






ALL SOULS DAY HOLY HOUR

First Reading: Deuteronomy 6:2-6

The events in today's reading take place as the Israelites are camped on the shore of the Jordan River ready to enter the Promised Land. In a lengthy farewell speech, Moses stresses that they are to remain faithful to the Lord after they have settled in their new land. The final words of this passage are especially dear to Jewish people who recite them several times a day, attach them to their doorposts, and wear them on their person.

Second Reading: Hebrews 7:23-28

There were daily sacrifices of animals in the Jerusalem temple. These were offered by many priests who, when they died, were replaced by others. The author of the Letter to the Hebrews contrasts this with Jesus whose one sacrifice on the cross was for all people of all times.

Dear Parishioners,

I was just trying to think of something scary to begin this column with, given that it's Halloween weekend. But then I just

received a text message from someone telling me that a very good friend of mine was just held up at gun point. Thank God he is OK. But the gun was literally held to his head. I couldn't even image what that would be like. This man is in his 40's & lives in San Diego, CA and I'm his confirmation sponsor. Living in today's world is such a scary thing. So much violence and crime, sin & evil. Sadly this has always been the case in human history, which is why we turn all the more in thanksgiving (especially next month) to the God who was willing to enter our sinful world, and even become victim to the worst of violence imaginable at the time...torture and death by crucifixion. To me, these are the thoughts that need to come immediately to our minds when we hear of such tragedies in our lives so that we begin to see God in everything that happens to ourselves and to our loved ones. We continue then to pray for all victims of violence...abortion, murder, sex trafficking, racism, sexism, and everything else that seeks to do harm to the God-given dignity of every living thing on earth. We do so again at the very end of this month of October, a month set aside as "Respect Life" month and a month when we ask for the intercession of Our Ladv who gave birth to the Author of Life himself.

Monday, November 1st, is the feast of All Saints, a holy day...but because it falls on a Monday this year, it is not a holy day of obligation this year. But you are welcomed and encouraged to join us for the one Mass that we will have at 8:30am, along with the children of our parish school (half will be in attendance in the church & the other half will be watching from their classrooms via livestream). This is a wonderful time for us to again celebrate with thanksgiving all those holy men & women whose praises are sung in the scriptures and who have been shining examples to us throughout the history of the Church. Remember to ask your patron, the person(s) you may be named after, to pray for you on this day. Remember to seek the intercession of our parish patron, St. Leo the Great, of St. Vincent de Paul, St. Anne, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Michael the Archangel, St. Joseph, St. John Vianney and of all the other saints whose statues in our church or on our property remind us that we are not alone in our journey of faith, on our journey of holiness, on our way to God's kingdom. Did I miss any one in that list? May they all pray with us and for us that we may draw close to God as they did.

On Tuesday, November 2nd, we celebrate the feast of All Souls, or more accurately, the feast of All the Faithful Departed. We will list the names of all those who have died from this past year on our website and in the church, where you can include in a book, the name(s) of those deceased whom you would like to be remembered in the month of November during all of our Masses. A basket containing the envelopes you have filled out with the names of deceased will also be displayed by this book. Let us pray for all of these men, women & children who have died & who await the fullness of joy, of holiness, of glory and of eternal life as God readies them for his kingdom.

Question:

What is a pilgrimage? Why do people go on them?

Answer:


A pilgrimage is a spiritual journey to visit a holy site, such as the shrine of a saint, a place where the Blessed Virgin Mary has appeared, or an historic church or chapel. What makes a pilgrimage different from a vacation and a pilgrim distinct from a tourist is the spirit in which the journey is made. Pilgrimages are really a symbol of our spiritual journey in life, reminding us that this world is not our true home and that we spend our lives journeying to our homeland, which is the Kingdom of God.

Pilgrimages — which can be as involved as a trip to Rome or the Holy Land or as simple as visiting the Blessed Sacrament in a local parish church — are also an opportunity for us to step out of the rhythms and limits of our daily lives to seek out connection with God in a special way, by visiting a holy place. At times, such as on a special feast, a jubilee, or the anniversary of the dedication of the church, special graces (called "indulgences") can also be offered to pilgrims, helping to enrich our experience of the celebration.

In the end, pilgrimages are an ancient act of devotion and something that each of us can put into practice, helping us to discover how God is present in the world around us, in places both near and far.

St. Charles Borromeo | Feast Day November 4

St. Charles Borromeo (1538 - 1584) is most known for living during the time of the Protestant Reformation and helped influence reform of the whole Church during the final years of the Council of Trent.

Although St. Charles Borromeo belonged to nobility, he greatly desired to serve the Church. In 1559, his uncle was elected Pope Pius IV. He made Charles cardinal-deacon and administrator of the Archdiocese of Milan. At the time, Charles was a simple student, but because of his intellectual qualities, he was assigned several important offices connected with the Vatican. After the death of his brother, he decided to become a priest and was ordained at age 25. Soon after he became bishop of Milan.

Quietly working behind the scenes, St. Charles Borromeo is credited with keeping the Council of Trent in session and encouraging the pope to renew the Council in 1562, after its 10-year suspension. Afterwards, he devoted his time to serving in the Archdiocese of Milan.

Among his most important actions during his life, St. Charles Borromeo established seminaries, colleges, and communities for the education of candidates for holy orders. His emphasis on Catholic learning greatly increased the preparation of men for the priesthood and benefited their congregations. He died at the age of 46.
