

In this reading we hear of Saul and David. Saul became the fist king of Israel, about 1,000 years before Christ. David, best known for slaying Goliath, was also a talented musician and became one of the favorites at Saul's court. Eventually the king grew jealous of the popular David who had to flee for his life.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:45-49

Paul's converts at Corinth had a lot of questions about life after death, and on the last two Sundays we've heard Paul addressing this. Today he uses a parallel. Just as we receive our human life from our ancestors-ultimately Adam – so we received risen life from Jesus, who could be called the 'new Adam'.

Dear Parishioners,

I spoke with someone regarding our speaker situation in the church. We both agreed that the system we currently have is working pretty well for us, though we will be adding a small speaker that faces the sanctuary

(altar) area so that Deacon Pat & I can hear better as all the speakers are currently facing the nave where the people sit. He made a couple of adjustments to my wireless microphone so that it won't cut out (there was interference with something else) & raised the volume a little bit. But it seems that lectors, cantors & musicians are not always speaking close enough to the microphone or projecting their voice sufficiently as the feedback I received from several people was that most of us can be heard loud & clear but that some people have a voice that is on the softer side. So I'll just ask the cantors & lectors to speak a bit louder & closer to the microphone but also ask you to give them some feedback (excuse the pun) if you are finding it difficult to hear or understand them.

I received a good response from people regarding the open positions we have for workers in the parish and believe we now have the people in place who will make good additions to our rectory and school staff. I just received an email from the Finance Office of the Diocese letting the priests know that they are aware that many of us are looking to hire more employees and offering their assistance so this is something commonplace in parishes throughout the Diocese. I do ask however that you also consider volunteering in the parish if you have a gift that you think would be beneficial for the community. It can be anything at all that you believe you are good at or that you enjoy doing. Just let me know what you may be interested in contributing & I'll be happy to keep a list for future reference. We hear in the Scriptures that God gives everyone certain gifts and talents for the sake of the building up of the community. What a wonderful thing it is for me to hear someone say that they would like to contribute in some way, based on what God has given them. So please keep that in mind.

Last week I celebrated the funeral Mass for Irene Venesky, a long-time parishioner of St. Leo's who has lived away from the parish in recent years due to her health. Irene was a very gentle soul who would help out with socials when we had First Communion and Confirmation celebrations and for other occasions. She donated several of the statues we have in our church in memory of her sister Catherine who died some years ago. May she now rest with the saints in God's heavenly kingdom.

We welcome three of our parish school students who received the sacraments of initiation at our Monday morning Mass last week: Alexandra, Andrea & John Tehoke. They were all baptized, confirmed and received their first Holy Communion during that Mass on Valentine's Day, a good day to celebrate the love God has for them and the love we strive to have for God and for our neighbor. We are happy to have them as part of our Catholic Faith and as members of our parish community here at St. Leo's.

Congratulations to the parents of Mila Rogers who is being baptized this Sunday after the 11am Mass. We also rejoice in her new relationship with Christ and the Church and ask God to bless her parents who will be her first and best teachers in the ways of faith.

This weekend we have our annual Catholic Charities Appeal. I can't stress enough how important this is to the many needy people in our own Diocese who will benefit from our financial help. Thank you in advance for your generosity in meeting the needs of our neighbors.


GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

February 20, 2022 7th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sometimes, Jesus' teachings don't seem to make practical sense. When we hear things like love your enemies and do good to them, turn the other cheek when struck, give to anyone who asks, do to others as you would have them do to you, be merciful, stop judging, forgive, and give to others, we get a bit unsettled. After all, it's okay for God to do all of these things, but does He really want us to do them, too? Many good-hearted Christians really draw the line with some of these ideals and say, "No way!" They even remark that if someone did something hurtful to someone they loved, they would have no reservations seeking severe retribution. There is still this persistent thinking, even among those who consider themselves Christian, that a violent action deserves a violent response. Somehow, we continue to justify this.

Yet, it is most clearly against the very grain of the Gospel. Part of our difficulty has more to do with understanding God's love. We wrongly think that sinful or hurtful actions and evil people somehow are seen as lesser in God's eyes. They are not. God loves the sinner as much as He does the saint. And, both of these inclinations exist in every human being, even those who consider themselves holy. Both the capacity for good and the disposition toward evil exist in every one of us. Viktor Frankl has this to say when reflecting on the Holocaust: "Our generation is a realistic generation because we have learned what a human being really is. When all is said and done, man is that same creature who invented the gas-chambers of Auschwitz; but he is also that being who walked upright into those chambers with the prayer 'Shema Yisrael' on his lips."

If we believe in God, we have to act like God. Whether we like that idea is another issue. If we don't then perhaps, we need to reconsider our faith and whether we really believe in Jesus Christ. We are made in the image of God, not the image of ourselves. The Christian must, at all costs, leave resentment and the need for retaliation behind, lose defensiveness and bring into the mind and heart the realization of who we represent in this world



St. Polycarp of Smyrna | February 23

As a disciple of St. John, the Evangelist, St. Polycarp was able to hear about Jesus' life, death, and resurrection directly from those who witnessed it. Because Polycarp was ordained as Bishop of Smyrna by St. John, he is one of three chief Apostolic Fathers, along with Clement of Rome and Ignatius of Antioch.

During his life Polycarp defended the Church against heresies. His important writing, the Letter to the Philippians, quoted the Gospels and Acts of the Apostles, stressing Paul's authority in the Church and setting out clear arguments against the gnostic heresy that denied Christ's divinity.

The early period of the Church was a dangerous time to be a Christian and like many, St. Polycarp was martyred. He was captured by Romans and sentenced to burn at the stake. However, the fire did not touch him, instead rising up like sails around him. Seeing that the flames would not injure Polycarp, the Romans stabbed him instead. The Martyrdom of Polycarp is perhaps the earliest fully preserved account of a Christian martyr.

Thanking God for Missing Spears

Imagine how Saul must have felt when he awoke from his sleep and saw his spear missing from its resting place. Now imagine how he felt when he realized that the person who had it was the same person seeking his life — and there he sat, safe and sound. Now there's a day you don't forget your morning prayers.

I think if we look, we can all find a "missing spear moment" in our lives, when it hits us right in the gut that God has kept us safe from an impending disaster. This can be physical disaster, sure — but more commonly, I think it is spiritual disaster. Often the salvation comes through the gift of a person, or people, through whom God reveals His mercy.

When I was in high school, I had a circle of friends who were really into their faith. We were all in youth ministry together, and the bond we shared taught me a lesson that changed me as a person: we become those with whom we associate. I can look back now, all these years later, and see that these people are evidence of God's hand in my life.

Take a look at your life. In whose love has God shown you comfort? By whose hand has God brought you closer to Him, or kept you away from harm? Through whose friendship has God shaped you into the person you are?

Let's strive to remember to thank God for these people — and to thank them, too
