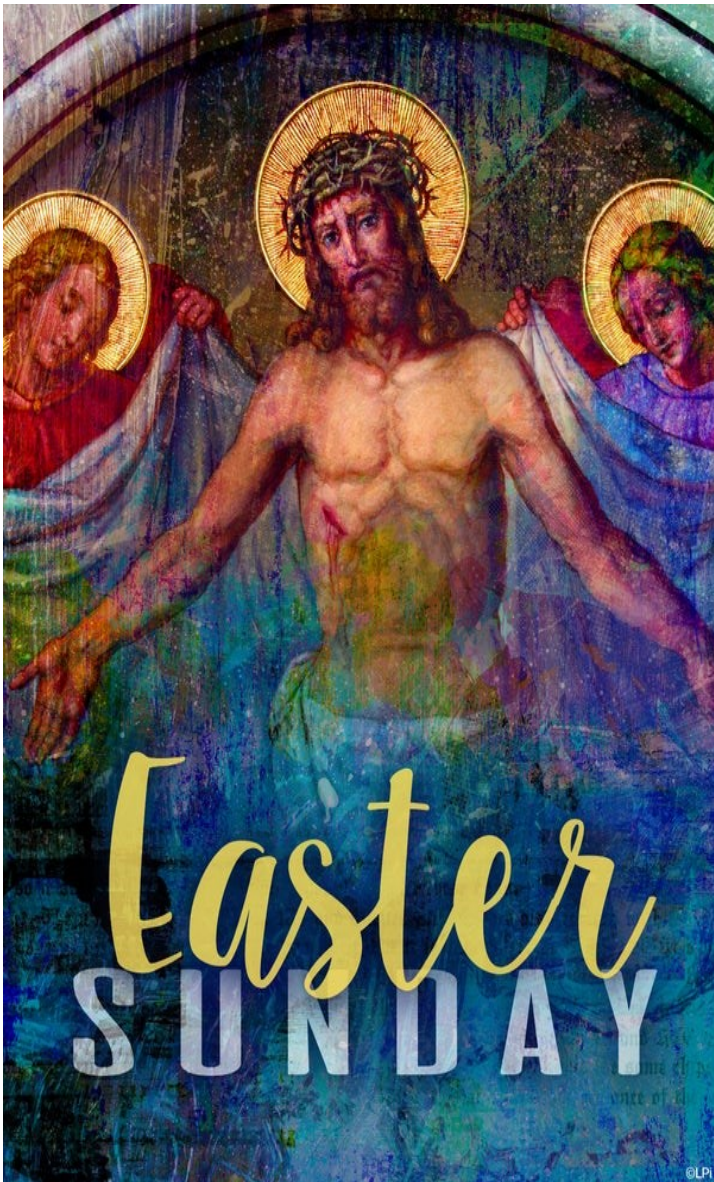

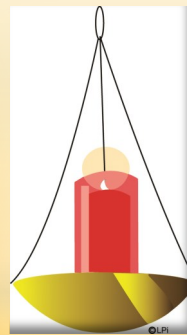

Fruits of Holy Communion

Question: What are the "fruits" of holy Communion?

Answer: The Eucharist, like all sacraments, offers its own unique grace. We receive a special share in God's life that helps us in our faith journey. We are given all we need to sustain and nurture our relationship with God. The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life. Everything we are and everything we hope to become is found in this sacrament. It is essential to the life of the church, to each member of the church. Without it, there is no church. The Eucharist is the center of our spiritual life and has enormous effects on our growth, our holiness, and our way of life. The fruits of holy Communion are the benefits one receives from the sacrament. These fruits of holy Communion are discussed in the catechism in the article on the Eucharist. The primary benefit is union with Christ. We become one with him sacramentally, just as we hope to become one with him for eternity. The Eucharist also separates us from sin, both past and future. It forgives the venial sins of the past and, by the love we receive, protects us from mortal sin in the future. The church community is also unified and strengthened by the Eucharist. It unites us to the poor and offers the pledge of eternal life.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE April 17, 2022 | Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord



There are many stones in our paths that keep us from truly living and being free. Some of these boulders have been there for a very long time. They have been there so long that they have even settled into the soil of our lives with other weeds, vines, and compacted soil keeping them firmly in place. We find them hard to move and trying to do so can be exhausting. What are these suffocating albatrosses that keep us so tethered and immobile? They are many things.

They are past childhood wounds and hurts that stem from disappointment, rejection, or abuse. People may have told us we were unwanted, that the world is frightening, that there are only some acceptable feelings you can have and others you cannot. We may have tried to love someone or struggled to figure out how and were met with rejection. Maybe we trusted someone completely and were betrayed. We come to life collecting barnacles that begin to attach to other barnacles and before you know it, we have a mass of solid matter blocking our vision and keeping us from moving. We live in fear. We are afraid of losing what we have, afraid that the future will be empty, afraid that we won't succeed and even more afraid that we will not be loved. There is so much fear. Didn't Jesus tell us not to worry and to not be afraid? Either we believe in the message of Easter, or we don't!

Go confidently into the night. Walking with God you will find the light and strength you need. Often without even knowing, God will move those boulders and stumbling blocks that bind us and, with putting one foot in front of the other and looking forward, we will move. The resurrection of Christ is really all about receiving the gifts of trust and faith and doing new things. The rocks that bind us keep us spinning the same wheels and doing the same things. When was the last time you threw caution to the wind and actually did something totally out of character and different? This is where we find God, in the spontaneous, the adventurous, the fun, and the creative choices we make! God is not boring and stuck. God is exciting and engaging. Jesus Christ is risen from the dead! Find a way to trust that this is true and live.

