The Feast of St. Leo the Great, patron saint of our parish, is celebrated on November 10th. St. Leo the Great was elected pope in 440. During his tenure as pope, he fought heresies, convened significant councils of bishops, and saved the citizens of Rome by confronting Attila the Hun. St. Leo accomplished so much during his term as pope that he became one of the few popes with the distinction of "the Great". Though he died in 461, his legacy lives on in his profound writings. He was made a doctor of the church in 1754. St. Leo the Great, pray for us.

MEMORIES

Forty Hours was usually held by the parish around the Feast of St. Leo. The Eucharist was placed in the monstrance and put on the altar after a Mass, and the church would be open for adoration until a closing service was held forty hours later. The church that was connected to the school was often filled to capacity for the closing service with people standing in the vestibule and along the side walls of the church. The priests were accompanied in procession by the Knights of Columbus and some of the school students, particularly the ones who made their First Holy Communion just months previously.

The statue of St. Leo the Great was in the old church which was connected to the school. When it was moved to the current church, the statue did not have a permanent place. The statue has been in the choir area, in the sanctuary, in the main vestibule, and in the stained glass area adjoining the main vestibule. Thanks to Fr. Jim's vision of changing the old confessionals into shrines at the back of the church, the statue of our patron saint now has a permanent home.

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: WISDOM 6:12-16

The book of wisdom was written by a teacher, who lived in Alexandria, Egypt, a center for Greek philosophy in the ancient world. Fearful that the Jewish people might be captivated by the secular thought, the author contrasts it with the true wisdom of God. In today's passage, wisdom is personified as a woman.

SECOND READING: 1 THESSALONIANS 4, 13-18

Paul wrote his first letter to the Thessalonians some 20 years before any of the gospels were written. In the passage, we are about to hear, we have the earliest written teaching about the resurrection. Some of Kathy Svoboda, Matt Pauloski, Kelley, Tootie, Megan Arena, the Thessalonians were worried about those who had already died. They expected the second coming of Christ very soon, and we're concerned that those who had died would miss out on the

A BEAUTIFUL BLEND OF SCRIPTURE AND MENTAL HEALTH

In this weekend's Gospel, we hear the challenging words of Jesus about being ready at all times. Life is fragile and we must be ready at all times for our judgment. As I reflect on this in the context of mental health, it reminds me of our great capacity to ignore problems, delay addressing them, or fail to acknowledge their existence. Whether they are problems present in relationships, ourselves, or the world around us, addressing and changing them can be difficult, exhausting, and discouraging. However, ignoring problems rarely works very well, if ever. Ignoring problems is like ignoring an infected wound and hoping that it eventually feels better or heals on its own. While there are times in our lives when we are too tired or busy to really dig into a problem and address it, we need to prioritize it and find the time, often sooner rather than later. For example, there might be a problem present in a marriage that is difficult to address due to Boy Scout trips, work obligations, or errands that need done. While this problem may be easy to put off or ignore due to not having the time, the problem is likely only going to worsen over time if not addressed. There are always a million reasons not to do something. The same is true about doing something about the problems in our lives. If we address our problems and really engage in their resolution, we can find healing and peace. While we may not view the problem as severe enough or painful enough to do anything about it, I find that people are often surprised to find how much better life, prayer, and relationships can be after they have addressed it. There are many problems that will not be fully resolved in this lifetime. However, if we at least address them and reflect on them, we can find greater peace within ourselves, greater love for the people around us, and a deeper ability to receive the love of Christ.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners,

As many of you know, I not only lost my voice for the feast of All Saints, but for a few days afterward & so could not celebrate Mass last weekend. I'm grateful to the priests from Holy Family Hospice for filling in for me and hope that the many others who are ill at this time as well will recover soon.

I want to congratulate the parents of the children being baptized here this weekend...Gabriel Cooley and Bernard Miller, who are first cousins. A few years ago, I witnessed the marriages of their mothers who are sisters and have been members of our parish for some time so I'm glad we're able to welcome these 2 children into the Church at the same time. May God bless them and their parents who are raising them in the practice of the faith.

This Sunday we are bringing our celebration of the 75th Anniversary of the Parish to a close. Last year Bishop Malesic celebrated Mass with us and then many of you were able to meet him in Lux Hall as we shared some refreshments. Today (Sunday), we will celebrate the closing of our anniversary year as we offer prayers of thanksgiving at the 11am Mass and then join for a meal over in Lux Hall right afterward. This past Friday, November 10th, I celebrated Mass with the school students and shared with them some of the history of our parish and school. It was a great day to do so as November 10th is the feast of our patron, St. Leo the Great. So I thought I could remind you of some of the important milestones that have taken place these past 75 years...

The First Mass of the new parish was celebrated at Ben Franklin School in their auditorium on Sunday, October 17th, 1948 (the official founding date of the parish is October 10, 1948...I like that date as October 10th is my mom's birthday, and in 1948, she had turned 21 years old on October 10th. So perhaps she had an alcoholic drink on day of our founding!). There was a simple announcement regarding the beginning of this new parish in the bulletin of Our Lady of Good Counsel (now know as Mary, Queen of Peace). It gave the parish boundaries for our parish, which was not only to guide the faithful to attend the Catholic Church according to the street they lived on, but was also meant to let the pastor of each parish know that they were responsible for the spiritual and pastoral welfare of the people in a particular territory.

The Diocese had already bought land from Alvin to Portman on the other side of Broadview Road, close to Schaaf Road. It was all empty and full of weeds at the time. However, Father Lux (our founding Pastor) said he had land picked out (at our present location) but said it was a swamp and that the woman who owned this property would never sell it to a Catholic. Father Lux had connections and had someone else (a non-Catholic) buy the land. He bought enough of the property right up to the railroad tracks, knowing that a highway (presently 480) would be growing through.

Our Lady of Good Counsel had a 6am Mass on Sunday mornings so Father Lux decided to have a Mass at 5:30am for those who liked an even earlier Mass. It was a clever move. The home of a man named Bill Heminger was used for Mass on holy days which is the white house near the corner on the east side of Broadview. It was used later as the first rectory (priest residence) of the parish and then later became the first convent (residence for the nuns). Father Lux had its little porch extended so that it could be used for daily Mass.

I'll share a bit more with you next week. For now, enjoy the meal & give thanks to God!



Seeking Wisdom

I think if any of us were asked the question, "Do you love wisdom? Do you seek wisdom?" we would, at first, be a little taken aback. And then we would answer quickly "Of course!" with absolutely no doubt in our minds.

But a different way of asking the question is this: "Are you making wise choices?" That's a question that would put a fair few of us on the back foot.

The virgins who went out to meet the bridegroom were all the same. They had the exact same intentions. They had the exact same stamina, or lack of it. They had the exact same knowledge of the night being dark and lamps being necessary.

What made five foolish, and five wise?

It was their choices. Only their choices set them apart.

We may rely upon the wisdom of another — the parent who reminds us to go to confession, the friend who demurs when we start speaking gossip, the priest who preaches boldly from the pulpit against an injustice we lack the courage to denounce ourselves. But even if we feel safeguarded by their good influence, their wisdom won't save us.

We may possess a little wisdom ourselves — we may know well that a dark night is hard to navigate, and that we need the assistance of a lamp. We may go to Mass once in a while, read the Bible when we have time and serve others when it's convenient.


But a lamp needs oil to burn in the darkness, just as wisdom requires action to be brought forth into the world.

We may love God just as much as we should — our flesh may pine, our soul may thirst. But a parched field never brought rain on itself just by being dry.

We must make the choice.
