

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: ISAIAH 55:6-9

The prophetic words in today's reading were spoken during the Israelites' exile in Babylon. Earlier, the prophet had proclaimed that God was looking mercifully upon them, and would soon free them. In today's reading, the profit points out that they now have a window of opportunity, and should take advantage of God's willingness to forgive.

SECOND READING: PHILIPPIANS 1: 20-24, 27

For the next four weeks, our second reading will be taken from Paul's letter to the Philippines. When Paul wrote this letter, he was in prison for preaching the gospel, and he faced the possibility of execution. A person in those circumstances tends to think long thoughts about death, and death, as what Paul is wrestling with in today's passage.

In 1625, Vincent founded the Congregation of the Mission for the purpose of caring for the poor. Originally priests only, the mission expanded to include groups of laity who provided for spiritual and material needs of the poor in each parish Nearly 400 hundred years later, his legacy lives on!

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

What do you think of when you hear the word normal? This weekend's Gospel reminds me of our tendency to view ourselves favorably or negatively by comparing ourselves with others. It is very common to look at the norms that we perceive in our environment and then compare ourselves to them. When we do this, we often see ourselves as being abnormal, falling short, or failing to live up to expectations. In some ways, it is good to look to others as an example. We have Christ, saints, and role models to look up to as inspirations for values or virtues that we admire and want to cultivate in ourselves. However, someone serving as an inspiration to us is very different from being a source of When we make comparisons, we see comparison. deficits. When we see deficits, we experience feelings of failure, sadness, and frustration. When we are experiencing all the negative emotions and thoughts involved with failure and deficits, it inhibits our growth and motivation. If we radically accept who we are and are mindful of the present day, it allows us to focus our energy on growing in a healthy way. A way where we do not compare ourselves to others, but to the person we were yesterday. This also allows us to take our attention away from our deficits and refocus it on the values and virtues that we desire to cultivate in the present moment. This is a practice of living in the present moment with Christ because God is always radically loving and accepting of where we are today. If you find yourself comparing yourself to others, take a moment to sit with Christ and reflect on who He wants you to be. —Luke Brown, LPCC

And thanks to all of you who contribute to this work through donations to our SVDP boxes at the doors of the church.

We are always looking for people willing to offer some of their time for the good of our parish and parish school. If you have time on your hands that you're willing to donate, or if you have a particular gift you think might be helpful to us, please don't ever hesitate to say, "Here's what I've got (big or small)...how can I help?" We all determined that it was best not to have Michaela go on as she was as she would need to be drained weekly which meant she'd have only 1 or 2 days a week of feeling better. The condition (caused by liver failure) also made her disinterested in going for a walk, which she always loved to do. I can't really say more because it still makes me very emotional so I'll just say thank you for your concern for both her and for me. She was such a part of so many of my daily routines, from first thing in the morning until last thing at night. Those of you with pets already know the pain their absence brings. I am glad to still have 15 year old Abby to sit on my lap...it's good to have someone to come home to. Michaela was my 3rd and final dog and I thank God for the almost 11 years I had her (her 11th birthday would have been this Tuesday). I gave her back to God with deep sorrow but also with deep gratitude.


