



First Reading: Proverbs 8:22-31

The book of Proverbs is mostly a collection of wise sayings to help people live a good life. Today's passage from Proverbs, however, is a hymn to Wisdom which in the Old Testament is sometimes symbolically described as a person coming from God.

Second Reading: Romans 5:1-5

Paul's letter to the Romans is his most detailed and important theological works. The Church chose this brief passage to be read on Trinity Sunday because, in these five verses, all three persons of the Trinity are mentioned.

GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE June 12, 2022 | The Most Holy Trinity

In creative celebration of the Most Holy Trinity, pray a rosary with creation. Find a quiet place outside or sit near a window. Contemplate the amazing Divine Gift that is before you. Admire it. Study it. Become one with it. Ask for the guidance of Brother St. Francis as you pray: "You, Holy Father, are King of heaven and earth. You are three in one, God above all gods. You are good, all good, and supreme good, Lord God, living and true. You are love. You are beauty. You are gentleness. You are joy. You are hope and happiness." Admire the wonder and majesty of God in all that is around you. Ask for wisdom and understanding.

Begin each decade with the Our Father and conclude with the Glory Be.

Decade one: Contemplate God the Father. As you pray each bead with a Hail Mary, get lost in the grandeur of all that you see. Imagine the thousands and thousands of years of history that is before you. Envision a time when nothing existed. What is nothing? Lift your eyes, heart, and soul to the power and magnificence of the universe, its expanse and its endlessness. You are one with it all. God's creative power.

Decade two: Contemplate God the Son. Behold the squirrels, birds, and critters all conducting life's business. They have heartbeats just like yours. Praying each bead, become one with the incarnate divine life that flows through you and flows with the smallest of creatures. It is holy innocence and blessed life. Tenderness. Compassion, Mercy. Reverence. All want to be held, have a home, and be loved. God in all things. Emmanuel.

Decade three: Contemplate God the Holy Spirit. The changing of times and seasons happens often without notice. It is all within God's care and guided. We all belong. Behold the living, dying, and rising to new life. You are one with all time from beginning into eternity.

Decade Four: Contemplate God as One.

Decade Five: Contemplate God as three. All different while remaining one. The divine dance is being danced before you. Rest in what you see. Become what you see. We are all connected: God of the Holy Trinity, creation, our brothers and sisters, the animals, and the plants.

The rosary you have prayed celebrates the circle of connectedness and the intimate relationship we share with all things: a glimpse of the Trinity.






SANCTUARY CANDLE INTENTION

Dear Parishioners,

With the feast of Pentecost which we celebrated last weekend, comes the end of the 50 day long Easter Season which means that we are back into the Ordinary Time of the liturgical year. The liturgical year, different from the calendar year which begins January 1st & ends on December 31st, begins with the first Sunday of Advent, usually at the end of November or very beginning of December. The liturgical year also ends about a month before the calendar year with the feast of Christ the King, which again is celebrated toward the end of November. But you will not yet see the green vestments of Ordinary Time for a couple more weekends as the Church always celebrates two feasts at the end of the Easter Season. This weekend we celebrate the feast of the Most Holy Trinity and next weekend, the feast of "Corpus Christi" or of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. So I invite you to join with us this weekend as we give thanks for God's self-revelation whereby we can come to know Him as He truly is, as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three persons yet One God.

