

MEMORIES

The school year always began after Labor Day. At the beginning of the school year, the students were each given hardback Phonics, Geography, History and other books to last the year. There was a box stamped in the front or back of the book for your name and the school year. It was interesting to see how long the books were in use and who used them before you did. We were supposed to take the books home and cover them with a removal covering (never contact paper!). insurance agency provided some book covers that had instructions for cutting and folding the cover to fit the different sized books. There were never enough covers for all the books so parents had to use their crafting skills to make book covers from brown paper grocery bags and wrapping paper. At the end of the school year, each student had to return their books after first removing the cover and then using an eraser to clean the edges of the pages.

2024 Mass Intentions Book

This system is in place to best accommodate the special intentions of all our parishioners. Lines during the first day or two of opening can resemble lines you might see on Black Friday while shopping. In other words, please be considerate of each other and patient with our staff as they work diligently to see that your requests are fulfilled:) Sanctuary Candle Intentions will also be available for \$10 (to cover cost of candle replacement).

"It's wonderful that so many wish to have Mass offered for themself or on behalf of another (living or deceased) but we only have so many Masses per year and so must limit how many intentions you can have. And of course several people may want Mass to be offered on a particular day because it someone's anniversary of birth or death or for some other reason, but we must understand that there is only 1 intention per day (except possibly on Sunday when there may be 2). Though it's important for us to remember a person prayerfully on a particular day for sentimental reasons, God is beyond time and so will hear our prayers whenever they are offered. We must all accept the limitations of time and we appreciate your understanding and cooperation." -Fr. Jim

A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Today's Gospel reading relays the story of Jesus telling St. Peter to "get behind me Satan." This can be jarring to read, especially as it follows immediately after Matthew's account of Jesus telling Peter that he is the rock upon which he will build his church! How is it that St. Peter can be both "Satan" and "Rock?" I think that we can all identify with having moments of triumph and moments of great weakness. Sometimes they may even follow right after one another as they do here for Peter! There are some important lessons that we can learn from this Gospel and from Peter's very human, relatable moments. Firstly, we all have moments where we do the right thing, make good choices, and put God first. Jesus celebrates one such moment when Peter is the first to recognize that he is We should also celebrate our the Messiah. successes. Secondly, we all will also have moments of failure, like when Peter tries to stop Jesus from fulfilling his call to lay down his life for the world.

We too fall on our faces sometimes and make choices we regret. And sometimes we too need the Lord to point out to us where those areas are for growth. Peter took the correction of the Lord and went on to become St. Peter, our first pope. His life shows us that even with many bumps along the road, it is possible for all of us to become saints. He persevered through his weakness and trusted in the Lord to supply what he lacked. When we feel discouraged about our own mistakes and weaknesses, let us remember the life of Peter. I leave you with this quote from Pope John XXIII. "Consult not your fears but your hopes and your dreams. Think not about your frustrations, but about your unfulfilled potential. Concern yourself not with what you tried and failed in, but what it is still possible for you to do." —Luke Brown, LPCC

How many public self-storage facilities can you find in your city or town? They seem to be popping up everywhere. One day I was talking to my neighbor and he was explaining that he just wanted to have his garage back again. He was thinking about moving everything to a storage unit so he could gain what he wanted more than all that stuff: space. We talked about the fact that if he chose to follow through with it there was no shortage of places to house all of it. Of course, we also agreed that it would be better to simply let go of all it. He could sell it or give it away. But, of course it was good stuff! So good, in fact, one was tempted to rent a whole new space to house it!

I am not against stuff in principle, but I do realize that stuff can become a stumbling block to real freedom. Sometimes our possessions take on an importance that begins to dictate how we act or how we give of ourselves to God and others. An everyday steward seeks detachment from things of this world that will one day pass away Things that we possess should be seen as pathways into experiences that glorify God whether they allow us to serve others, enrich our lives lived daily for God, or even help make leisure and recreation time resting in God's presence easier. But the simpler the life, the fewer distractions there are from focusing on those we love and our relationship with God. And besides, do you really think a monthly payment to house stuff you don't really need is the best stewardship way of life?

