

Before some of the changes from the Second Vatican Council were implemented, girls and women needed to wear a head covering when they entered the church. If the schoolchildren were going into the church to attend Mass, go to confession, or learn about a sacrament, one of the nuns who taught at the school would stand at the door of the church with a box of facial tissues. The nun would place a facial tissue on the head of any girl not wearing a veil, scarf or other head covering. Of course, the tricky part was keeping the facial tissue on your head the entire time you were in church.

DID YOU KNOW?



In 1955, Rev. Sylvester P. Lux, first pastor of St. Leo the Great, appealed to the parishioners for any gem stones that they could spare. The stones were fashioned into the shape of a cross on a 14-karat gold overlay chalice, bearing an inscription on the base from the People of St Leo Parish. A matching paten bears an etching of the image of St. Leo the Great.

As part of the 50th anniversary celebration the chalice was replated and the paten

buffed and polished, and throughout the years the names of the six former pastors of St. Leo have been added to the bottom.

The chalice is a remembrance of the sacrifices on which this parish was built and is used for special liturgical celebrations.



I recently decided to learn to cook. As I sit at the feet of various YouTube cooking masters, I notice how much of cooking is adding ingredients that don't provide any more nourishment, like herbs and other seasonings. But man! They make all the difference because they make the meal delightful to eat and share.

Jesus calls his disciples "salt of the world." No one eats just salt. So, Christians are not meant to replace or do away with the world. They are meant to be agents of preservation and glorification. Notice how often these days the Church seeks to preserve what is threatened: the goodness of marital and family love, the desires of young people for greatness, the value of honest work, healthy economics, and altruistic political engagement, the dignity of the poor and vulnerable. Over and over, we say to a world who wants to throw things out, "It's worth saving! We'll preserve it! We'll show you it's wonderful." If we can't engage the world like that, Jesus says we are the ones who get thrown out, because salt alone is worthless.

Jesus only asks us to do for others what he does for us. He is the "salt" of everything in our lives. Is there something in your life starting to rot a bit? Something tasting bland and boring? Let Jesus salt it and see if you like it better. — Father John Muir

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Parishioners,

Thank you for your prayers for my stepmother, Mildred. They were heard and answered as she passed away last Sunday morning. The family is till considering funeral arrangements as she has a daughter in California who is not able to travel at this time so they may not plan something until the summer. Again I am so grateful for your prayers. I am also deeply grateful that she was able to bring such joy to my dad for over 16 years of marriage and over 20 years of time spent together. We certainly never thought they would have been together for so long when they announced their marriage plans so many years ago! But as many of you know, having a companion later in life is such a great blessing, especially after a spouse has died. Dad is aware that she has passed but is not really talking much about anything right now, unless it pertains to the present moment, and as far as Mildred is concerned, that is another blessing. He is comfortable and we are just trying to enjoy whatever time we have left with him. Please keep in prayer all those whom I anoint, all the sick of our parish and of our loved ones, and those who share in the cross of Christ through their illness. They will be consoled in the life

Friday was the feast of St. Blaise so we will have the blessing of throats after all the Masses this weekend so feel free to come up for that during the closing song.

Having just anointed a parishioner, I would like to offer a reminder to you regarding what the Church can do for you or a loved one at the time of serious illness or death. First, a distinction between the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick & Last Rites is always helpful as these two rituals were seen as one thing for a number of years but have been separated by the Church in more recent years (actually in the last 50 years or so). The Anointing of the Sick can (& should) be requested by anyone who has a serious illness, whether that be physical, emotional, mental or spiritual. It is one of the 7 sacraments of the Church and finds its biblical basis in the Letter of St. James: "Are there any who are sick among you? Let them send for the priests of the Church and the priests will anoint them with oil." This is how the early Church celebrated this sacrament for its sick members and we continue to do this today. It is a prayer for healing, which may be answered in a variety of ways by the Lord, either physically or spiritually. It can also be received by those who are "advanced in age" (your call, not mine!). It can be repeated as often as necessary. I can offer this sacrament to you before or after Mass, as I often do at the request of people who have received news of a serious illness or who are facing surgery, so please feel free to ask any time. I am often called to the home of parishioners or go to nursing homes or hospitals to celebrate this sacrament (unless they have a chaplain).

The Last Rites are simply prayers that are said before or after death as we pray for the soul of the one who has died or expected to die soon and has already received the sacraments. Sometimes a person may be anointed at the same time if they have not been anointed recently (but only if they are still living for the sacraments are only for the living). Confession is offered at this time as well if a person is able to speak. Though the Sacrament of Anointing and the Last Rites are two separate prayers, they can be combined and at one time were always given together in what was called "Extreme Unction" or the anointing of someone in danger of death. But we hope to walk the journey with someone who is ill by anointing them long before death may come. I offer this information in the hope that you will request the Church's prayers & sacraments in time of need.

MIRACULOUS MEDAL

What is the "Miraculous Medal" and why is it called that?

The medal of the Immaculate Conception that has come to be called simply the "Miraculous Medal" dates back to an apparition of Mary to Saint Catherine Laboure, who was then a novice sister with the Daughters of Charity. On November 27, 1830, Our Lady appeared to her standing on a globe, with shafts of light streaming from her hands and the words, "O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee," surrounding the image. In the same vision, Catherine saw a capital "M" with a cross above it and below two hearts. Catherine seemed to hear a voice telling her to have what she saw struck as a medal and a promise that those who wore the medal would have the protection and intercession of the Mother of God. The first 1,500 of medals were distributed in 1832. Many miraculous favors were attributed to the use of the medal.

Saint Catherine's "Miraculous Medal" is among the recognizable and popular symbols of modern Catholicism. Reflecting on its widespread use, the 2001 Vatican document, "Directory on Popular Piety and Liturgy," observes that the medal "recalls the mystery of Redemption, the love of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and of the Sorrowful Heart of Mary. It signifies the mediatory role of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the mystery of the Church, the relationship between Heaven and earth, this life and eternal life."
