
There are a few other ways you can help support our Parish!

#### READINGS FOR THE WEEK SEPTEMBER 11, 2022

FIRST READING: Exodus 32: 7-11, 13-14

The book of Exodus tells of the Israelites' escape from Egypt and their covenant with God at Mount Sinai. In today's passage, Moses has been up on the mountain for 40 days conversing with God. In his absence, the Israelites have despaired and built a golden calf to worship as a god.

SECOND READING: 1 TIMOTHY 1:12-17

The first letter to Timothy was written about 30 years after Paul's death. It was written in Paul's name, a practice common in the ancient world. In today's portion of this letter, the unknown author sketches a portrait of Paul as someone we should imitate.



## Gospel Meditation

### ENCOURAGE A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE September 11, 2022 | 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Since God created human beings, we have struggled to keep our focus on God. We wrestle with the question of "who is God" and foolishly believe

some of God's job description can be better completed by us. We wander in different directions, lose our way, think that happiness can be found elsewhere and even construct golden calves to worship. Are we simply too independent or just blatantly stubborn? It's a good question to ask. Even with all of our silliness and distractions, God compassionately and patiently waits. He lets us assert our wills and knows that perhaps one day we will actually wake up and realize how lost we are.

"Since happiness is nothing other than the enjoyment of the highest good and since the highest good is above, no one can be made happy unless he rises above himself, not by an ascent of the body but of the heart. But we cannot rise above ourselves unless a higher power lifts us up ... Divine aid is available to those who seek it from their hearts, humbly and devoutly; and this means to sigh for it in this valley of tears, through fervent prayer (St. Bonaveture)." One of the biggest human struggles is discerning what, exactly, is the highest good. We are ordered to achieve it but if we pursue it with clouded vision, we will never truly find it.

One of the greatest obstacles to God's power and love is a stubborn, closed heart of stone. When we are fiercely determined to set our sights elsewhere for happiness or simply ride the popular currents of the day, we will never satisfy the deep ache and longing within. We know that ache well. It is precisely why we scurry all over the place, attempting to find the next best thing to take away its pain. Nothing in the created world ever can or will. We continue our journey. One day, people may wake up and realize that they are grazing in the wrong pasture and putting themselves in harm's way. When this awakening occurs, it will be a most joyous day as we will see God's wide-open arms waiting to receive us. "Lead me, Lord, in your path, and I will enter in your truth. Let my heart rejoice that it may fear your name (St. Bonaventure)."

#### SEEING GOD IN OUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

#### Rise, and Go to Your Father

"If you pull into my driveway and honk, you better be dropping off a package, because you're sure not picking anything up."

I first read these words in the pages of W. Bruce Cameron's "8 Simple Rules for Dating my Teenage Daughter," (that's Rule No. 5, by the way).

There's a certain respect that is shown by someone who takes the time to come to the door, ring the bell and wait to be greeted. Being willing to go through the niceties for the sake of appearances is a small act of deference on the part of the person doing the picking-up, even if it's not for a date. Without it, the whole scenario becomes entitled.

I want you to think of something that you want or need, but do not have. Is it peace? Is it financial stability? Is it strength? Is it friendship?

The brother of the prodigal son had a lot of unexpressed desires. He sees his brother heaped with gifts and favors, feasting on the fattened calf, and he is enraged. I haven't been given half of that, he thinks, and I've worked so hard.

But for all his faithfulness, one has to wonder — did this son ever simply ask for what he needed? Did he get out of the car, so to speak, and ring the bell? Or did he sit in the driveway leaning on the horn?

God wants us to come before Him. He wants us to ask. He wants us to be like Moses — sure enough of our Father's indulgence to boldly ask for it. Think again about what you need but do not have, and ask yourself: Have I approached the door and rung the bell?

It seems that this date...9/11 as it has come to be remembered...will forever be etched in our minds as a sad day for this country. We continue to remember prayerfully all those who died on this day and all those who have died as a result of terror. May violence not rule our country or our hearts.

On a happier note...we congratulate the parents of Benjamin Gobel (married here at St. Leo the Great in 2017) on the baptism of their son this weekend. Pray that Benjamin and his parents may know the richness of our Catholic faith through the Sacrament that is the door to the other sacraments and to a life of grace.

This is the first Sunday of our new Faith Formation, where the children of our parish will gather three times a month in the Parish Center as we share the good news of Christ with them and their parents. We will only want to learn more about God and the ways of faith if we first have a loving relationship with the God who loved us first. This Faith Formation is for all the children of our parish (whether they attend our parish school or not). It is also the way through which some of these children will be prepared for the Sacraments of Holy Communion and Confirmation. By taking this religious education out of the classroom and having the students and their parents in a more conversational atmosphere, we hope it will be a more enjoyable & rewarding experience for everyone. Both students and parents will meet from 9:30 until 10:45am in the Parish Center and then will join us for the 11:00am Mass. I am very grateful to our catechists who will be working with these young people and to the Berigan's who will be meeting with their parents at the same time. This is an exciting venture for us and I'm so happy we have the leadership of Joann Deranek & Macrina Dodson to guide us on our way. Please pray for the success of this evangelistic effort to bring the faith to both children & parents.

I also ask your prayers for myself & some of my brother priests who will be on retreat this week at the Jesuit Retreat House on State Road in Parma. I will be there from Monday through Friday so will be unavailable for appointments in the rectory office. I will however continue to celebrate daily Mass here (except for Thursday) as it is only a 5 minute ride back to the parish.

Thanks to all who have submitted their registration forms for the pilgrimage to Italy in March. I know there are several more expected to come in. If you are interested in joining us, you can pick up a flyer on one of the tables in the 4 corners of the church and then see us in the rectory office (or email me at <a href="jschmitz@leothegreat.org">jschmitz@leothegreat.org</a>) for a registration form and brochure. We just celebrated Mass in our chapel area this past Tuesday evening for those who were on our pilgrimage to the Holy Land this past May and we blessed the icon of the Mystical Supper that now hangs over the altar. Thanks again to Alan Morinec for his generous contribution of this beautiful gift! We were able to enjoy refreshments and each other's company afterwards, continuing to share more pictures of our time together. It was an experience that will be with me (and the others, I'm sure) for a lifetime.
