

#### **READINGS FOR THE WEEK**

#### FIRST READING: MALACHAI 1:14-2:2, 8-10

The book of Malachai was written after the Jews returned from exile in Babylon. The prophet expresses God's displeasure because once the people returned to their homeland and enjoyed better times, they grew lax in their religious practices. Today's passage is directed to the Jewish priests in the temple, scolding them for their carelessness and indifference.

#### SECOND READING: 1 THESSALONIANS 2:7-9, 13

Thessalonica was a city in northeastern Greece, where Christians were being persecuted. So Paul wrote them a friendly and encouraging letter. In today's passage we will hear him use a touching image to describe his relationship with these people who he loves.

## **PRACTICING** CATHOLIC

"A Heavy Burden, Hard to Carry" By: Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

"Mommy, you haven't been making any sacrifices."

My daughter was peering through the little opening in the plastic cover of the "sacrifice jar" we made for Lent this year. The repurposed oatmeal container, jazzed up with glitter glue and pictures of St. Therese of Lisieux, was more than half-filled with little slips of paper bearing descriptions of the various sacrifices family members had made for one another.

But she was right: every piece of paper bore the childlike scrawl of herself and her brother. I had not added anything to the sacrifice jar.

"If I wrote down every sacrifice I made for you in just a single day, the jar would explode," I retorted, and even though my daughter giggled, I instantly regretted the comment, sighing as I realized I did it again. I let a snide, self-pitying thought form on my lips and make its way into the world because for a brief moment I thought someone didn't appreciate my (imagine me sniffing injuredly here) hard work.

We sneer at the scribes and the Pharisees as Jesus describes them in the Gospel, lengthening their phylacteries and coveting the places of honor. But then I remember: nobody starts out meaning to be a jerk.

We want to do good things. We try to be holy. But it's hard, that burden weighs heavy on our back.

So, we murmur about it here and there. We stop to catch our breath. We glimpse other people looking at our burden with approval and admiration, and we breathe a little harder, groan a little deeper. And somewhere along the way the burden becomes an idol and our labor a performance. We dare not ask for help bearing it, for we prize too greatly the sweat of our own brow.

## A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

In this weekend's Gospel, we hear about Christ calling out the Pharisees for their hypocrisy. As a counselor, I often hear people call themselves hypocrites for mentioning teachings to others while also having a difficult time following the same teachings themselves. I also hear priests say that people will say in the confessional that they feel shame about confessing the same sins every time they attend the Sacrament of Reconciliation. However, I think that this is a flawed and incorrect view of what hypocrisy is. It is often worth mentioning to people that hypocrisy is really defined as preaching to others what you believe does not apply to you. For example, a person can tell others that an issue like pornography is bad while also struggling with it themselves and this does not make them a hypocrite. However, if that same person says, "You should not view pornography but it is not a big deal if I do," is now guilty of hypocrisy. When we add shame on top of the difficult sins that we are already struggling with, it only makes matters worse. Christ is calling out the Pharisees for telling others how to live while not putting any effort into those same principles themselves, which is to be guilty of hypocrisy. If they were putting genuine effort into practicing what they were telling others to do, Christ would not have been so harsh. If you feel like you are guilty of hypocrisy, please revisit today's Gospel and reflect on how you may be different than the Pharisees that Christ is rebuking. -Luke Brown, LCC

## Vote NO to Stop Abortion through Nine Months

This Tuesday, the rights and safety of women, children, and parents are on the ballot. Issue 1 not only puts women at risk and threatens parental rights, but this extreme amendment also allows abortions through all nine months of pregnancy. The vague language of Issue 1 endangers preborn children and Catholics cannot be silent when the most vulnerable are in harm's way.

- Allowing abortion through all nine months by using the overly broad term "health" to permit painful, late-term abortions. In U.S. law, "health" includes age, as well as psychological, emotional, or physical well-being, so an abortion providing-physician could justify an abortion in the third trimester by citing a woman's age or emotional well-being.
- Leaving preborn children without protection by giving abortion providers the ability to determine on a "case by case" basis when a preborn child is protected by state laws. If abortion-providing physicians can decide when a preborn child is viable, this allows the same clinician to sidestep regulations and end the lives of potentially viable children.

Our Catholic faith teaches us that every human being deserves protection, love, and care – especially the most vulnerable. This Tuesday, to defend the preborn from painful, late-term abortions and to protect children in the womb, Vote NO on Issue 1.