Our annual bill for the live-streaming technology we use just came in. To be honest, I am tempted to cancel the use of that technology, at least for the weekend Masses. It was a true godsend during the pandemic, and it is still very useful for weekday Masses, funeral Masses, and weddings, especially when someone is out of town and really wishes to view the prayerful celebrations for a funeral or wedding. But the time to physically return to Mass has truly come. There are still many people who are watching us at home instead of joining us in the church. If you know of someone who continues to do that (and they don't see this column without a bulletin in hand), please invite them, or even challenge them, to return to Mass. This deep concern of mine is shared by many (most?) priests in the Diocese and this issue is being discussed in priest meetings that are held regularly with the Bishop. I cannot stress enough the importance of participating in Mass in person. Again, it is acceptable to use the live-streaming technology if you are in a nursing facility, assisted living, or even at home, if you do not go out into public at all due to age, mobility issues or serious illness. But as suggested in the video I posted a few weeks ago, not attending Mass physically when you are able to do continues to remain a mortal sin. This is because not participating in the Church's most important prayer is mortally dangerous to your spiritual life. It is based on the commandment that you shall keep holy the Sabbath. It is based on the Church's centuries-long tradition that Sunday Mass is vital to one's relationship with God and to the Church community. Jesus made this very clear when he said, and he meant this literally, "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man, you will have no (spiritual) life within you." Hopefully you know me well enough by now to understand that I don't seriously challenge you without cause. But I truly believe this to be a widespread dilemma post-pandemic, and that many people will suffer spiritually as a result of it. Again, how clever of the devil to use a situation that seemed at once to be a blessing in order to turn it around and use it as a curse against us. So please consider seriously and prayerfully this challenge to return to Mass if you have not yet done so, and strongly encourage others to do the same. More on the live-streaming technology next week.

Thanks to the assistance of Macrina Dodson, a longtime school teacher, pastoral minister and cantor here at St. Leo's, we have uncovered some pictures of past graduations from our parish school which are now on display in the church vestibule so please take a look & see if you can find yourself or other parishioners you know in the pictures. Up to the Job

Have you ever had a job for which you didn't feel qualified? I think we all have, whether it was a paying gig or not. A lot of us parents often feel in awe of the magnitude of that role and lose sleep worrying that we made the wrong decision in one situation or a bad call in another. Some of us feel intimidated by what our communities need from us, on the parish level or in our personal relationships. Or maybe we are simply dreading a task that seems too big, too overwhelming — that necessary basement cleanout, or the weekly organization of family schedules.

When we don't feel qualified, we don't want to do the work. We get stuck in our own fear. That's the birthplace of procrastination, self-doubt and bitterness. When we look inward at our own abilities, we can only see all the traits that aren't there. The intelligence, the dexterity, the ambition — whatever it is we lack, we get stuck on it.

I've got good news and bad news. I'll start with the bad news: none of us are qualified for the call of discipleship. We simply aren't. We don't have the love or grace or strength to get the job done.

Now I'll give you the good news: God knows this, and He doesn't care. Stewardship does not insist that we possess every good quality — no, as a way of life, stewardship recognizes that we lack so many qualities. But it shows us where to find the love and grace and strength we need. Stewardship does not demand that we know every answer; it merely reminds us who to ask when we don't.



JUNE 12, 2022— THE MOST HOLY TRINITY SUNDAY



Saint Germaine Cousin | June 15

Saint Germaine was born in Pibrac, France in 1579 to poor parents. Her story is a heart wrenching one. She was born with a deformed right arm and hand, and her mother died when she was an infant. Her father remarried, but her stepmother brutally abused and neglected her.

As a child Germaine suffered from scrofula, a disfiguring form of tuberculosis which causes swelling and lesions on the side of the neck. Already sick, abused, and starving, she was forced to sleep in barn with sheep she tended.

Despite everything, Germaine lived each day tending her flock with joy and in prayer. Mary and Jesus became her friends. She shared what little she had and taught the children of the village about God's love. A rosary made of string knots was her constant companion. She attended Mass every day, leaving her sheep in care of guardian angels. Her flock was never attacked by wolves and never wandered. Some claimed to see the waters of the flooded river part so she could get to Mass.

She is often portrayed with an apron full of flowers because one winter day her stepmother accused her of stealing bread from the house and hiding it her apron. But when she was seized and forced to open the apron an abundance of spring flowers tumbled forth. It was this incident that compelled the villagers and even her parents to recognize her holiness.

Germaine died at 22, her poor body was found by her father, in the barn where she slept. She was buried in the village church. More than forty years later, her body was accidentally exhumed and found to be incorrupt. She was canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1867 and inscribed into the canon of virgins.
