READINGS FOR THE WEEK


First Reading: Isaiah 55:10-11

In today's passage, the prophet Isaiah will use an image from nature to describe how God's word always bears fruit and comes true no matter how unlikely it may seem.

As we continue reading from the eighth letter of Paul's letter to the Romans, he tells us that sin affected not only human beings but also creation, and the coming of Christ had a healing effect on both. It is evident that Paul is not pessimistic about this world.

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

It's not uncommon to hear people complain that we Catholics often fail in communicating our faith. Fair enough. We can and should improve there. But it's interesting to notice that Jesus himself was implicitly accused by his disciples of a similar failure. This week in Matthew's gospel they are perplexed that he speaks to the crowds in ambiguous parables. The Lord's riddles leave many people more confused than before. He responds by pointing out that his parables have an intentional dual purpose: to hide (for some) and to reveal (for others) his Gospel: "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted" (Matthew 13:11). Is Jesus being unnecessarily difficult, obscurantist, or, worse, elitist? No. We have to remember that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge lie hidden in him (c.f., Col. 2:3). He is the word of God from heaven to be planted in the earth of our humanity to bear great fruit. However, like a lover delicately pursuing his beloved, we're dealing with a relationship, not new data. When we aren't willing to personally accept Jesus into our lives, the "info" of the Gospel will simply not make sense to us. It'll seem bizarre, esoteric, or like incoherent religious-speak. But when we are willing to accept Jesus into our lives, everything else starts to make sense. When others don't understand the Church or the Lord, let's be patient. Love is patient. Sometimes it has to hide before it is revealed. — Father John Muir ©LPI

PRACTICING CATHOLIC "Soil Conditions" By: Colleen Dorman

I am a hopeless gardener. I never met a plant I couldn't swiftly kill with good intentions and poor understanding of soil conditions. Because really, it's all about the soil conditions — at least, that's what Google tells me when I helplessly search phrases like "Why aren't any of my seeds sprouting? Please, I tried so hard." I can never seem to match the right type of soil offering the right type of drainage and texture with the right plant.

I can't understand why it's not enough to bury the seed in whatever ground is available, sprinkle some water and ask it, very nicely, to grow. This is also a quality that makes me a poor evangelist to people who do not share my beliefs. How many times have I encountered a friend or loved one who left the faith, and I tried to coax them back by hurling Catechism passages in their direction, offering advice

I sow these seeds of witness and bang my fists in frustration that they rot where I plant them, never realizing that it's all about the soil. It is Christ, and Christ alone, who works within the heart. It is Christ who is the sower of the seed, not me. When I leave him out of the equation, when I fail to offer the Person and instead only offer the teaching, I can anticipate that any witness I have to offer will rot where it is planted just as sure as a tulip bulb in a bed of clay.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP "WHAT'S PLANTED IN YOUR HEART " By: Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

Over the years I have wasted a lot: a lot of money, a lot of time, and a lot of talent. Sometimes I didn't realize I was wasting these things but, after reflection, I realized I could have done more and accomplished much greater things. Of course, I think that is part of our imperfect humanity. It truly is easier for us to waste our gifts than grow them into something more.

The parable of the sower speaks about the word of God that gets planted in our hearts. If the soil of our heart is rich, than the word will grow and change us. If that soil is rocky or full of weeds, the word will lie there without any impact, bearing no fruit.

This parable can be applied to living a stewardship way of life as well. As sowers, we have been given the seeds of our time, talent, and treasure. We have a choice of where to plant these gifts. As good everyday stewards, we are called to plant them wisely and prudently. Oftentimes it is not enough to simply give away what we have. We need to discern the best places to sow these gifts so the maximum harvest can grow. This takes prayer, reflection, and study. Without a solid discernment process, we can find ourselves sowing seeds endlessly without much to show for it. But joyful is the person who has used one's gifts wisely, for the bounty of the harvest is great.

MARY MAGDALENE

Question: July 22 is the feast of Mary Magdalene. I've heard a lot of stories about her, but who was she really?

