READINGS FOR THE WEEK


FIRST READING: ACTS 10: 34, 37-43

The Apostle Peter was originally skeptical about preaching the Gospel to non-Jews. But one day, the Holy Spirit summoned him to preach to a gentile—the pagan army officer Cornelius and his household. Today's passage is a portion of Peter's sermon, which summarizes the life and ministry of Jesus.

SECOND READING: COL. 3:1-4

The letter to the Colossians depicts Christ as the only mediator between God and the world. A previous passage of the letter presented baptism as the way we are united with Christ. The author will today remind us of the heights to which Christ has raised us, and then call upon us to live up to this.

PRACTICING CATHOLIC Easter Sunday & Object Permanence By: Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

When you play peekaboo with a very young baby who has not yet developed object permanence, you actually feel kind of mean. As soon as your hands obscure your face, their little eyes widen with alarm and their expression crumbles into confusion and despair.

Because they can no longer see you, they believe you no longer exist. Their little brains are unable to understand that just because a thing cannot be seen, it is still there, still alive, still full of love and care and protection.

Aw, man, you can hear them thinking. I guess I don't have a mom anymore.

On Easter morning, Mary Magdalene sees the burial cloth but no body. Her human mind makes sense of the situation the best way it knows how, she assumes the Lord has been taken. I'm sure I would have thought the same thing, in her position.

She cannot conceive, on her own, the reality that Christ has risen from the dead. It doesn't matter that he has told his disciples again and again that this will happen. They weren't ready to understand then.

In many ways, Easter is when the human race really achieved object permanence. But we still struggle with it, don't we? I certainly do. So often I can be heard accusing God: "You weren't there. Where were you? I couldn't find you."

But I looked for him in the flesh. I looked for him in the stale yeast of the world — in money or success or affirmation or (worst of all) convenience and pleasure. Of course, I would not find him there, among the dead.

ENCOURAGE A DEEPER Understanding of Scripture

"When Jesus had risen, early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, out of whom he had driven seven demons." (Mark 16:9)

Popular Catholic piety sometimes posits that the newly risen Jesus appears first to the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is a happy thought, but it's simply not what the scriptures report. We are told quite directly that he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, "out of whom he had driven seven demons."

Why would the gospel writer remind us of this unsavory detail of Mary's past? Historians tell us women were not qualified to give legal testimony. On top of that, to be possessed by not just one, but seven demons, is unsavory and terrifying. What damage had they done to her? What did she do to allow herself to be home to such evil? It doesn't seem to matter. Jesus chose Mary Magdalene to be the first one who saw him risen from the dead. He decided she was qualified.

Do you think that you are disqualified from seeing and announcing the risen Jesus because of your past demons? Maybe they are the demons of despair, confusion, self-hatred, pride, addiction, failure, boredom, laziness, or other sins. Well, don't. In the light of the Risen Jesus, all these past demons make our witness that much more believable — only if we allow ourselves to be touched by the liberating hand of Christ, just as Mary Magdalene did.— *Father John Muir*

Dear Parishioners,

It was a surprise to learn that he entered the hospital with a lung infection shortly after we saw him. Personally I think he got it from the baby that he kissed from the crowd but I don't want to point fingers. I'm just glad he arrived home safely as we did. And yes, I'm already beginning to plan a trip back there next year, but this time going more south in Italy (besides Rome of course) so stay tuned for more information about that later this year.

I was able to offer Mass again for my Mom, Dad & Mildred as well as other parishioners and friends whom I continue to miss. But we know they are praying for us as well. We prayed for you too and thank you again for your thoughts of us while away from home. There is much that I hope to be able to share with you in the weeks & months ahead which were gleaned from this trip. But for now, let us all give thanks to God on this Easter Day for the great gift of new life that he has offered to us in Christ.

SEDER MEAL



Our Faith Formation groups partook in Seder Meal and re-lived the events of the Exodus from Egypt. This is the Jewish and now Catholic understanding of "sacred remembering". It was enlightening for the students to experience the food of Jesus' heritage and helped them to better understand where He came from. After candles were lit, Jewish prayers were recited as students braved the meal presented to them. This included parsley snips

dipped in salt water, Matzo with horseradish [unfortunately no photos of the faces made here :)] and chopped apples with walnut. Egg and chicken wings were also included and each part taken with a drink of "wine" (juice). All parts were symbolic of the sacrifices in both the Old and New Testaments. The Last Supper was a Passover Seder meal. This is why St. Paul writes "Christ was sacrificed for us as our Passover" and John the Evangelist proclaims "Behold the Lamb of God!"
