

#### First Reading: Acts: 8:5-8, 14-17

Last week we heard how the Christian assembly in Jerusalem chose seven of their number to minister to the Greek-speaking Christians who lived there. Philip was one of the seven. Today we find him in Samaria, about 60 miles north of Jerusalem, fearlessly proclaiming the good news of Jesus and experiencing astounding results.

#### Second Reading: 1Peter 3:15-18

The first letter of Peter was written to Christians whose pagan neighbors continually questioned and ridiculed them about their faith. Since most of the Christians were low-born or slaves, their neighbors couldn't understand why they were so joyful and hopeful. Today's passage offers pastoral advice and encouragement.

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION** ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

We hope for many things: passing an exam, finding our true love, securing sustainable work, or surviving an illness. We often seek to have God be a part of what we hope for and desire, almost trying to convince Him that our agenda is what is ultimately important. While our particular hopes may appear to be what needs to be achieved in order for us to be happy, they really are not. Our lesser, more personal hopes can distract us from true hope.

When God became a human being, a powerful message was sent: all that is authentically human is found in the divine. As the human Jesus lived and died in order to show us that he truly is the universal Christ, we have to keep our sight focused on our eternal truth and destiny and who we truly are. We have to be careful when we allow our earthly concerns to distract us. True hope is found when we place our trust in Christ's promises and don't rely on our own strength. True hope focuses on striving toward the fulfillment of God's promises and not simply on achieving what we think we need in this



life. Hope always travels with two friends — faith and love. In this trio of virtues, we find the very presence of God born in every human being. These are God's greatest gifts, and they lead us to the fullness of His presence.

As with faith and love, we cannot see hope with just our human eyes. We don't carry this virtue within us to use solely for our own personal agenda. Hope is not something that simply comes with the human package. As with faith and love, hope is a gift that is given to us to draw us

closer to our eternal truth. Faith, hope, and love are signs that there is something far greater going on in us and something greater to persevere in obtaining. The true divine gift of hope is what will endure any hardship we encounter, especially those that will come from authentically living the Gospel. With all that is happening in our lives, in our church, and in our world, what is the reason for our hope? Ask God for the fortitude to see His eternal gift as the reason we get up in the morning and do the things we do.

Dear Parishioners,

This past Monday I received directives from the Diocese of Cleveland with regard to the return of our public worship, which of course we are all looking forward to. We will have much more detailed information in the coming days and weeks with regard to how this will be done but I wanted to share a few of those details with you now.

First, the Bishops of Ohio, and Fr. Don Oleksiak, the administrator for the Diocese of Cleveland during this time without our own diocesan bishop, have agreed to begin a "soft opening" for the public celebration of weekday Mass in preparation for the public celebration of the Solemnity of Pentecost the weekend of May 30th & 31st. Weekday Mass may resume on Monday, May 25th here in the Diocese of Cleveland. However the dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass remains in effect until further notice. Since Monday, May 25th is Memorial Day, that Mass will be at 9:00am instead of 7:30am.

Here at St. Leo's, we will likely be using the church area instead of the chapel for daily Mass, which is at 7:30am Monday through Thursday & at 8:30am on Fridays (again, except for May 25<sup>th</sup> as Mass will be at 9:00am).

When we do begin to celebrate Mass publicly, whether for daily or Sunday Mass, we will continue to follow the directives of the Governor of Ohio as well as of the Bishops of Ohio and in particular the Administrator of the Cleveland Diocese regarding procedures for such public gatherings. For example, pews will be marked for 6 feet of distance between worshippers, masks will be required for all the faithful, hymnals will be removed, holy water fonts will remain empty, and people will be given instructions for how to receive Holy Communion. These and many more details will be made available to you shortly so please continue to monitor our website or refer to the bulletin for more information. We hope to have masks available for everyone when you come into the church. We also plan to disseminate information to you by way of a phone message you can listen to and by way of letters sent to the parishioners.

The parish staff will be meeting in the days ahead to discuss these directives and the best ways for us to implement them here at St. Leo the Great. Our first concern is for the safety and health of all those who come onto our property and worship in our church. So we will be faithful to the directives as much as possible and I ask that you pray for us as we do our best to practice safe ways of gathering together again.

My sincere thanks again for being so faithful to your contributions to this time. I am amazed that our collection amounts are the same or even greater than usual. Your generosity is so very much appreciated!

As I write this on Wednesday, March 13<sup>th</sup>, the forecast calls for warm weather (finally!) in the days ahead...it is supposed to reach 70 degrees. It's about time. You remain daily in my prayers. Please pray for us during this time as well that we may serve you to the best of our ability.

4) Call the rectory office (216-661-1006) and leave a message. Someone will get back to you and help you with any questions you might have.


