THE SPIRIT OF LENT Lent has always meant a special turning away from the things of this life to meditate and reconcile ourselves with God and one another. We fast, abstain, perform acts of sacrifice and self-denial to remind ourselves of penance, sorrow for sin and the sufferings of Christ. In His Pastoral Letter on Lent the Bishop has called all of us to reach out 'specially' to God- through more frequent attendance at daily Mass, at the Stations of the Cross, in prayer and good-works. Special Lenten Devotions are held every Wednesday and Friday evening consisting of Mass and Stations (Special Children's Stations at 2:45). A Considerably larger number could attend these devotions if there were a real understanding of the meaning of Lent in our lives. The church should be nearly filled (If there were just ONE person from each family of the parish to represent that family the church would be filled to capacity each evening). How about it? What are YOU really doing for Lent????

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: 1 SAMUEL 16:1, 6-7, 10-13

It is about 1000 B.C., 250 years after Moses brought God's people from slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. It took a long time for these people from different tribes to unify as a nation. The turning point came when David became their king. The story of how he was chosen is told in today's reading. Samuel was a venerable old prophet. Jesse was a resident of Bethlehem and had eight sons, the youngest of whom was David.

SECOND READING: EPHESIANS 5: 8-14

The ancient city of Ephesus was located on the western coast of what is today Turkey. The Christians there existed in a society dominated by pagan values, which today's readings equates with darkness.

PRACTICING CATHOLIC

Not As Man Sees

I don't know Fr. Stu personally, but I've heard a fair number of his homilies. I think it is safe to assume that if he and I were to get into a discussion on any number of things, from church history to liturgical music to stand-up comedy, each of us would cringe at the opinions of the other.

But Fr. Stu happens to offer just about the only confession time within 20 miles of me that consistently works with my schedule. That means that, quite by accident, Fr. Stu is my regular confessor. For years now, he's sat patiently on the other side of the grille, listening to me pour out the details of my transgressions, from the pathetic to the embarrassing, and he absolves me of my sins.

In the Gospel, Christ links vision with humility and pride with blindness. We see again and again in Scripture how God delights in surprising us, in revealing himself through people, places, and experiences we not only didn't expect but perhaps had totally written off.

We are right to be proud of the truth, but we are wrong if the truth causes us to be proud of ourselves. The truth no more belongs to the one who believes it than sight belongs to the blind man in the Gospel. A gift does not reflect on the recipient. It reflects on the giver.

After a great deal of thought, I've decided to be grateful that God contrived to give me a confessor whom I strongly disagree with on so many things. It's a powerful reminder of how much I must receive from other people, even those I may think are wrong. In that confessional, Fr. Stu is only a priest, and I am only a sinner.

ENCOURAGE A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

God asks a rhetorical and slightly sarcastic question to Samuel, the prophet: "How long will you grieve for Saul, whom I have rejected as king of Israel?" Like us, Samuel is depressed that the old king failed. It's painful to admit that the old regime is done. But God won't let us wallow our pity-party forever. "I am sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem," announces the Lord, "for I have chosen my king from among his sons." Samuel finally goes and anoints the young David as the new king. And his kingdom is glorious; it's the golden age of Israel's earthly history.

How discouraging to see that my own selfish ego is no longer in charge! How long will I grieve that money, power, pleasure, and reputation have been rejected as the ruler of my life? How wonderful that God has a new future in store for you and me. He is sending us to Bethlehem to anoint the new David as our king. His kingdom won't fail us. He'll slay our goliaths, unite our dispersed energies, and build a Temple where God himself will dwell.

So how long will you grieve? How long?

HEALING OUR BLINDING

Talking about discipleship and truly being a disciple are two very different things. It is easier to know what we should do than to carry out. Many saints from our tradition have had much to say about this struggle to do what they know they must do, and not do that which they know they shouldn't. It is part of being human.

Without God, we have no chance to overcome this predicament. Without God, our actions can ring hollow, or often we are too immobilized to act at all. Without God, we suffer with blindness to the truth of what is important and eternal.

The story in John 9 of Jesus healing the blind man is about more than a physical healing and just one man. It is about how each of us can find healing of our blindness by turning to Jesus Christ. Are you someone that has been saying, "I don't understand all this talk of discipleship and stewardship; what's the big deal?" We all have a blindness that needs to be healed, and the body of Christ needs you so that God's presence in our world can be seen in a more profound manner. The reality is that God heals the blindness of those who seek him so that, in turn, they may be vehicles by which others may see as well.

This Lent, you are invited to bring your blindness to Jesus. All the written reflections in the world will not give you new eyes. Those eyes can only be found in Jesus.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners,

It's hard to believe but the day is almost here when some parishioners & I head to Italy for a few days. We'll be leaving on Monday, March 20th & will be home the evening of March 30th. So I'll be away & missing you (kind of) next weekend, but of course we will be praying for you every day. Please keep us in prayers too that we may have a safe & enjoyable trip. Deacon Pat & Joan will be running the parish while I'm away (actually Michaela is in charge first), so please feel free to reach out to them for anything you may need while I am away. They will also be taking care of Michaela and I trust they will keep her distracted so that she does not give in to weeping and mourning and the gnashing of teeth in my absence.

I am really excited to tell you about an opportunity you will have to grow in your friendship with Christ and to learn more about the family of the Church to which you belong. The Berigan's & I have been talking about this for a couple years now, and trying to figure out a way (besides in our preaching), that we can make it clear that faith is not about following rules but about having a personal relationship with God through Christ. We as Catholics have not always been good about stressing this truth, and many are on a mission to get this across now with the strong encouragement of recent popes like Pope St. Paul VI, Pope St. John Paul II & Pope Francis, who call this the "New Evangelization." It is new because we are not just proclaiming the good news of the Gospel to those who are unbaptized but even to those who have been baptized and have received other sacraments but have never really been "evangelized" in the sense that they have not understood the importance of this personal friendship with God.

As the Lord so often does, he sent people to us in order to answer our prayer for how we can bring this "New Evangelization" to our parish of St. Leo's. A few weeks ago, the Office Manager came into my office to tell me that there were a couple of young men here to talk to me about some religious program. Honestly, I thought it was a couple of Jehovah Witnesses (whom I'm always happy to talk to!). But I was surprised to learn they were a couple of seminarians from Washington DC & New York City who wanted to talk to me about something called the "Neocatechumenal Way." You may recognize part of that word as we have the "catechumenate" which is the process through which an adult is baptized and received into the Catholic Church. This word is preceded by "Neo" which means "new" and ends with the word "Way" which is what the Christian movement was called in the early days of the Church. This Neocatechumenal Way is a process through which Catholics share how they came to have a friendship with Christ and so invite others to do the same. It is truly "Catholic" in that it is for everyone (Catholic means universal). It has the official approval of the Popes and the Church. It is something like "Arise" or "Renew" (for those who remember these which we had here at St. Leo's) in that it seeks to develop a small community within our larger parish community. It has 3 areas of focus: the Word of God, the Liturgy, and Community. A married couple who are leaders in this ministry along with the seminarians will speak at all the Masses the weekend after Easter so you'll learn more about it in person from them. But there are cards on the tables in the church (& this is also printed in the bulletin) to invite you to "Come and Listen" if you are suffering in some way or wish to deepen your faith. You may even get a personal visit at your home as they go from house to house to invite people to this gathering. Please welcome them & listen to what they offer. They will have one-hour sessions on Tuesdays & Fridays, starting April 18th. More on this later.
