Memories

There used to be a daily weekday Mass both in the morning and in the evening. About a dozen or two people would attend the evening Mass which was about a half hour long with just the prayers and In addition to the priest, there was readings. someone to help distribute Communion, a lector, and a server. I was scheduled for Tuesday, September 11, 2001. We quickly prepared for Mass -- lighting the candles, putting the vessels and hosts out, and checking the readings for that day -- so that we had time to talk before Mass about the events of the day. A few minutes before Mass was scheduled to begin, we heard the voices in the church getting louder so we went to the doorway of the sacristy to see what was going on. This evening the church was PACKED with more people coming in. We quickly added more hosts and vessels and asked other EMs in the crowd to help distribute Communion. When Mass ended, the priest looked at the solemn crowd and decided to end with a patriotic hymn. After finishing all of the verses of the hymn, the congregation waited, and the priest chose another patriotic hymn. So it went until all of the patriotic hymns in the hymnal were sung. The people still stood there silently waiting, so the priest summed up the events of the day and told the people to go home and continue to pray with their families. - Nancy Zola

2024 MASS INTENTIONS BOOK

Our Mass Intention Book will open on September 11th after the 8:30a.m. Mass. One Weekend Mass and One Weekday Mass— OR—Two Weekday Masses will be available for you to request for a stipend of \$10 each. This system is in place to best accommodate the special intentions of all our parishioners. Lines during the first day or two of opening can resemble lines you might see on Black Friday while shopping. In other words, please be considerate of each other and patient with our staff as they work diligently to see that your requests are fulfilled :) Sanctuary Candle Intentions will also be available for \$10 (to cover cost of candle replacement).

"It's wonderful that so many wish to have Mass offered for themself or on behalf of another (living or deceased) but we only have so many Masses per year and so must limit how many intentions you can have. And of course several people may want Mass to be offered on a particular day because it someone's anniversary of birth or death or for some other reason, but we must understand that there is only 1 intention per day (except possibly on Sunday when there may be 2). Though it's important for us to remember a person prayerfully on a particular day for sentimental reasons, God is beyond time and so will hear our prayers whenever they are offered. We must all accept the limitations of time and we appreciate your understanding and cooperation ." -Fr. Jim

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

FIRST READING: EZEKIEL 33:7–9 Ezekiel was an old testament prophet who ministered to the Jewish people in exile in Babylon. In this passage, this speaker is God, who uses the image of a watchman to describe a profit's role. In those times, a watchman was someone who stood on a hill, or in a tower, to watch for invaders.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 13:8–10 In the concluding section of his letter to the Romans, Paul writes about the moral demands of Christian life. This letter was written some years before the gospels, yet these words will sound very much like words we hear in the Gospels. Clearly, Paul is drawing upon a pre-Gospel tradition about what Jesus said.

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

As a counselor, some of the most common questions I get are about parenting. Parenting is not easy and is often an incredibly complicated and difficult task that requires changing and adapting to new God the Father should serve as our challenges. example of an ideal parent and one of the first things I recommend is to pray for guidance as a parent. Learning to be a good parent is not only good for children's mental health, but also for the parent. Effective parenting skills and strategies can help us to remain calm, improve conflict resolution, and nurture good communication. Another recommendation I usually give is to attend a parenting class. Parenting classes can be a great place for learning new parenting skills, finding a supportive environment of other parents, and practicing or discussing new strategies. Love and Logic is an example of a parenting philosophy that has helped many adults improve their parenting skills by providing classes. If you are interested, you can find Love and Logic trainers that provide classes locally by visiting www.loveandlogic.com. A good place to start if you are curious about Love and Logic is to read Parenting with Love and Logic by Foster Cline, MD and Jim Fay. It is full of helpful suggestions and tools for raising confident and motivated children. There are no perfect parents, which means parents can always work on improving their skills and techniques. If you are interested in improving your parenting skills, consider praying about attending a parenting class or picking up some parenting books. -Luke Brown, LPCC

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Dear Parishioners,

I had a meeting with about 20 people last Sunday about our trip to Italy in 2025. I want to keep you abreast of what we're looking at in case you are interested in joining us as it seems we will have a good sized group again and last time some were left out because of space issues (which should not be an issue this time as we are planning farther ahead). We're looking at March 17-25, 2025 but that is not set in stone by any means. Our goal is to make this a more relaxing trip and one that tends to focus more on some places south of Rome (including Rome itself of course). By all means feel free to let me know if you're interested (no commitment required) just so I can keep you in the loop.

This weekend Jack Wunderle will be available in the vestibule of the church again before and after Mass to take pictures. I strongly encourage you to have your picture taken, whether you are single or married. No need to dress up for the occasion. We want to create a mural or collage of parishioner's as we celebrate our 75th Parish Anniversary. Of course you are welcome to purchase copies (of various sizes) at very reasonable cost but that is totally optional. However you *will* receive a free 5x7 picture in gratitude for your participation. So please stop back there this weekend and let your beauty be recorded for history.

This weekend also kicks off our Faith Formation for 2023-2024. All those who do not attend a Catholic School can receive their religious education by their presence at these sessions which take place 3 Sundays out of month. These Sunday Sessions are also for those in 2nd grade who are preparing for their First Holy Communion and those in 8th grade who are preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation. We received very good feedback from those who participated last year and I was very happy with the faithfulness of those who attended the Sessions and then 11am Mass afterward. Please feel free to reach out to me or call the rectory if you have questions.

Attempting to pick up the pieces of one's life after the tragedy of divorce is an area that can impact a person's relationship with God and the Church. One of the significant issues that a person faces is their place in the Church. Does the Church still care about me even though I am divorced? Am I allowed to go to Mass? Can I receive communion? How can the Church help me heal? If I decide to marry again, what do I have to do?

The Tribunal of the Diocese of Cleveland offers its First Step Program to help individuals deal with these questions in order to renew and/or strengthen their relationship with God and the Church. This program is offered to help everyone, especially those who have experienced divorce, learn more about Catholic teaching regarding marriage, divorce, and remarriage. Representatives from the Ministry to the Divorced Office of the Department for Marriage and Family Ministry will also be present to explain the resources they offer to the divorced. The participants attend the general meeting, and follow-up with their procurator to submit the case.



ST. LEO MAKES ITS MARK

In August 1949 construction began on a combination church and school. The school opened in September 1950, and the first Mass in the church was on Christmas 1950. The Church was dedicated by Bishop Hoban in June 1951. This is a good view of the relief sculpture of St. Leo, which formerly stood over the main entrance of the church and is now in the northeast corner of Lux Hall. In the late 1960s the state of Ohio purchased the southern end of the parish property for I-480, Fr. Lux, never one to waste anything, repurposed and moved the church's framework to the north end of the school as a gym and hall—now known as Lux Hall. The church structure was rotated 180 degrees after it was razed and moved, so the choir loft, which would have been at the east end of the original church is now at the west end of Lux Hall.