Dear Parishioners,

Lorraine Konefal was a parishioner whom I will always remember walking to her pew (always the first row in front of the tabernacle) with her cane and her large brim hat that she always wore to Mass. I was glad to have had the opportunity to see her a final time at the new Metro Hospital just a couple of weeks ago when I anointed her & talked about her life. We celebrated her funeral Mass last Tuesday & remembered how she spent many years as a model and dance instructor who also loved to travel. She won many contests such as Miss Valley View, Miss January and Miss Lorain (to name just a few). Lorraine can be seen talking to Bishop Malesic on the large poster above the display case in the vestibule. That picture was taken last year when the Bishop was here to celebrate Mass at the beginning of our 75th Parish Anniversary. Lorainne was a devout Catholic who attended Mass faithfully and had a devotion to St. Terese & to the Blessed Mother. May she now rejoice with them in her eternal home.

Did you notice the newly painted sloping roof of our church when you drove in for Mass today? It once sported the gold color that Fr. Russ Lowe wanted to remind him of Notre Dame. It is now a dark brown color and I suspect you think that is meant to remind you of the Cleveland Browns (I could have gone with orange too but somehow that just didn't seem to be the right color). But in reality it took a bit of thought to come up with the right color. The new handicapped ramp, seating area & concrete parking spaces by Lux Hall should also be completed by the time you read this. We hope it will provide much easier access for people who need to enter the gym via a wheelchair or walker, rather than having to make the long trip through the side entrance of the school building, then through the cafeteria & hallways. This also brings to completion the numerous updates in our school building which includes air conditioning in the cafeteria, new windows throughout the school & in the gym, new tables in the cafeteria, all new desks & lockers in the classrooms and new remotely controlled locks on all the doors & cameras throughout all the buildings. I am grateful to Mrs. Denise Burns, our Principal, for the many grants she was able to attain which helped pay for many of these projects.

Mass for Labor Day will be at 9am on Monday (outside, weather-permitting) and of course the Rectory Office will be closed as usual. We welcome our students back to school this Tuesday and ask God to bless them and our teachers and staff as we begin a new school year.

Congratulations to Jill Kramer (who worked in our rectory office many years ago!) & to her husband Nathaniel Frances as they were married last Friday, September 1st. May God grant them many years of happiness together.

WHERE'S TODAY'S MASS?

One of the challenges of founding a parish is the distinct lack of a structure where Mass can be celebrated. And at St. Leo's these locations varied.

Sunday Masses were initially celebrated at the (1)Benjamin Franklin School auditorium on Spring Road, like this early (2)First Holy Communion Mass, possibly in 1950.

Daily Masses were first celebrated at the (3)Home of Bill Heminger at the corner of Broadale and Saratoga. The house was also used for organizational meetings.

Eventually, St. Leo's needed a rectory, and in 1949 Fr. Lux purchased this (4)**House on Broadview Road south of Cook Ave.** with financial assistance from his sister. The addition on the right was built to accommodate daily masses. This house eventually became a convent for the school nuns.

In the spring of 1949, Fr. Lux approached parishioners to build a church structure on the parish property, and in three evenings they completed the job.

(5) This photo is a symbol of the St. Leo spirit, where parishioners, if they are asked, will do what they can for the community.

We're not sure of all the names of the men in this building crew, but the bald man is Myron Rosby. Barney Darmstadt and Leo Kudlaty are also in this photo. The important question, though, is, what's missing here? And the answer is windows. They had apparently finished the church and realized that the structure had no windows.

But here's the (6)**Inside of the finished structure—with windows.** It appears that it accommodated about 190 worshippers. You don't see it, but there was also a small pump-style reed organ, which provided music for the Masses. This is possibly the only First Holy Communion Mass celebrated in the temporary church, which was obviously crowded. —John Sabol
