ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday, February 22nd, marks the beginning of Lent. Masses with distribution of ashes will be at 8:30 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on Ash Wednesday. There will also be a prayer service at 12:00p.m. for the distribution of ashes.

FAST AND ABSTINENCE DURING LENT

Ash Wednesday (February 22) and Good Friday (April 7) are days of abstinence from meat and days of fast -- ONLY one full meatless meal and two light meatless meals (which together would not equal the main meal) may be eaten. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. (Abstinence applies to all Catholics over the age of 14. Fasting applies to anyone 18-60.)


DO YOU WANT A GOOD PARISH CHOIR?

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: LEVITICUS 19:1-2, 17-18

We are reading today from the third book of the Bible, Leviticus, which is a collection of Jewish laws. Today's passage discusses how to treat your neighbor. For Old Testament people, a neighbor was a fellow Israelite. (When we listen to today's Gospel, we will hear Jesus take this a step further.)

SECOND READING: 1 CORINTHIANS 3:16-23

In this reading, Paul continues to address the problem of fractions in Corinth. One group followed Apollos, an eloquent preacher who came there after Paul had left. Another group was loyal to Kephas (which is the Aramaic name for Peter). Paul uses an unusual image to explain why such factions don't belong in a Christian community.



ENCOURAGING A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE



Of all the things Jesus says which seem totally bat-crazy, this one might take the cake: "But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you." An enemy is someone who desires the destruction of you, your projects, or those you care about. To love and pray for them is to want their health, strength, and flourishing. But if they thrive, they are more likely to hurt you and others. So, aren't you indirectly willing your own destruction, or that of your friends? If you doubt that this problem is embedded in this teaching, when was the last time you actually prayed honestly for the people you really hate?

How can we solve this riddle so we might actually live this command? Recall that enemy-love is the surest sign that you love someone with God's love, and not with indirect egotism. After all, if my love for my enemy ends up hurting me or my loved ones, it can't be for me. Enemy-love costs more because there are no tit-for-tats. No reciprocity — just loved poured out, and often pain in return. That's why it is so precious and rare. "What is unusual about that?" asks the Lord about love for our friends. Jesus wants us to experience the unusual love which only comes from him.

When Jesus was being killed on the cross, he was loving his executioners. In fact, he was holding them in being as they nailed him to the cross. He loved those who were spiritually piercing his Mother's heart, while they were doing it. And when he rose from the dead, he showed us that this kind of love is always worth it. It's stronger than death. Real love is unusual. — Father John Muir

Want to know the words I find hardest to say? "Lord, give me the strength."

The world tells us to push ourselves outside of our comfort zone if we're training for a marathon or applying for a job — but if we're talking about God, everything is supposed to be easy. If it comes "naturally" or without struggle it's supposed to be right.

Only God is perfect, the world tells us. What's the use of trying so hard?

I'm really good at finding excuses for myself, especially when it comes to holiness. Holiness, often (not always, but often), is about choosing the hard, but right, thing. The invitation to holiness is whispered in the hardest moments of my day when I am the most hopelessly human. After the kids' bedtime, when I really just want to watch Dateline and eat too much ice cream instead of saying the Rosary. When I've committed to helping someone, but it suddenly becomes incredibly inconvenient. When I see a social media post that's just begging for a snarky reply. When the conversation becomes gossip and I'm dying to make myself feel superior to someone.

The reason it's so difficult for me to mutter these five simple words is because I know that if I say them and I mean them, they form a prayer that God will always answer in the affirmative. He will give me the strength I ask for, and then I will have no excuse.

It's not unlike my kids claiming they're too tired to clean up the playroom. If they would just ask me for help, it would all be so doable. But where would that leave them? With a job to do, *that's* where.

Dear Parishioners,

On my desk is a large pile of cards, most of which have yet to be opened, which express the sympathies of parishioners on the deaths of my dad & stepmother. And so many of you expressed verbally your condolences and the assurance of your prayers. I continue to grow in my gratitude to you for your support of me and my family during this time. I have reflected on the fact that I tend to go into "work mode" when planning and celebrating a funeral as I do so often, and that is even true when it becomes personal as in the death of a family member. It takes a while for me to process everything that has happened & to deal with the feelings of my heart. But your presence in my life allows that to happen because of our shared experiences of grief and because of our shared faith. So thank you again for the many ways you reach out to me and my family. It means a lot to us and I continue to thank God for you in my life.

Last Saturday was the 4th anniversary of my cancer surgery & I'm amazed at how fast that time has gone. I had my annual check up with my urologist to review my blood work which continues to be clear of any indications of remaining cancer cells. So thank you in advance for your generosity to those who stand in need of our financial support and again, know that what you do for them, you do for the Lord Himself.

Happy 50th Anniversary to Bob & Barb Ceccarelli! They will be celebrating this special occasion this weekend & we are happy to pray with and for them for many more years of sharing love & faith. Both of them are active parishioners who have been faithful to each other, to God and to our parish, so please join me in extending to them our congratulations.

This Wednesday, February 22nd, begins the Holy Season of Lent. Mass on Ash Wednesday will be at 8:30am with the parish school students (all are welcome to attend) and at 7pm. The Deacon will also have a short service at Noon with the distribution of ashes for those who would like to attend during their lunch break for work. Guidelines for the 2 fast days of Lent (Ash Wednesday & Good Friday) & for abstinence from meat on all Fridays of Lent can be found in this bulletin. Just as when we tend to lose our appetite when grieving or upset about something, so too do we fast on these days so as to focus our energies on grieving our selfishness during this time.

I really encourage you to consider joining us for the Stations of the Cross which Deacon Pat & I will be leading each Friday of Lent at 7pm in the church. You can begin by having a good Lenten meal during our Fish Fry (again, details in this bulletin) & then coming over to the church for about 25 minutes of prayer. As we hear in the gospel every year on Ash Wednesday, the Lord encourages us to pray, fast and give alms as a remedy to sin. We provide the opportunities to do all three of these Lenten disciplines and hope you will take advantage of these so as to find the joy of learning the art of love.
