

First Reading: Wisdom 18:6-9

The book of Wisdom was written by a teacher who lived in Alexandria, Egypt, a center for learning for the ancient world. He addresses his writing to a group of Jews in that city who were being tempted to abandon their religious practices and beliefs. To bolster their faith, the author speaks of the memorable night of Passover when the angel of the Lord destroyed the enemies of the Jews.

Second Reading: Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19

Today and for the next three Sundays, the second reading will be from the letter to the Hebrews. This document was written by an author we do not know to a community we cannot identify. In today's sections, the author encourages the community, whose faith is faltering, by calling to mind Old Testament heroes such as Abraham and Sarah.

GOSPEL MEDITATION -ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE August 7, 2022 | 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

St. Thomas Aquinas reminds us that, "Three things are necessary for the salvation of man: to know what he ought to believe, to know what he ought to desire, and to know what he ought to do." Everyone is called to work toward their salvation, which is ultimately union with God. Those who take this call seriously must embark upon a journey inward to the deepest recesses of their soul. In the adventure and wonder of that journey, we work out the details of our union with our Beloved. We cling to what we need to believe, remain firm in what we truly desire, and are guided by what we know we have to do. Once we know that our goal is to be one with our Creator, life becomes an exciting expedition to pursue that end. We make necessary preparations, follow the map, and remain on course.

Whenever we really want something, we put our entire selves into achieving it. We certainly do not passively sit by doing nothing! Such an attitude leads to laziness and the accomplishment of little. For the one who eagerly awaits the day when they can be fully with God, life becomes a joyous adventure indeed! Alert, ready, focused, convicted, and willing to be a servant they constantly watch and prepare themselves for meeting the Lord. Loving the journey and being in love with their Creator, their lives become joyful witnesses of love and service. They are secure in their hope, confident in their faith, and perfect in their love. 
Dear Parishioners,

I am writing this column on Tuesday, August 2nd, the day of Fr. Vesely's funeral Mass. I just asked you for your prayers for him & his sister in last weekend's bulletin when I was away and how timely that was for he was taken from us on July 27th. Bishop Amos presided over the Vespers Service (the Evening Prayer of the Church offered for every priest on the day before his funeral Mass) at 3pm on Monday, August 1st. I was happy to offer my thoughts about Fr. Vesely in the homily and that Vespers service can be viewed on our website. Then on Tuesday, August 2nd, Bishop Gries celebrated the Funeral Mass at 11am, with Fr. Ned Weist preaching the homily. He was a former pastor here at St. Leo's and someone whose first parish assignment was at St. Charles in Parma when Fr. Vesely was assigned there as a "Senior Associate." Several priests also concelebrated the funeral Mass as well. Fr. Vesely had chosen the scripture readings and songs to be used at the funeral Mass (as the Diocese encourages each priest to do) and we sang his well-known "Litany of Thanksgiving" before the Mass began. The choir sang "Going Home," a song that Fr. Vesely would sing after Holy Communion whenever he celebrated a funeral Mass. It was a wonderful way for us to celebrate his almost 68 years as a priest and to commend him to God.

Sadly, Fr. Vesely's sister Milly, who's 98th birthday is this weekend, took a fall the Saturday after Fr. Vesely died. She was in need of surgery on the day of his Vespers service, and gratefully it went well, but of course meant that Milly could not be present for the wake or funeral Mass. The funeral liturgy was also live-streamed (and is available as well on our website for viewing any time) so she will be able to view it with her family members. So we keep her recovery in our prayers as well.

I must extend my special gratitude to two parishioners who took special care of Fr. Vesely when he began his stay at Mount Alverna a little over four years ago...they are Harry and Joan Wheeler. This couple not only visited Father on a regular basis, but drove him to his doctor appointments, took him out to eat, and did many other things to care for him during his time there. We should all be grateful to them for doing what the Lord asks each of us to: to care for each other, especially for those who most need our help. Harry & Joan sacrificed much time to extend this charity to Fr. Vesely & on behalf of the parish, I extend to them our deep gratitude for their sacrifices and love.

I will include here a copy of the card that was available to people by which to remember Fr. Vesely. You can cut it out of this bulletin & keep it in a prayer book or put it somewhere to remind you to pray for this priest who has helped us on our way to heaven. May he now be welcomed to that place where we hope to follow.

Caught in the Rising Action

Think of some of your favorite iconic movies. I'm not talking about the feel-good comedies or the offbeat coming-of-age flicks. I'm talking about the movies that you found had a profound impact on you or made you go "Hmmm."

I'm willing to bet that the plot of this film features some tough moments and difficult scenarios. However happy the ending, at some point, the situation for the protagonist might look awfully hopeless. The script speaks some truth to you about what it is to be human in difficult circumstances. What it means to persevere.

We're attracted to the tension that exists when the hero is besieged. We're captivated by the decisions he makes in the darkest hour of the night when it seems like the dawn will never come. Why? Because we know that feeling so well. This is the essence of our human life on earth: waiting, hoping, doubting — and enduring.

We know the ending to our story, but we don't know when it's coming. We live our whole lives in the rising action of the narrative. Sure, it gets old. Tiresome, even dull. We may start to despair that the climactic scene is coming at all.

But faith is the realization of things hoped for, and evidence of things not seen. We feel it watching a great movie, because we recognize it intuitively: it is faith which earns the happy ending. No one is drawn to the story when the hero gives up or gets tired of waiting for the payoff. Everyday stewardship is the collection of choices we make while we're waiting, because we are called to action, not idleness, even in our perpetual state of expectation.



St. Jane Frances de Chantal | August 12

Saint Jane Frances de Chantal was born to a noble family in Dijon, France, on January 28, 1572. Her mother died when she was an infant. Her father raised her and provided for her education. In 1592 She married the Baron de Chantal, the couple were devoted to each other. They had six children, three of whom died in infancy. As Baroness, Saint Jane Frances restored the custom of daily Mass, and was famous for her charitable works. Unfortunately, her husband died in a hunting accident only eight years after their marriage. Devastated Jane Frances was forced to live in her father-in-law's strict household where she took a vow of chastity.

In 1604 while visiting her father in Dijon, she met Saint Francis de Sales and he became her close friend and spiritual director. Although not many of their epistles have survived, the pair had a lively correspondence which lasted until Saint Francis died.

Under the direction of St. Francis de Sales and with his partnership she established the Congregation of the Visitation at Annecy in 1610. This was a unique order, without the extreme ascetical practices typical in other religious orders, accepting women and girls and those rejected by other orders because of poor health or age. The new order was also unusual in its public ministry, rather than a strictly cloistered life. Saint Jane transformed her convent at Annecy into a hospital during the plague of 1628.

The saint died at the Visitation Convent in Moulins on December 13, 1641. At the time of her death, there were 86 convents of Visitation nuns. She was canonized in 1767 by Pope Clement XIII.
