### First Reading: 1 Kings 19: 4-8

The prophet Elijah lived about 800 years before Christ. Because he was loyal to God, he fell into disfavor with King Ahab and Queen Jezebel. He has to flee for his life to Mount Horeb (also known as Mount Sinai). Today's passage takes place as he begins his flight.

### **Second Reading: Ephesians 4:30-5:2**

As in the past four Sundays, our second Scripture is from the letter to the Ephesians. This part of the letter contains advice for Christian living. The author says that actions which cause division in a community are simply unacceptable. In today's reading, the author sees mutual forgiveness as essential for any group that calls itself Christian. There is an echo here of part of the Lord's prayer.

I have some news regarding the trip (or more precisely, the pilgrimage) to the Holy Land: I am now able to give dates and a price

and a meeting date so thank you for your patience in waiting for these. The trip will take place from Monday, May 16, 2022 through Thursday, May 26, 2022. We will fly from Cleveland to Toronto, Canada, then from Toronto to Tel-Aviv. The cost of the trip will be \$3400 per person (which I think is a great price!) and we will have a meeting with Eddie Abufarha on Sunday, August 29<sup>th</sup> at 6:30pm in the Parish Community Center. He will give us more details about the trip and will answer any questions you may have. You have seen Eddie here many times before while he and his father Abraham (who was just here a couple weeks ago) have sold items made of olive wood in the vestibule of the church. Eddie and his family are from the Holy Land, as you may recall, and so are able to tell us much about it. So mark your calendars and please remember that we have a limit of 30 people, and several have already asked me to mark them down as interested so first come, first serve. You'll also see some posters up in the church as a reminder. Feel free to reach out to me for any questions you may have or to confirm your interest, even if you have done so before. I'm really looking forward to walking in the same place where Jesus walked and getting to know the life he lived.

Next Sunday, August 15<sup>th</sup>, is the feast of the Assumption of Mary, a holy day of obligation. But of course you will be here anyway for our Sunday (or Saturday) celebration of the liturgy. I look forward to celebrating what this feast means for us as we honor Mary and what God did for her and what he promises to do for us.

Normally August is a reminder that summer is coming quickly to a close as our students have been returning to school at the end of this month but this year school does not open until September 1<sup>st</sup>. But already we're into the 2<sup>nd</sup> week of August so I hope you are enjoying these summer days as I am. We're looking at an enrollment of over 300 this year, the first time our school has seen a number over 300 in many years. This is due to the hard work & leadership of our Principal, Denise Burns, and to the commitment of our teachers and school staff. This summer, the school office got a makeover with new paint and a new floor, and the two main hallways in the school also have a new tile floor which will be much easier to keep clean than the older terrazzo floor. The girl's bathroom has been redone as well with a new floor, all new toilets and sinks, and new stalls. I believe it's so important to keep our buildings not only in good working order but in good appearance as well as this has an impact on those who send their children to our school and on those who worship with us or visit us for any reason. We also have ordered awnings for the entrances of the rectory, Lux Hall (gym), school and parish center (Preschool). These will be especially helpful in identifying the buildings to the many visitors we have who are often confused about where to go. Again I believe they will enhance the appearance of our buildings as well. They are due to be installed sometime in November.



# GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE—19th Sunday in Ordinary Time



The lens through which we view life makes a difference. It also determines who we choose to learn from and what we allow to shape our thoughts and feelings. For many, life is simply what it appears to be, a given that either through evolution or some other means just came to be. There is no apparent rhyme or reason to things and things can be dissected and understood only in terms of what they empirically present. To the person using this lens, a tree is

a tree and a flower is a flower. Their composition and existence can be understood only to the extent that current human knowledge allows. Through this lens, what gives life purpose and meaning? This lens has an essentially unknown beginning and definite end. Once those are accepted, the middle becomes some kind of pursuit of happiness, with values and principles being things that are self-created and found acceptable.

But there is a Divine lens that also exists and deserves mention. It is found when one stumbles upon faith and begins to see things differently. This lens is of God and reveals a Divine Energy and Life that flows through and in all things. Faith then shows us that all that lives come from this one Source of Love. This is the only true lens that can give human beings the purpose and meaning they desperately need. From this perspective, all of life is much more than what is immediately apparent! It now tells and reveals a story about God generous, creative, and unconditional love! The unfolding of the human story is the unfolding of God's story. What meaning our lives have when they are viewed as a part of God's love affair with humanity! We are indeed special.

The lens of our faith asks us to learn from Jesus Christ. Jesus, as the real Bread of Life, shows us our eternal destiny and completes and frames our lives. It is only in allowing ourselves to be taught by Jesus, that faith, hope, and love take on much greater importance. All the relationships in our lives are now structured and ordered using God's primary commandment of love. Jesus, then, is not just some man who lived at some point in history. Jesus is the incarnate Son of God who shows us the way, the truth, and the life. Using this lens changes things up a great deal. Looking at the creation that surrounds you and the special unique people you love, what is God trying to teach you about His love for you and the eternal life He wants you to have?