Answer: Mary Magdalene has been the subject of speculation and scholarship over the last 2,000 years. Mary Magdalene makes her first named appearance in Luke 8:2. She is one of several women following Jesus. Luke specifically mentions that Mary had previously been delivered from demonic possession. Whatever her life looked like before she met Jesus, it wasn't good! Because of this association with being a repentant sinner, Mary Magdalene has been associated with other similar stories in the Gospel, such as the woman caught in adultery or the woman who bathes Jesus' feet with her tears. Mary Magdalene shows up again by name at the end of the Gospels, when she stands with the Blessed Virgin Mary at the foot of the Cross. Mary is also present in the garden of the resurrection. She is one of the woman who goes to bring spices to Jesus' tomb, where they find the stone rolled away. Mary stays in the garden weeping, believing his body has been stolen. Jesus approaches her and calls her by name, and she becomes the first witness to the resurrection! While many of the details of Mary Magdalene's life have been lost to time, she is an example of powerful conversion, deep faith, and intimate love for Christ.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners,

I am writing this column from Wheeling, West Virginia where I am attending a Priest Conference at Oglebay Park, a very large and beautiful resort just a couple of hours from Cleveland. There are several priests here from the Cleveland Diocese so it was nice to run into them after I arrived. The Church encourages its clergy to take advantage of opportunities for continuing education, and I am happy to do so as I love to learn more about our Catholic faith. In last week's column I mentioned Dr. Scott Hahn, one of the presenters who has written numerous books based especially upon his knowledge of Sacred Scripture. He continues to inspire and to motivate us to spread the Word of God with joy and hope. I just listened to a talk by Dr. John Bergsma who spoke on the Gospel of Matthew. Now I have studied Matthew's gospel in the seminary and throughout my 37 years as a priest, but I continue to learn more about him even now and for that I am grateful. For example, I did not know there were actually 3 pairs of brothers who were apostles: Peter & his brother Andrew, John and his brother James (the Greater) and to my surprise, Matthew (or "Levi"...Jesus likely gave him the new name of Matthew) and his likely brother James (the Lesser). Matthew was somewhat of the "black sheep" of his family because he was a tax collector. Dr. Bergsma explained that we still don't quite grasp what that meant to the Jews of his time. He would have been looked upon then as we look upon drug dealers today. He worked for the Roman Occupation and so against his own people, the Jews. But Jesus called him to repentance and to apostleship, and he responded. There's always so much to learn about scripture and about every other aspect of our Catholic faith and it always brings me joy to know something I didn't know before. And we learned much more about Matthew & his gospel besides. So I hope to continue to share with you what has been shared with me during these times of continued education. I will be back to celebrate Mass with you this weekend.

We also heard from one of the co-founders of a popular (THE most popular) Catholic app called "Hallow." It's a free app (though there is a paid version for those who are interested) which you can download to your iPhone or Android phone. It is an app that is designed to simply help people to pray. And it is specifically Catholic (though of course can be used by anyone who wishes to pray more). It's great to meet the creators & designers of these apps in person and to hear the story of how they became inspired to start such an app and how it has been a journey of faith for them as they responded to God's call to really be part of the evangelization ministry today, not unlike St. Matthew. We have no idea how much money, time and effort goes into something that may seem so simple and effortless to us. But people have invested so much into something like a simple app that helps people to pray. I have used this app and continue to use it to this day. It even features people like Dr. Scott Hahn whom I mentioned earlier as he guides people in prayer. It also includes people I've spoken of or whom you may have heard of like Bishop Robert Barron and Father Mike Schmitz, both of whom are well known evangelists in our country. So may I suggest you download the app & see how it can help you to pray better and more often, for the Scripture says that we should pray always with grateful hearts, especially in times of struggle and hardship.

I hope that you are enjoying these summer days and taking advantage of the opportunity to rest and recreate. But let us remain faithful to prayer, especially with each other at Mass.
