READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: EXODUS 17:3-7

The book of Exodus tells of the Israelites' escape from Egypt and their wanderings in the wilderness. Their trials during that time, the way they faced them and the way that God responded, provided future generations with food for thought whenever they faced difficulties.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 5:1-2, 5-8

In writing to the Romans, Paul is dealing with a community he had not yet visited. Many Roman Christians were converts from Judaism who believed they would be saved by how they lived out the Jewish Law. Paul stresses here, as he does frequently in his writings, that Christians are saved, not by the Law, but by faith—faith in what Jesus accomplished by his dying and rising.

ENCOURAGE A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

When I became the pastor of a large parish, I soon found myself, for the first time in my life, riddled with anxiety, headaches, difficulty making decisions, and fatigue. I called a therapist friend and told her my symptoms and asked if she thought I needed a serious medical exam. She said, “How much water do you drink?” I told her, “I haven’t had time to drink water lately.” She responded, “You’re chronically dehydrated. Drink eighty-five ounces a day and call me in a week.” I started guzzling water and in a week all my symptoms went away. I felt great.

Like me, the people in the Exodus wanderings were dehydrated. But unlike me, they knew it. Their symptoms were bad. They fight with each other. They accuse God of being a monster who wants them and their children to die of thirst. Their thirst drives them to plot the bloody assassination of the man who rescued them. God responds by using Moses to strike a rock from which rivers of living waters flow to quench their thirst for years to come.

The Holy Spirit is the living water of love which flows from the pierced side of Jesus, the new Moses. What symptoms in your life suggest you’re spiritually dehydrated? Anger at God? Cynicism at your leaders? Bitter rivalry and bickering with others? Don’t panic. Of course we have those symptoms. Ask God to provide his water to quench your spiritual thirst, and he will. And all those symptoms will soon disappear.

He is the Living Water

When I think about the story of the Samaritan woman at the well, I think of my father. This Gospel reading that we use every year for the First Scrutiny of the RCIA was always my favorite to discuss with those who would be baptized in just a few weeks at the Easter Vigil. Not that many years ago, my father was one of those elect. That year, the story was more powerful than ever.

The woman went frequently to the well looking to get the water that would sustain her body. But in the story, Jesus tells her of a different kind of water, one that gives life and quenches even the driest of thirsts. The story tells us that she put down her water jar and ran to the town telling of her encounter with the One who may be the Christ. She left that jar at the well. She did not need it anymore.

I encounter people all the time that spend their days going up the hill to draw water. They are tired and spent. My father was one of those. But with the gift of baptismal water, that constant chore is now over. There is no need to travel up that hill.

This Lent, if you are one of the baptized, reclaim the gift of your baptism. Stop climbing that hill in search of something that can only quench your thirst temporarily. You encountered Christ and have the everlasting, living water already. Put down that water jar. Your new life has only just begun.

The Messiah Before You

If you would have asked me on the morning of my confirmation what the chances were of the Holy Spirit getting into my heart, I would have told you they were about the same as getting water from a stone.

My faith was fragile at this time in my life, primarily because I viewed it as exactly that — my faith. Something within my possession and subject to my own power. And I hadn’t done the things I thought I needed to do in order to be the kind of Christian who knows the truth and lives it. I was waiting to be made stronger. I was waiting to be made more faithful. I was waiting for a transformation.

Little did I know, I was like the woman at the well, standing around talking about the coming of the Messiah, unaware that he was standing right in front of me. She wasn’t ready; she was still living in her sin. She was caught so unaware that she left her water jar at the well, rushing out to tell what she had seen.

When I was anointed with the oil it no longer mattered that I wasn’t strong enough to break open the stone that I was convinced encased my heart — God’s grace gushed forth through the cracks. While I certainly didn’t become a perfect Christian — and never will, in this life — I did learn that when God tells you to strike, it’s probably best not to second-guess Him.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners,

This past Tuesday I celebrated the Mass of Christian Burial for Patricia Fedorowicz. Pat was baptized & received First Eucharist & Confirmation at the Easter Vigil in 1976. She was married to her husband Steve for 42 years and sadly had a son named Royal who lived only one day. She was a friend of the Lord & was devoted to him, especially as she volunteered at a soup kitchen. She enjoyed cooking & loved to make people laugh & smile. She loved maintaining her house & yard & enjoyed being outdoors. Please remember her in your prayers that she may receive God's mercy and be welcomed into eternal life.

This Friday is the feast of St. Patrick. Your mouth is probably watering now for some good corned beef. However we are faced with a dilemma which takes place every 7 years: how do we enjoy the feast of St. Patrick when it falls on a Friday of Lent? Well, our good Bishop has answered that question. So let me quote him:

"Throughout the season of Lent we are invited to participate in the opportunity for prayer, fasting and almsgiving in order to deepen our awareness and better appreciate the ultimate sacrifice Jesus made for us on Good Friday. This year, St. Patrick's Day falls on a Friday in Lent, and several have inquired about the possibility of a dispensation from the obligation to abstain from eating meat on Fridays in Lent. After prayerful consideration, I am granting this dispensation from the obligation to abstain from meat for those who feel it absolutely necessary to be dispensed in order to celebrate the Feast of St. Patrick. I ask that those who exercise this dispensation and eat meat on the Feast of St. Patrick to select another non-Friday day during Lent to abstain from eating meat or to make some offering on behalf of the poor, whether by prayer, fasting or almsgiving. Be assured of my prayers for all the faithful who continue to strive to imitate the joy of the saints and follow their example with the same seriousness and commitment with which they practiced their faith."

So, while the Bishop is granting a dispensation from the obligation to abstain from meat on that day, he says that it is "for those who feel it *absolutely necessary*" (the Irish? Those who have nothing else in the house to eat? Those who are being held at gunpoint to eat it?) He also asks that those who do eat corned beef on this day should choose another day during the week to abstain from eating meat or make some offering on behalf of the poor.

While on this topic, I'll also mention that from time to time, people ask if it is really true that we can dispense from our Lenten goals on Sundays since every Sunday is really a "little Easter" when we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, especially at Mass. So if you choose to give up raviolis during Lent as part of your fasting sacrifice (a true sacrifice!), can you eat raviolis on a Sunday of Lent? I would answer this by saying that the Church only *requires* us to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and to abstain from meat on Fridays of Lent. This does not apply to Sundays. Also, deciding to give something up during Lent (other than the above) is voluntary so you are free to determine what your Lenten sacrifice(s) will be. You can therefore decide for yourself whether you will continue to make that sacrifice on a Sunday of Lent or dispense with it on that day to remember the joy of the resurrection. Personally, I don't know that I would be able to dispense with raviolis for 40 days, should that be the sacrifice I choose for myself during Lent (you'll never know). So I hope that answers (vaguely at least) that question I sometimes get asked.
