#### First Reading: Genesis 22 1-2, 9, 10-13, 15-18

Events in today's reading took place approximately 1800 years before Christ. In that pagan culture, child sacrifice was common. That's why Abraham believed God wanted him to sacrifice his only son Isaac. Later generations constantly looked back to the event as an example of Abrahams's great faith.

#### Second Reading: Romans 8:13-34

Today's reading is part of a hymn that celebrates God's love and which concludes the eighth of Paul's letter to the Romans. In our first reading, we heard how God spared Abraham's only son; in this passage we will hear how, out of love for us, God did *not* spare *his* only son.

#### Dear Parishioners,

This Wednesday, December 8<sup>th</sup>, is the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary, a holy day of obligation & the Patronal Feast Day of the United States of America. We will have an all school Mass at 8:30am and a Mass at trend one of these 2 Masses or to join us via

7pm. Please be sure to attend one of these 2 Masses or to join us via livestream.

Congratulations to Ryan & Melissa McNamara on the baptism of their son, Daxton, which took place on November 27<sup>th</sup>. May Daxton live the faith his parents profess and practice themselves and so know happiness in this life and eternal joy in the life to come.

Unity Catholic Federal Credit Union gifted St. Leo's with \$150 as part of their Giving Back Auto Loan program. They started this program in 2014 and give us \$50 for every parishioner who finances a car through them. We had three parish members mention St. Leo's when getting their loans so we thank them for their support.

We now have 40 people signed up for our pilgrimage to the Holy Land in May of 2022! The 30 person group limit was raised to 40 and may be raised again so if you are considering this opportunity, you may want to get signed up as soon as possible, even if that means being on a waiting list. I am really looking forward to this experience and recently heard from a couple of people who were just there & they were so glad to have had the opportunity to be there. Let me know if you have any questions about this trip.

Christmas this year falls on a Saturday so I thought I would let you know in advance our liturgy schedule for this feast which is now only 3 weeks away. We will have a 4pm Mass on Christmas Eve which will be on Friday, December 24<sup>th</sup>. On Saturday, Christmas Day, Mass will be at 8 and 11am. Though we also had a 7pm and 10pm Mass on Christmas Eve in years past, I don't believe these will be necessary given the continued lower number of people coming to church due to COVID. Many people are still participating in weekly Mass via livestream, and while I am happy that many are taking advantage of that opportunity, I ask you to consider whether that continues to be a necessity for you. It is far better to be physically in the church for the sacred liturgy, most especially so that you can receive Holy Communion which is the climax of this solemn prayer. But it is also very important to be with your fellow parishioners and to join the Catholic Community in person. While some still have good reason to avoid being around others due to the risk of COVID because of advanced age or serious health issues, I wonder if others are becoming too accustomed to "watching" Mass at home due to convenience. I invite you to prayerfully and seriously consider this personal decision & to return to Mass in the church, especially if you have been vaccinated and your current health situation does not pose a great risk for you. As the pandemic lingers, we still encourage but do not mandate the wearing of a mask to cover your nose and mouth (& masks are always available at the doors of the church). We hope that by Christmas, the vast majority of parishioners will be physically present in the church to receive the Eucharistic Sacrament and to be reunited once again with fellow Catholics as we pray the Mass together & in person.


God is the guest of honor in our life, the keynote speaker, the main event. And what He wants — what He needs — to do is to change our hearts. Constantly, over, and over again.




## St. Nicholas | Feast Day December 6

St. Nicholas of Bari (March 15, 270 – December 6, 343), the bishop of Myra in the fourth century, is the saint that Santa Claus is modeled after. Known for his kindness and generosity to the poor, the story has it that St. Nicholas once tossed bags of gold through the open window of a poor man's house to help his daughters avoid a life of prostitution.

According to legend, the gold landed in stockings dangling on the corners of the beds, which is why many of us celebrate St. Nicholas Day by hanging stockings and filling them with candy, fruit, and small toys.

Not much else is known about this beloved saint, but regardless, his reputation as a generous man continues today.



## **GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING**

## OF SCRIPTURE December 5, 2021, 2nd Sunday of Advent

St. Ambrose shares some wisdom on our need to prepare the way and open the door for Christ. "You see that when the Word of God knocks hardest on your door, it is when his hair is wet with the dew of the night. In fact, he chooses to visit those who are in tribulation and trial, lest one of them be overwhelmed by distress. So, his head is covered with dew, with drops, when his body is laboring hard. It is important to keep watch so that when the Bridegroom comes, he is not shut out. If you are asleep and your heart is not keeping watch, he will go away without knocking; but if your heart is alert for his coming, he knocks and asks for the door to be opened to him." When life gets overwhelming and difficult and we find ourselves feeling a bit downhearted and miserable, these words can bring great comfort.

We sometimes choose to remain stuck in our uncomfortable darkness and being stuck becomes our norm. In this time of self-focus our hearts are closed to the graces and life God desires to give us. Wrapped in the robe of mourning and misery, we fail to see the mercy, justice, and love the Bridegroom wants to bring. If we take seriously the need to prepare the way for Christ and open our hearts in preparation for his visit, we can hear God's gentle voice calling us deep within. It beckons us to seek out its source and discover the inner calm and peace that can prevail over the darkness of despair. Sometimes our darkness is so dark that it may seem unsurmountable. Trusting in the spiritual friends who journey with us, and God's promise may bring a glimmer of light even when it is most difficult to keep our hearts' doors open. Sometimes, the only light in the darkness is found in trusting the faith of others both past and present.

We have to trust that God has already begun the accomplishment of good work in us and that humanity is on an incredible journey to something wonderful and awesome. God is not done. When we open the doors of our hearts, straighten the paths of our lives, and prepare the way, Jesus can come with God's simple gifts of peace, grace, and joy. Life throws a great deal at us. It is easy to get tired and confused. We have to train our hearts to keep watch, discern what is of value, and forge ahead. Not allowing ourselves to become so weighed down by things and brought out of focus is a tremendous goal to achieve this Advent season. God is knocking. Answer the door. You will see and understand life in ways you never thought possible before.
