installed. I believe they will be a great help in identifying buildings & their proper entrances while at the same time blending in with our current architecture. One is located at the Broadview Road entrance of the school building & says "Main Entrance." We already have a sign to the right of these doors which identify the building as our Parish School. There is also an awning on the parking lot entrance of the school building by the cafeteria & Junior High wing which says, "School Entrance." The one on the Parish Center (the old convent building) says "PreSchool" and "Community Center" as it serves both of these purposes. A corner awning on our gym entrance says "Lux Hall" on one side and "Gym Entrance" on the side facing the parking lot. Finally, the one on the building where I am currently working says, "Rectory Office." Each of these has our parish logo (the blue & gold cross surrounded by an oval of the same colors) in the middle. I hope you also believe they serve a needed purpose while enhancing the appearance of our parish buildings.

Unfortunately our Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, scheduled for last Sunday evening, needed to be cancelled due to the inclement weather. The purpose of this time of prayer was to pray for the minds & hearts of pro-abortionists to be converted and to pray for the women who are expecting and in need of financial, emotional and spiritual help during a difficult time. Please remember to include this intention in your personal prayer today.

When there is bad weather, usually due to a snowstorm which makes driving both difficult and unsafe, I strongly encourage you not to risk your life (or that of others) when you otherwise would have planned to drive to church. This would be true for either weekend or weekday Mass. Better to join us via livestream when the weather (or your personal health) would call for you to remain home. We will try to let you know via our website when it would be wise for you to remain at home due to bad weather, as we did this past week when the parking lot was not yet plowed before the 8:30am Mass on Monday as it had just started snowing early that morning before the snow plows were able to clear our parking lots. So please remember that the first place to look for the most current and timely information would be on our website (leothegreat.org). If you are technically challenged, please feel free to call the rectory office to inquire about morning Mass, but you may not be able to reach us if the rectory office is closed. We may be able to provide a number for you to call for such inquiries and I'll let you know about that in this space soon. The most important rule is: do not risk your life or health in coming to Mass, as much as you would like to be here or we would like to have you here.

I feel it necessary, when encouraging you to use our livestream technology, to also caution you about using that technology irresponsibly. I have frequently encouraged you to join us via livestream if the weather or your health demands it, however my fear (which is shared by several priests and bishops during this time), is that people will depend on such technology while at the same time still going out in public. Of course going to a doctor's appointment is understandable, but the presumption is that if you are trying to stay safe by watching Mass at home, neither are you visiting other public places unnecessarily. It's like the rule my mom had when we were young: if you're too sick to go to school, you're too sick to go out to play. Only you can judge your own personal circumstances, but I do need to caution you that it may become too easy to think that live-streaming is a suitable substitute for attending Mass in person, as you are lacking the presence of the Church community while at home as well as the sacramental presence of Christ in the Eucharist. So please take this into prayerful and serious consideration. By all means use live-streaming when necessary, but know the importance of being with your fellow parishioners to receive Holy Communion whenever possible.

But despite the fact that you’ve probably heard it at many weddings over time, First Corinthians isn’t just for newlyweds. It wasn’t written for married folks. It’s for every single one of us, in every state of life and every social situation, in every country and culture and language across the globe.

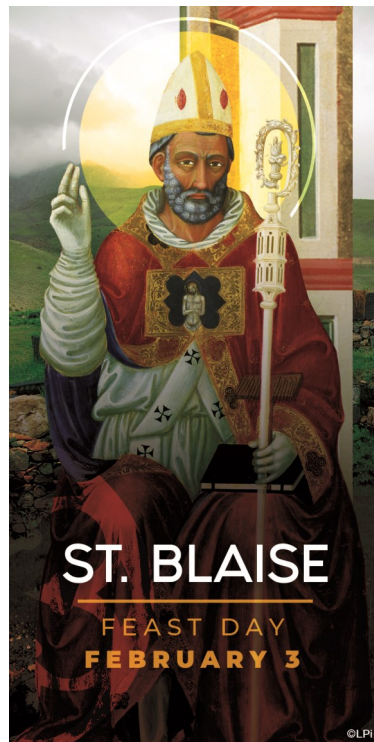
Which means that First Corinthians is even for the online world. It’s for Facebook and Twitter and Instagram and all the other platforms I’m forgetting (there seems to be a new one every day, doesn’t there?).

A sense of division — whether rooted in politics, culture or anything else — is growing in our world, and it’s never more obvious than when we observe interactions online. It is far easier, after all, to remember what love is when a human being of flesh and blood stands before us. When all we see is an avatar or a profile picture on a screen — especially accompanied by an opinion with which we vehemently disagree — even the most loving Christians can throw First Corinthians out the window.

As everyday stewards we know that we are charged to be not only gracious but grateful. We receive others but we also give thanks for what they bring to us — even if that’s an opportunity to “strive eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts.”

So before the next time you post anything online, I suggest giving First Corinthians a read — and remember, love never fails

St. Blaise | February 3

You may be familiar with the annual “blessing of throats” that many parishes in the United States use to commemorate the beloved bishop and martyr. St. Blaise lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. Due to religious persecution, he was forced to flee and hide in a cave in the back country in order to save his life.

History has it that one day a group of hunters stumbled upon where St. Blaise was living. They found the bishop kneeling in prayer, surrounded by wolves, lions, and bears that he had tamed. The legend has it that as the hunters dragged Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise’s command, the child was able to cough up the bone and thus lived.

Today we remember the saint on his feast day by taking two candles, crossing them against the throat, and saying the following prayer:

Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

January 30, 2022, 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

St. Oscar Romero (1917-1980) was a “Salvadoran Roman Catholic archbishop who was a vocal critic of the violent activities of government armed forces, right-wing groups, and leftist guerrillas involved in El Salvador’s civil conflict (Encyclopedia Britannica).” As a voice of the voiceless, he was an outspoken champion of the poor who were the ones most affected by the civil unrest and violence. His advocacy provoked several attempts on his life. Nonetheless, St. Oscar Romero was convinced that before all else his faith in the resurrected Christ and the values of the Gospel trumped any earthly concern or worry. He walked with complete confidence and trust. On March 24, 1980, St. Oscar Romero was assassinated while celebrating Mass. Such is often the fate of those who challenge the socio-political agendas of the day.

We may look at the example of witness of St. Oscar Romero as something extraordinary. In one sense it is. Through the power of God, an ordinary human being did extraordinary things. But, in and of himself, St. Oscar Romero was simply a humble, loving servant of God. Oscar knew not only the power of love but the risk that comes when loving unconditionally. The beauty of God’s message was able to shine in and through him because he was able to step out of the way and be a vessel. One can assume that for St. Oscar Romero, one’s earthly life has no merit when faith, integrity, conviction, zeal and love are jettisoned. Fear and apprehension had no grip on this man who not only saw but spoke the truth.

Do we speak the truth? It makes us feel good to speak of God as love. But have we ever considered the ramifications of this radical message? There are assaults on human life occurring daily. More and more the value and worth of a human being is being reduced and minimized. We are becoming widgets in the production of life. In our whole simple humble ways, we too are called to be prophets. Knowing who you are and what is within your means to do, how can you make God’s love real, stand up for what is right, and give witness to the sacredness of all that is around you?
