READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: ISAIAH 56:1, 6-7

The last part of the book of Isaiah contains the words of a prophet who lived after the Jews returned from exile. Today's passage speaks of salvation being offered to all regardless of ethnic origin or social condition. Christians have seen in this an anticipation of the message that Jesus will preach.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 11:13-15, 29-32

Today's reading is the conclusion of Paul's thoughts about how Jewish people are going to participate in the saving grace of Jesus. Paul was Jewish and he loved his own people. He was disappointed that most of them had not accepted the gospel. Paul hoped that his success in converting the Gentiles would encourage the Jewish people to take a second look at the message of Jesus.

A Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In Matthew 15:21-28, we encounter a poignant story that transcends its biblical context, offering profound insights into the realm of mental health and human perseverance. The passage narrates the encounter between Jesus and a Canaanite woman who pleads for her daughter's healing. Initially met with what seems like dismissal, she persists with unwavering faith, stating, "Even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the table of their masters." The Canaanite woman's desperation mirrors the struggles of those grappling with their own inner turmoil. Just as she faced doubt and potential rejection, individuals navigating mental health battles may feel unheard or rejected by society, their own minds, or even God. Yet, it is the woman's unyielding determination and trust that resonate most deeply. Her courage to stand firm, despite seemingly insurmountable odds, underscores the importance of resilience in the face of adversity. Her faith becomes a beacon of hope, reminding us that even in our darkest moments, the smallest glimmer of faith can ignite profound transformation.

Drawing from the wisdom of Saint Teresa of Ávila, who once said, "Let nothing disturb you, let nothing frighten you. All things pass away: God never changes, we find solace and guidance. Saint Teresa's words echo the Canaanite woman's unwavering faith and her ability to overcome despair. In the realm of mental health, these words remind us that while challenges may persist, they are transient, and the foundation of our faith remains constant. The journey of mental health and well-being involves persistent self-care, seeking support, and maintaining faith in the possibility of healing and growth. Just as the woman's plea was answered, our diligent efforts and unshakable faith can lead us towards spiritual and emotional restoration.


PARISH PICNIC



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

"The Challenge of Stewardship"

Every day we are called by Christ to respond in some way. The more practice we have at giving of ourselves freely and living in His presence, the easier it is to discern that call. Once we hear the call, the choice is ours: will we respond with yes or no? We could say that we are not required to say yes because God has given us free will. However, our response speaks much to where we are in our maturity of faith. When we were children, the word "no" used to be one of our favorites. If we continue to say that as we get older, well, that says something about where we are in our walk with the Lord. If we truly are disciples of Jesus Christ and are serious about growing in our faith, we will say "yes." We are not required to say yes, but we say yes because that is who we have become. This is the challenge of a stewardship way of life.

Have we matured enough to say yes when God calls, regardless of how much our answer may cost us? What matters more to us: what it will cost us or our relationship with Jesus? Some days we will easily be able to say yes. The grace and love he gives us will be plenty to see us through whatever situation in which we find ourselves. However, we are imperfect beings and there will be days when we are more into ourselves than him. It is on those days that we find ourselves at a true crossroads of a challenge. The choice is always ours. Hopefully, our faith will be strong enough. His call is never for his own sake. He calls us because the world he created and the Church he instituted need us. They wait just as he does for our response.

to Our Lady of Good Counsel parishioners living within that area. The diocese estimated the new parish would have 300 families. It turns out there were 500 families within the parish boundaries and possibly more, considering that some Our Lady of Good Counsel parishioners were reluctant to join the new parish. In 2009 Our Lady of Good Counsel Parish was renamed Mary Queen of Peace after it merged with Corpus Christi Parish.

The next step is to form an organizational structure—mainly a Holy Name Society for

the men and an Altar and Rosary Society for the women. This appears to have been standard operating procedure in 1948. The two organizations provided

spiritual sup'port for the community, but they were also a principal fund-raising source.

Shown here is a photo of the first major parish fund-raiser held by the Altar and Rosary and Society, probably at Our Lady of Good Counsel. The exact date is unknown but it was probably before 1950.
