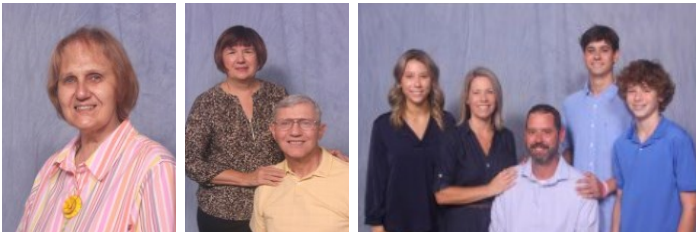

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: ISAIAH 45:1, 4-6

When today's passage from the book of Isaiah was written, the Jewish people had been held in exile by Babylon for more than 40 years. Cyrus, the king of neighboring Persia, was preparing to invade Babylon. The prophet sees Cyrus, a pagan king, as an instrument of God. Through this military victory, God will free his people and allow them to return home.

SECOND READING: THESSALONIANS 1:1-5

Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians is the earliest of all New Testament writings, coming only about 20 years after the Resurrection of Jesus. Today's reading gives us the letter's opening words. In just 5 verses, we hear reference to God the Father, the Lord Jesus and the Holy Spirit, and also to faith, hope and love. It indicates how quickly these essentials of our faith became part of our Christian tradition.

PRACTICING CATHOLIC “The Tax of Caesar”

Too often, I confuse this world with the next. Every day has its set of problems that need dealing with. Some are very easily discernible as problems of this world: I am tired, and I need a nap and a latte. Some are very obviously problems of eternity: I need to ask for forgiveness, but I’m not ready to admit it.

Most problems are a subtle, maddening mix of the two: my body feels tired, obscuring how tired my soul also feels, while making me very cranky, which is keeping me from asking for the forgiveness I need.

It’s not that the nap and the latte aren’t solutions. Heaven forbid! I would never propose such a thing. Sleep and coffee, I am confident, can fix almost any problem in this world. This world.

Too often, I slap a one-size-fits-all earthly band-aid on all my problems and rush on to the next thing. But if the problem is an issue of my soul, I may as well pay for a parking ticket in Monopoly money.

I render unto Caesar, and I forget about what is owed to God. I apply solutions meant for the here and now to problems that have eternal consequences. The spiritual problems are dismissed, shoved to the back of my mind. For when I have time, I tell myself. For when I am ready. But the only time we have is now. God is no king of this earth, and he does not ask for a tax offering. He asks for our heart. He doesn’t want us for minions but for children.

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

In my line of work, I have met many people who describe experiences of counseling that were not productive or helpful and that left the person thinking that counseling was a waste of time. Whether it is an individual, couple, or a parent bringing a child, some people leave with a bad experience that makes them want to write off the entire counseling field as unhelpful. I am not writing this to criticize those experiences or to place blame on people who were seeking help and found none. Counseling is a field full of diverse counselors that do not always hit the mark when people come to them seeking healing and guidance. We as counselors can have very different approaches to helping people and some are not the right fit for the person seeking help. It is worth mentioning as well that we are human and can have bad days where we feel burnt out, tired, or overwhelmed, which inevitably impacts our ability to be working at 100%. When people have had this experience, I often encourage them to give counseling another try. Finding the right counselor can be difficult, but it is possible. If you have a bad experience with a counselor, you have several options. You can give them a little bit more time, ask the counselor for a referral, or keep looking on your own for a different counselor. Websites like

psychologytoday.com or catholictherapists.com

can give you an idea of the counselor’s approach to see if they are the right fit for you. Counseling can open many doors to healing and greater wellbeing. It is important to not let one bad experience prevent you from gaining all that counseling has to offer. —Luke Brown, LPCC

Dear Parishioners,

I am preparing this column a few days before the Parish Festival but once again I want to thank everyone who was involved in the planning, execution, set up & clean up of those two days, as well as those of you who were able to attend. I always enjoy seeing so many of our parishioners in one place as I often forget that most of you come to the same Mass every weekend & so really only see one third or so of your fellow parishioners. I do hope that you too enjoy meeting & getting to know other members of the parish community through opportunities like the festival. I am very mindful of how much time and effort is involved in a community event like this so again, a big thank you to all who were present & offered yourself for the sake of others.

Many of you have commented on the beautiful statue we now have of St. Lucy which can be seen to the right of St. Francis as you enter the doors of the church by the rectory parking lot. We still need to get a pedestal for the statue but we had to put it in place when it arrived as it weighs about 1200 pounds, being made out of marble. Early Voting - Misleading Facts About Issue 1