Dear Parishioners,

I want to welcome all of those who will be joining us today for the celebration of Christ's Resurrection. I offer these words to faithful parishioners, to guests and to those who have not joined us recently for the celebration of Mass. Last weekend, on Palm Sunday, I told the story of a priest who was from Youngstown, Ohio but was sent to Germany by his bishop to study for the priesthood. He was ordained in Germany and just a few weeks later made plans to come back to the United States by getting a ticket for the maiden voyage of the Titanic. He asked for permission to celebrate daily Mass while onboard the great ship but permission was denied. He then made plans to return to the States via another ship. When he arrived in New York City, he learned that the Titanic had sunk and so his life was spared. He celebrated his first Mass in the United States at St. Patrick Cathedral, praying for the people who died on the Titanic. He was then assigned to St. Bernard Parish in Akron, Ohio. I shared this story because there are still some people today who cannot attend Mass due to the availability of priests or due to persecution. And yet we live in a country where the Mass is always accessible to us, though sometimes we fail to take advantage of this great gift. Each Mass is like a little Easter because we are remembering the death and resurrection of Jesus at every liturgy we participate in. So I invite all of you to accept the great gift of the Mass and to make use of it, the most powerful prayer of the Church, whenever you can. This is not only an obligation (according to the commandment to keep holy the Sabbath), but should be a great joy as God speaks to us and shares his very life with us when we receive the very real Body of Christ. Every saint in heaven was devoted to the Mass and used it as the primary way to God. So welcome to all of you, especially to those who have not been with us for a while, and know that we hope you will be with us each week to receive with us the greatest sign of God's love.

I want to also offer a special welcome to Kristi Burkhart for whom we prayed during the 11am Mass during Lent as she is baptized at the Easter Vigil this weekend, along with thousands of others who are receiving baptism and the other sacraments of initiation, namely Confirmation and Eucharist. We also welcome into our Catholic Faith those who were baptized in another Christian Tradition but who are now confirmed as Catholics and make partakers of the Holy Eucharist: Nichole Kirk, Amelia Morchak, and Jay Warner. May they, who have longed to receive the gift of the Eucharist, be given a generous share of the grace of the Holy Spirit as they continue their journey of faith in the Catholic Family. Welcome to all of you!

We congratulate the parents of Grace Kupchella who is also being baptized on this Easter Sunday. From infants to adults, we rejoice in all those throughout the world who are being brought into the Church today.

Our rectory office will be closed this Monday as our staff continues to celebrate Easter with their families and there will be no Masses this week as I take a few days away. Deacon Pat will offer a Communion Service however Tuesday through Friday at 8:30am, and like weekday Mass, this will be live-streamed via our website.

Leave It in the Tomb

Today, on the most important day of the liturgical year, the Apostle Paul is calling us out.

“I see you hiding in that tomb,” he says. “I see you baking with that old, stale yeast, thinking no one will notice.”

He says it a little more elegantly, I’ll grant you. But the message is this: If you want to be raised with Christ, you’d better be ready to step out of the shadows. Seek what is above — not what is on earth.

I can feel myself responding almost reflexively, “Great idea, Paul — but I’m pretty comfy here.” Because sometimes, it’s just easier to stay in the tomb. It’s easier to crouch in the shadows and look outward at everyone else, thinking of the changes they could make or the sins they could overcome.

Today we are called to embrace newness. New hearts, new lives, new futures, new chances. If there’s anything keeping you from that, you need to leave it in the tomb. It’s a little scary, sure — maybe Jesus thought so before he stepped into the light of that first Easter morning. But no loaf of bread worth eating was ever baked using stale yeast that wouldn’t rise. No new life worth having was ever lived through the broken sins of yesterday. No Easter morning ever dawned without the tomb sitting empty.

Step into the light. He is waiting for you.

Thank you to all those who helped sort and deliver donations to the 12 organizations we supported this year. The love of Christ will touch all the lives that were touched by your outpouring of love.

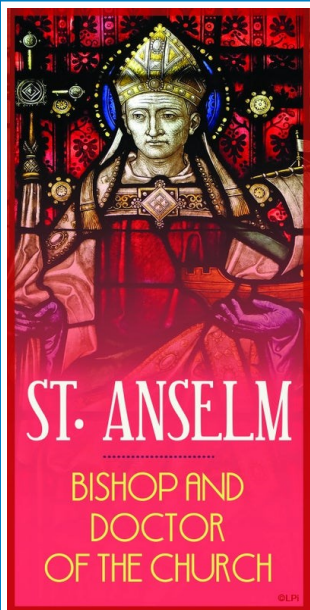

St. Anselm | April 21

St. Anselm of Canterbury left his home in Italy to travel as a young man and ended up at the monastery in Bec, France, which was known for the teachings of its leader, Lanfranc. Anselm rose quickly to become abbot of the community and his writings are now compared in importance to those of St. Augustine.

In 1093 Anselm was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury by William II Rufus, the son and successor of William the Conqueror. However, at the time there was a controversy in Europe over whether kings or the pope had the power to invest bishops. Anselm, who believed only the pope should have the right to invest an ecclesiastical authority, spent much of his time as Archbishop exiled in Rome.

St. Anselm's teaching and works of theology are his most important contribution to the Catholic faith. He is considered one of the fathers of scholastic theology and his chief achievement in philosophy was the ontological argument for the existence of God. His work *Cur Deus homo?* taught that atonement for sins could only be achieved through Christ. He was canonized in 1494 and named a Doctor of the Church in 1720.
